the first half of 1942. When you buy your stamp the post office authorities give you a post card which has to be filled out and mailed to the collector of internal revenue. This card is your evidence that you have paid the tax. A no-tice on the card states that the stamp is evidence of pay-ment of the tax and the stick-er stamp should be affixed to the instrument panel or some conspicuous place so that it can easily be seen.


THE TYPHOID CARRIER

The number of people attacked and killed by typhoid fever has been greatly reduced in recent

In 1935 there were 1.013 case of typhoid reported in Georgia, with a rate per 100,000 population The most important procedure in the control of typhoid is the detection of the human carriers and the close supervision of such carriers until their bodies have ceased to throw off the germs of this

Physicians should not dismiss a typhoid case until laboratory findings are negative, for it is by this nethod only that the disease can be eradicated. Available figures for 1941 show that eleven typhoid carriers were located. Since a definite search for carriers was instituted in the state, a total of 151 carriers have been discovered.

Detection and supervision of such carriers is of foremost im-portance and the endeavor should receive co-operation and aid of all health officers and private physicians.




INCOME TAX RETURNS

Federal law requires a return to be made by every citizen regardless of the amount of net income, if having a gross in-come of: \$750 if single for entire year, or married and not living with husband or wife for any part of the year; \$1,500 if married and living with husband or wife for the entire year. Returns for 1941 must be filed not later than March 15,

1942, but may be filed now. I have been preparing returns for years and am an expert;

frequently I save taxpayers more than my charges by reason of knowing how to prepare the returns and claiming all the exemptions allowable. My regular customers will require all my time in March. Don't postpone this important return, but see me now, as there are severe penalties for failule to file by March 15th
