LAST WEEK 600 young people wrote a letter. This was not just another letter in the ordinary people in that fair city. sense of the word. This was a letter in which the youth of our city expressed themselves, their feelings, their wishes and desires.

This particular letter was addressed to the Mayor and to the City Council. Summed up in a few sentences it read something like this:

"Dear Mr. Mayor: Our school is almost out. In less than thirty days the 1,250 school children of our city will be on their vacation, with nothing to do and no place to play. We feel sure that you cannot overlook the necessity of providing wholesome recreation for Statesboro children. Therefore, we are taking it on ourselves to ask you to build us a playground where we can go and play in safety. We would not expect elaborate equipment or playground facilities but we would like something, a place where we could play, and would not have to day long, seeking enjoyment ad fun. We feel that all the patrons of our school would support such a movement as this. Yours sincerely, The Recreational Committee of the Seventh Grade.

This letter was signed by every student in the Statesboro Elementary School-600 strong.

The startling fact of this letter is that every word of it is absolutely true. Our youth do not have a place to play. They do not have the recreational facilities that they should have. They do not have a place where they can play and not run the risk of being struck by a passing auto, or of breaking the neighbor's window with a baseball. Almost any aftornoon one can find a group o

boys and girls playing in the streets of the residensection. Almost any afternoon one can find a group of youngsters climbing into an old jalopy to go to the "creek" and go swimming. These things are natural to youth, but can we afford to have our children exposed to the dangers which accompany this type of recration? Can the parents of these children deny their children the privilege of doing these things because they are not safe? Absolutely not. But on the other hand can the parents let their children seek enjoyment in places where they could be easily killed or seriously injured? Again we say no. What then ARE we going to do?

This is the paradox facing the citizens of Statesboro today. The time has come to act. It is now or never. We must provide for our youth. Are we going to stand idly by until serious disaster overtakes

We must awake! We must provide for our youth-Let's give them a place to play and to swim at any Statesboro."





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
