**A Proposed Typhoid Cure.**

There are few diseases more dreaded than typhoid fever, and there is good cause for the prevalent fear of it.

In the famous healthful region about Atlanta this is one of the very few diseases that ever cause much apprehension, but wherever typhoid fever appears there is danger, and every part of this country is subject more or less to the ravages of this dire malarial.

The treatment of it has undoubtedly been improved very much in the last few years. Consequently the fatality from it has decreased notably, but the disease is still so dangerous that every new treatment of it that seems to promise better results than have hitherto been obtained is justly hailed.

The Chicago Chronicle gives prominence to a communication from one of its readers who thinks that he has come into the possession of knowledge which sufficing humanity should have, and which he proposes to circulate through the columns of that newspaper.

The treatment referred to is new it has been discussed very fully in the medical or general press, and we give the statement of its merits from the Chicago Chronicle's correspondent for what it is worth. He says:

"People who are interested in the subject of typhoid fever—and the designation probably includes most of the urban population—will be glad to know that, according to good medical authority, there is substantial reason to believe that a specific remedy has been discovered for the disease."

"It would be more proper, perhaps, to say that it has been invented, as it is the result of synthetic chemistry directed toward a fixed object."

"Typhoid germs will not live in nascent oxygen. That gas kills them. It has, therefore, been the aim of chemists to devise some combination which will liberate oxygen in the small intestine where the typhoid germs swarm. The difficulty has been that in all the compounds of oxygen that have been given up the oxygen in the stomach, while the seat of the trouble is fifteen feet further down. This fault, it is hoped, has been remedied by the composition of a substance called acetone."

"According to physicians who have tested the drug—it is not a patent medicine—it reduces the temperature of a typhoid patient from 104 or 104 to 100 or even lower within 12 hours, and it ends the duration of the disease and convalescence from six or seven weeks to half that time, besides rendering the patient comparatively comfortable and free from delirium during the whole period."

"It is said that the country hospital, where the conditions are by no means favorable, fifty test cases have been treated with acetone without a single death resulting. The normal typhoid mortality ranges from 8 to 10 per cent."

"Physicians are traditionally slow to endorse any remedy that has not borne the test of a year's employment. Hence they do not yet unreservedly commend the new typhoid specific."

"Of course, it is too soon to form any reliable estimate of an alleged one that has been tried for so short a time, but the importance of seeking for some better treatment of typhoid fever than that we have found, and the fact that it has made much less progress toward the mastery of this disease than many others should induce us to give a fair show to every proposed typhoid treatment that comes from a respectable source.—Atlanta Journal.

THE SUPREME COURT BENCH.

The Resignation of Judge Hal. Lewis From That Position Necessitates an Election.

The vacancy caused on the Supreme Court Bench by the resignation of Judge Hal. Lewis has precipitated an election which is of paramount interest to the people of Georgia.

Among those whose names are prominently mentioned is that of Judge John S. Candler, whose relationship to the present governor of the state makes his candidacy and previous record a matter of new interest to the people of the state.

It is possible in regard to the candidates who aspire to the Supreme Bench that Judge Candler was born in Carroll county, Ga., in 1861. He is a brother of Bishop Warren A. Candler, Asa G. Candler, of Atlanta, and Ex-Congressman Milton A. Candler, of the Fifth Congressional District.

His father, Judge Candler, was appointed to the Georgia Legislature in 1887. Judge Candler was appointed Solicitor General of the Stone Mountain Circuit by General John B. Gordon in 1891.

He was elected to fill the same office by Governor W. Y. Atkinson in 1893. In 1900, Judge Candler was elected, without opposition, to the same office by the Georgia Legislature.

While attending to his own courts, Judge Candler has found time to assist many of the other judges in the state. As Judge of the Superior Courts of the Stone Mountain Circuit, he presides over the criminal branch of the Superior Court of Fulton county.

Under his administration last year, the court only sat in Fulton county for eight weeks, thus reducing the expenses of this court from \$15,000 to less than \$5,000 per year.

When he went on the bench there were county and county courts in most of the counties of the Stone Mountain Circuit. All of these courts, with the exception of one have been abolished, and at the same time the Superior Court sessions in this county in this circuit have been reduced from one-half to two-thirds of the time that was formerly required to dispatch the business of these courts.
