To Give Us Secret Ballot

A law was passed at the recent session of the Georgia Legislature which, when put into effect, will have a marked bearing upon the outcome of primary elecionts for national, state and county officials in Georgia.

This measure provides that when one grand jury of a county so recommends, the ballots will no longer be numbered. Under the present procedure, the stub and the ballot bear corresponding num-bers. DRINKING WATER

This is a subject which should This is a subject which should be of concern to everyone for drinking water is certainly one of the necessities of life. Other than the air we breathe water is the most essential commodity for he support of life. Few people give this matter much thought, how-ever, because to most of us water is so commonples and as modifiis so commonplace and so readily available we accept it as a matter of course. Seldom does the ave-rage citizen give any great amount of attention to the sues-tion of water quality.

tion of water quality. "Water Quality." from a public health standpoint, means those things which may have some ef-fect upon the health of the person drinking the water. Specifically, we wish to know if there is any possibility of the water containing harmful or disease producing germs or bacteria at any time. Such germs as those causing ty-phoid or paratyphoid fever, the dysentaries, diarrheas and certain other diseases may be present in contaminated water and, if so, persons drinking that water will ersons drinking that water

A good drinking water should be practically free of any bacteria and certainly free at all times of those types of bacteria commonly found in sewage. Bacteria causing the diseases just mentioned origi-nate in the waste material from the human body and may be presming in contact with sewage o body wastes, to get into a water then drinking that water may cause typhoid, dysentary or diar-rheas.

The important thing to remem-ber is that the germs causing water borne diseases originates in the body wastes of higher animals, especially humans. In January of this year, the Junior Chamber of Commerce, at the request of many citizens of this city, conducted as a free public service, a city wide poll of opinion.

The citizens of this city were asked to vote at this time on a ballot which we provided on the question of whether or not they were in favor of the Jaycees operating the motion picture show on Sunday at hours which would not conflict with th church services, with the proceeds going to a public playground for the children of Statesboro and Bulloch county. We wish at this time to thank the citizens of Statesboro for their splendid and courtous cooperation which was shown to our organization during the conducting of this poll.

We feel that it is our duty, as a civic organi ration, to give you a detailed report as to the procedure we have taken in this matter. Your votes were tabulated and the result showed the citizens of Statesboro were in favor of this move by the rote of 599, as against 125. These were of the cople of voting age. We believe that this vote was taken in an unbiased and unprejudiced man-ner, as our ultimate aim was to obtain the true celing of our citizens. With this information i hand we reported our result to the city council on February 11, 1941, and respectfully requested their nsideration and action.

Upon investigation we found that on the city ordinance book there is a Blue Law which pro-nibits the operation of any business in the city limits of Statesboro on Sunday for profit, other which have been deemed necessities

On April 8, 1941, we requested another audience with the city council and respectfully re-quested the repeal of the ordinance which is now effect which specifically prohibits the showing of motion pictures on Sunda

After presenting our case and discussing our request in detail a vote was taken by the city council. This vote was three to two against repeal of this ordinance. We then requested that the city council vote to hold a special election in order that the people might decide this issue themselves. However, the city council saw fit to deny this request. We then asked them if there was any other means by which we could operate Sunday movies for the purpose stated above, with their consent Their answer to this was no.

We are indeed sorry that we have been un able to secure for you the benefits that would be derived by you from the operation of Sunday movies


