





DANGER OF WAITING

FOR PAIN IN TEETH TO DISAPPEAR

So you have a toothache? And you're going to wait until the pain disappears because you "haven't time" to visit you dentist?

time" to 'visit you dentist? It may be true that the pain will disappear in time, but that does not indicate, by any 'means, that the danger is past. The infec-tion that causes teech to ache con-tinues 'after he initial poin goes

In order to understand this, let us examine a typical tooth, to learn its construction and also to determine what happens when it aches. The exposed part of the tooth is covered by enamel shell, hard and firm. But tiny cracks may engage in this covering in may appear in this covering, in which particles of food can lodge Then the germs go to work, eat-ing down into the enamel. The cavity continues on down through the enamel, enlarging as it goes, until it reaches the body of the tooth which in not so hard as the 'enamel. Here the decay spreads rapidly, undermining the enamel and attacking it from the under side

when the 'decay reaches the pulp, or "nerve", the tooth begins to ache in earnest. The pulp be-comes inflamed and highly irrita-

In a very short time, begins to subside, because the nerves which caused it are dead. nerves which caused it are used It is now that the real trouble begins. By this time the bacteria have penetrated the root end of the tooth and infected the jaw bone. The tooth may hurt a little
