"Bulloch county farmers can produce as good beef and turkeys as any place," J. A. Bunce declared at this week.

Mr. Bunce made this statement after he had delivered a load of turkeys in Atlanta and they were graded on him. There were fifty-three out of fifty-four of the turkeys he carried to Atlanta that graded H. S. Prime and the other one graded No. 2.

Mr. Bunce said he had known for some time that Bulloch county could produce beef comparable to that from any other section but this is the first time his turkeys have been strictly graded. The 54 turkeys returned him \$615.46 or \$331.80 total.

Mr. Bunce was offered 18 cents per pound for these turkeys before Christmas and sold them for 22 cents this week.

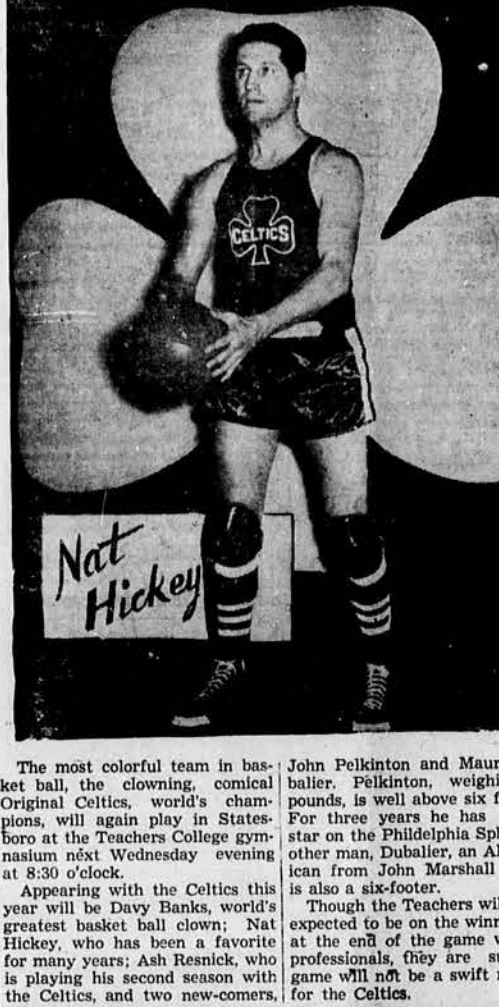
Dan Shuman to Talk to His Parents Over Short-Wave Radio

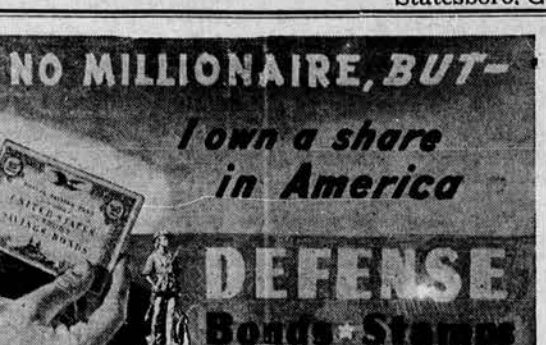

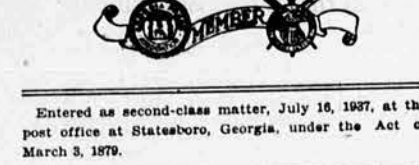
