Fireside Health Chat

FACTS ABOUT SYPHILIS THE CAUSE Syphilis is caused by germs called spirochetes.

HOW IT IS SPREAD Syphilis is spread from one person who has the disease to another who does not have it, usually through sexual contact, but it may be contracted RARELY by kissing or other close personal contact.

HOW IT MAY BE CURED 1. Early diagnosis. 2. Continuous treatment for at least one year. 3. Treatment must be given by a physician.

HOW TO STOP ITS SPREAD IF YOU HAVE SYPHILIS: Don't have sexual intercourse until your doctor tells you that you can no longer spread the disease to others, or your partner will most likely catch syphilis.

SYPHILIS DEVELOPS IN FOUR STAGES STAGE ONE In this stage a sore, which is called a chancre (pronounced "shanker"), develops in 10 days to three weeks after exposure.

NEARLY EVERY CASE OF SYPHILIS CAN BE CURED IF TREATMENT IS BEGUN IN THE FIRST STAGE. STAGE TWO Two cases out of three have a second stage. This stage begins 3 to 6 weeks after the sore appears.

THE BLOOD TEST WILL ALWAYS FIND SYPHILIS IN THIS STAGE. STAGE THREE (The Hidden Stage). Many persons have syphilis but do not know it.

STAGE FOUR Five years, 10 years, or even 20 or 30 years later, the germs of syphilis have done enough damage to make the person real sick.

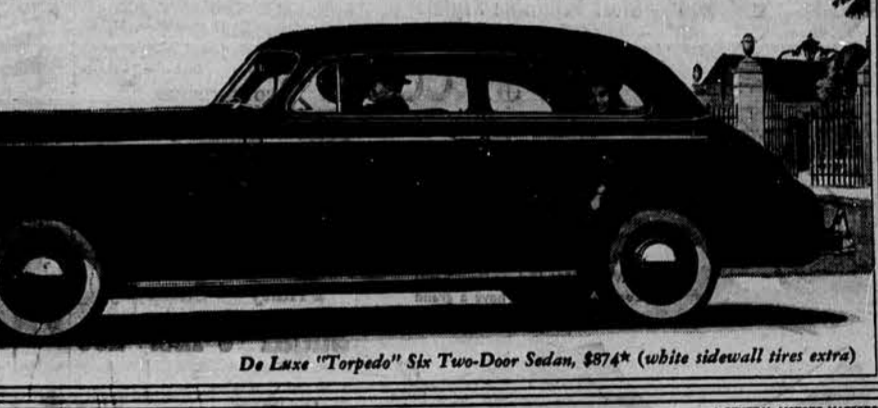
