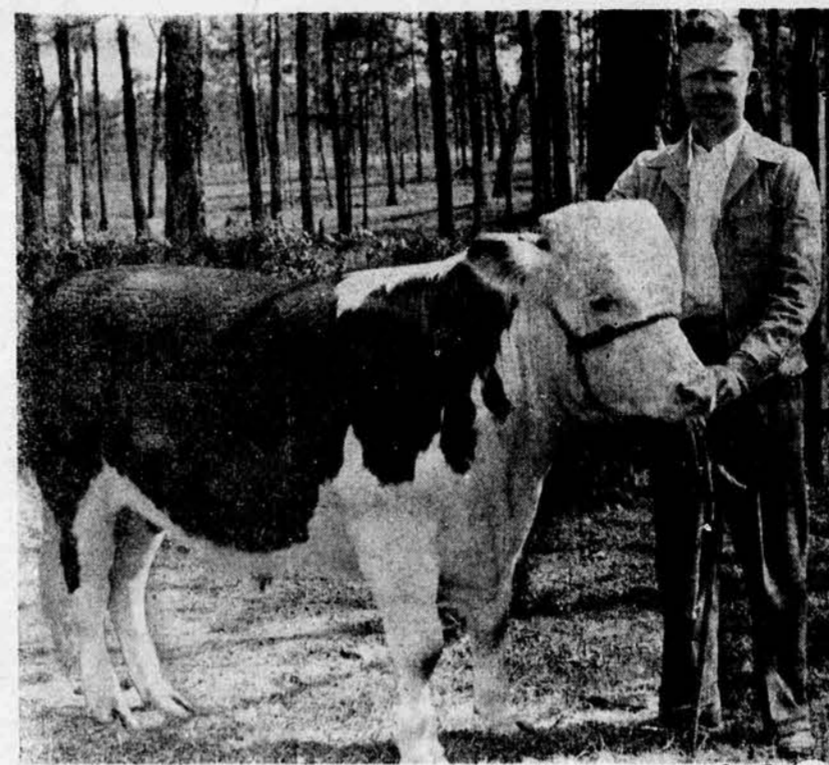

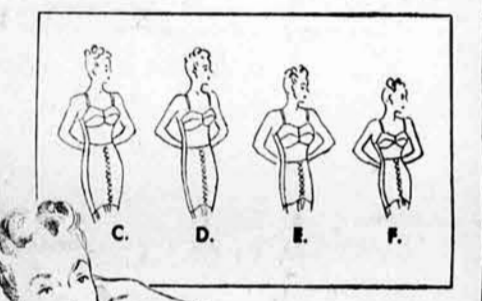

County Swaps Hwy Certificates

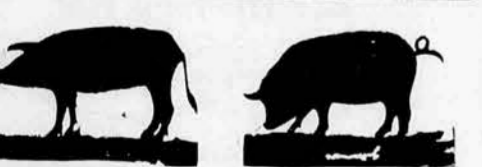
