A Sentence Sermon

'We mortals, men and women, devour many disappointments between breakfast and dinner time; keep back the tears, and look a little pale about the lips, and in answer to inquiries say, 'oh, nothing.' Pride helps us, and pride is not a bad thing when it only urges us to hide our own hurts, not to hurt others.'

The Lost Numbers

From where we are sitting we can see four stores. Of the four only one has a number on it. Anyone unfamiliar with the business houses of Statesboro would have to guess the location of any one of the other three, or spend some time making inquiries.

We don't know upon whom the responsibility rests for identifying the stores and homes in Statesboro, but it seems to us that it should be established and that numbers then be placed on every home and store in town.

You and we know where our businesses are located; we know where the drug stores, the hardware stores, the furniture stores, the department stores, the grocery stores, and other stores are, but we don't know the street numbers—we don't have to know.

But the salesman who calls for the first time has only his prospect call card or your letter which shows 'No. 150 North Main street' or '27 West Main street. When he begins looking for that number he runs into a bunch of blanks. He loses time and when he finally finds you he is in a bad frame of mind which is catching and you and he both are fit to be tied before it is all over.

You receive a letter from your husband's sister informing you that she is coming to visit you. She hasn't been here since you built your new home so you write and tell her to 'turn left at the traffic light and go four blocks to Walnut street, turn right and it'll be the third house from the right diagonally across from the little neighborhood grocery store and directly across the street from a big two-story, unpainted frame house. There'll be a sun dial in the front yard and a fish pool on the right side of the walk. (It is just a chance that two other houses on the same side of the street have sun dials and every house on the street has fish pools and half the houses on the street are two-story, unpainted frame houses.)

Now wouldn't it have been a lot simpler and to the point to have written: 'You didn't know you have a new home now? You'll find it at 206 West Grady Street.'

With our streets well marked and identified with large concrete markers, finding streets now is easy. But you get lost when you start trying to find numbers.

Let's decide who is responsible for putting numbers on our business houses and homes—and then do it.

Identify your home and business.

Debating Vital Questions

Last Friday we heard four young people, all in high school, stand up and debate a subject that is uppermost in the minds of most us. Should the powers of the Federal government be increased.

We were impressed with the amount of study and work that had evidently been put into the arguments presented. Carmen Cowart and Worth McDougald represented the affirmative side of the question and two young people from Graymont the negative.

We were further impressed by the absence of the citizens of Statesboro. We noted only the mothers of the two local debaters and a few close friends. But then we are all just too busy.

We think it a fine thing for these young people to get up and argue a subject such as this and take it as seriously as we adults take far less important things.

And we congratulate the local debaters on having presented strong enough arguments to win a unanimous decision from the judges.



Migrating Time

'A farmer carrying a package he had received from a mail order house was stopped by a local merchant who said 'Why didn't you buy that lot of goods from me? I could have saved you the postage, and besides, you would have been patronizing a home store, which builds up the locality.' The farmer looked at the merchant a moment and then said: 'Why don't you patronize your home paper and advertise? I read it and I didn't know you had the stuff I have here.'

With spring on the mail order catalogs are blanketing the town and country. They are attractively made up; they present their goods in a manner that is very tempting. They have gone so far as to use personal histories of families in a number of sections of the country. One house has requested the history of a family in Bulloch county.

Can one wonder why the mail order business grows by leaps and bounds? Yet there is a known method for local merchants to offset this flood of beautiful catalogs.

Use your local newspaper. Tell your town friends and your farmer friends what you have and that it can be bought at less than they can buy it by mail.

You can't expect them to assume that you have on your shelves and counters what they want and need. You owe it to them to tell them you can fill their needs.

Use the columns of The Bulloch Herald in which to spread your secrets. It won't be a secret long, for everybody reads The Herald.

WITH OTHER EDITORS

THE GOVERNOR AND WELFARE WORK Governor Talmadge renews his statement that he will have published a list of those who are receiving old age assistance in Georgia. The governor made the statement in his campaign that if he were elected the lists would be published. In some parts of the state there has been local movements to have the lists published. Some have favored while some opposed. The federal government part in the payment of the old age assistance, profess that the lists not be published. Presumably it is the position of Washington that it is hardly fair to the beneficiaries to make public the information that they have asked for and received assistance. The contention of the governor is that it is only fair to those who have received no assistance that they should know who is receiving this public money. In the opinion of The Observer it will cause no great splash when the lists are published. Some will make the complaint that they need help as badly as some who are receiving help, but this is done every day already. Information got by grapevine about those on the rolls to receive assistance, and the amount that is paid to individuals is not very well kept secret.

More important is the position of Governor Talmadge that all who desire pensions should receive them. He is certainly right there. We have had a situation with some receiving aid and others just as deserving not getting anything. It has been due to the fact that the state has not advanced enough for all to receive assistance, and to the further fact that there is so much red tape about the law that examining and passing on applicants is slow business and the workers have found it impossible to reach all the applicants.—Moultrie Observer.

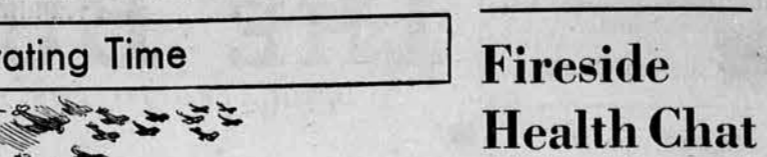

Fire Side Health Chat

DANGER OF WAITING FOR PAIN IN TEETH TO DISAPPEAR So you have a toothache? And you're going to wait until the pain disappears because you "haven't time" to visit your dentist?

It may be true that the pain will disappear in a moment, but the danger is past. The infection that causes teeth to ache continues after he initial pain goes away.

In order to understand this, let us examine a typical tooth, to learn its construction and also to see how a toothache occurs. The exposed part of the tooth is covered by enamel shell. Below this is a layer of dentin which may appear in this covering, in which particles of food can lodge. Then the germs go to work, eating down into the enamel.

The cavity continues on down through the enamel, enlarging as it goes, until it reaches the body of the tooth which is not so hard as the enamel. Here the decay spreads rapidly, undermining the enamel, and attacking it from the under side.

When the decay reaches the pulp, or "nerve", the tooth begins to ache. The pulp becomes inflamed and highly irritated.

In a very short time, so much of the pulp tissue dies. The inflammation continues to the end of the root canal, where the tooth is embedded in the socket. The pulp begins to subside, because the nerves which caused it are dead.

This Week In National Defense

The following information on defense matters has been supplied by the United States Government to the Bulloch Herald through the National Editorial Association. It is offered to our readers as a public service. It has been reviewed objectively in accordance with established newspaper practices.

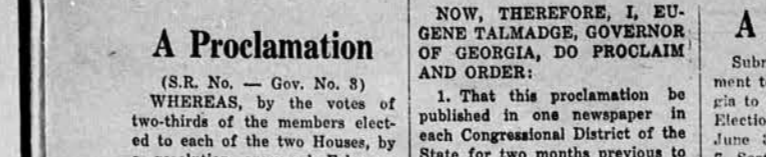
DEFENSE HOUSING The President approved a program for 6,000 temporary defense housing units in 10 localities. It calls for 2,000 trailers for families and 4,000 units for single men and women in dormitories or ships as follows: New London, Conn., dormitories for 400 single men; Erie, Penn., 200 family trailers; Sidney, N. Y., 100 rooms for single men and 35 family trailers; Baltimore, Md., 300 units for single men and 325 family trailers; Orange, Texas, 400 units for single men; Nashville, Tenn., 200 units for single men, 450 family trailers; San Diego, Cal., 1,000 units for single men, 500 family trailers; Bremerton, Wash., 500 dormitory units, 200 trailers; Wilmington, N. C., 325 family trailers, which 200 would be for white families and 125 for colored workers; Washington, D. C., dormitories for 1,000 women. Dormitories and ships will be assigned as arranged as to constitute satisfactory accommodations from the standpoint of sanitation and public welfare for the period of their use. Mobile units and most of the dormitories will be under the management of the Farm Security Administration.

LABOR SUPPLY L. Stating that more than three-fourths of the workers in defense industries are in plants operating only one shift, War Under Secretary Patterson said production facilities were available in numbers sufficient to add a second shift. Director Knudsen, U. S. Production Management Office, called upon labor and industry to cooperate in an expanded "training-in-the-shop" program. Federal Security Administrator McNutt appealed to farmers and farm workers to register at State Employment Offices so that re-placements may be obtained for thousands of workers formerly available for agricultural jobs who are now working in defense plants.

CONSUMER AND DEFENSE National Defense Advisory Commission Harry Elliott, working with all branches of industry to increase production of consumer goods so profits may be made from increased sales rather than "padding" their profit margins, U. S. defense industries are better prepared to protect consumer interest than in 1915-16. Miss Elliott also presented State Defense Councils with suggestions for State legislation for limiting retail prices.

LEASE LEND PROGRAM President Roosevelt directed agriculture secretary Wickard and the Public Health Service to devise a program to extend aid in foodstuffs and other agricultural products to the States. He said the program might make food available for such countries as Spain and unoccupied France.

NAVY SECRETARY Knox said no naval vessels have been transferred from the United States. Provided, however, that the provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to any official elected at the General Election of 1940.



A Proclamation

(S. R. No. — Gov. No. 8) WHEREAS, by the votes of two-thirds of the members elected to each of the two Houses, by a resolution approved February 13, 1941, the General Assembly of Georgia has proposed that Article 8, Section 2 of the Constitution of Georgia be amended by striking Paragraph 1 of said Article and Section in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof a new Paragraph 1 which shall read as follows:

"Paragraph 1. There shall be a State School Superintendent elected by the people at the same time, for the same term, and in the same manner as the Governor, who shall hold his office until his successor is elected and qualified. His office shall be at the seat of government and he shall be paid a salary not to exceed two thousand dollars per annum. The General Assembly may substitute for the State School Superintendent such other officer, or officers, as may be deemed necessary to perfect the system of public education."

"Paragraph 2. There shall be a State Superintendent of Schools elected by the people at the same time, for the same term, and in the same manner as the Governor, who shall hold his office until his successor is elected and qualified. His office shall be at the seat of government and he shall be paid a salary not to exceed two thousand dollars per annum. The General Assembly may substitute for the State Superintendent of Schools such other officer, or officers, as may be deemed necessary to perfect the system of public education."

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of Georgia, at its session in 1941, proposed a resolution amending the Constitution of Georgia, to authorize the Sunnyside Hill Consolidated School District of Gwinnett County to incur a bonded indebtedness of \$14,000 for the purpose of building and equipping other school facilities; and

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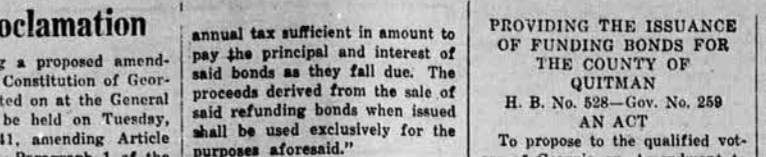
