MADE NO PROMISES

President Goes on Record Again as to Drawing Color Line.

NEGRO WILL NOT BE BARRED

"Personal" Letter Written to Charleston Man by Chief Executive in Regard to the Kick Over Dr. Crum.

A Washington special says: The president has sent a "personal" communication to a prominent citizen of Charleston, S. C., in part as follows: "White House, Washington, November 26, 1902—Dear Sir: I am in receipt of your letter of November 19 and of one from Mr. ... under date of November 11, in reference to the appointment of Dr. Crum as collector of the port of Charleston.

"In your letter you make certain specific charges against Dr. Crum, tending to show his unfitness in several respects for the office sought. These charges are entitled to the utmost consideration from me, and I shall go over them carefully before taking action. After making these charges, you add, as a further reason for opposition to him, that he is a colored man, and, after reciting the misdeeds that followed carpet bag rule and negro domination in South Carolina, you say that we have sworn never again to submit to the rule of the African, and such an appointment as that of Dr. Crum on any such office forces us to protest unambiguously against this insult to the white blood."

"In view of these last statements, I think I ought to make clear to you why I am concerned and pained by your making them and what my attitude is as regards all such appointments. How any one could have gained the idea that I had said I would not appoint reputable and upright colored men to office when objects of the color, I confess that I am wholly unable to understand. At the time of my visit to Charleston last spring I had made, and since that time I have made, a number of such appointments from several states in which there is a considerable colored population. For example, I made one such appointment in Mississippi and another in Alabama, shortly before my visit to Charleston. I had at that time appointed two colored men as judicial magistrates in parts of the State of Columbia. I have recently announced another such appointment for New Orleans, and have just made one for Pennsylvania.

The great majority of my appointments in every state have been of white men. North and south alike, it has been my endeavor to appoint only men of high character and good capacity, whether white or black. But I have been my consistent policy in every state where their numbers warranted it to recognize colored men of good repute and standing in making appointments to office. These appointments of colored men have in no state made more than a small proportion of the total number of appointments.

"I am unable to see how I am legitimately to be asked to make an exception for South Carolina. In South Carolina, to the four most important positions in the state, I have appointed three men and continued in office a fourth—all originally colored men—three of them white men—two of them colored men. As I am informed, these are the sons of Confederate soldiers. I have been informed by the citizens of Charleston, whom I have met that these four men represent a high grade of public service.

"I do not intend to appoint any unfit man to office. So far as I am legitimately concerned, I shall always endeavor to pay regard to the wishes and feelings of the people of each locality; but I cannot consent to take the position that the door of hope—the door of opportunity—is to be shut upon any man, no matter how worthy, purely upon the grounds of race and color."

THIRTEEN ARE DEAD

Rightfully Fatal Boiler Explosion Occurs in Chicago.

BIG PACKING PLANT WRECKED

By Carelessness of Employees in Swift Company's Factory Many Souls are Hurlled into Eternity Without Warning.

With a deafening report a boiler in Swift & Co's plant at Chicago exploded shortly after 9 o'clock Saturday morning. Thirteen lives were sacrificed, and scores of employees, visitors and others were injured. Huge blocks were sent through the roof of the structure and hurled hundreds of feet. Nobody within the boiler room survived to tell the story of the accident.

Five minutes after the explosion nothing of the building but a pile of twisted iron, bricks and mortar remained.

Sheets of flame sprang from the flames were being fought from every side. The explosion was of such force that adjoining buildings were wrecked, torn and twisted. Men, women and boys at work in adjoining departments were hurled through windows to the ground below. Many of them escaped with minor bruises, but most of them were hurt to such an extent that it was necessary to remove them to hospitals. Others were taken to their homes.

It was rumored that from fifty to one hundred persons had been caught in the wrecked building. This report caused great excitement and repeated calls were sent for police and ambulances. A dozen patrol wagons and as many ambulances were sent from all parts of the city. Extra calls for the fire department followed and soon the flames were being fought from every side. While the fire was still burning, police, firemen and employees of the packing firm began digging in the ruins.

Bodies torn, bruised and mangled were taken from the debris and sent to the morgues. A boy, scalded from head to foot and bleeding from cuts and lacerations, staggered toward the office of General Superintendent Young. The boy was Mr. Young's personal messenger. The lad, however, had been so badly frightened that Mr. Young did not recognize him.

It is not thought that the loss to Swift & Co. will amount to more than \$50,000.

WOMEN A VERITABLE DEMON

Charged With Poisoning Little Daughter and Husband, She Hangs Herself in Prison Cell.

Mrs. Hattie Whitten, who was arrested at Dexter, Mass., Saturday on the charge of having poisoned her 9-year-old daughter, from whose funeral she had just returned, committed suicide Sunday by hanging while in the custody of the deputy sheriff. Her death was a case which would have been as sensational as any inquired into in many years.

Mrs. Whitten is suspected also of having caused the death of an older daughter, aged 11, on September 19 last, and this body has been exhumed. Both children died suddenly, when previously they had appeared to be in the best of health. Mrs. Whitten's husband also died suddenly two years ago. The children were insured for \$50 and \$85, respectively. As a cause of death the physicians' certificates mentioned meningitis and heart failure.

An autopsy on the body of the younger girl disclosed arsenic and strychnine. The result of the autopsy on the older girl had not been made public. The coroner was taken in charge by a deputy sheriff and Sunday afternoon being left alone, she tied together two towels and hanged herself to a bed post.

Five minutes after she was reported that the girl's death was due to poison administered by the mother. Mrs. Whitten was arraigned on Saturday. She pleaded not guilty to the charge of murder and was held until Tuesday for a hearing.

Since her death some of the evidence presented before the coroner's jury has been made public. It was shown that she bought two boxes of arsenic and castor oil the day prior to the death of her daughter in September, and strychnine and arsenic on three days the past week.

TO IGNORE COLOMBIA

Uncle Sam Will Stand No More Foolishness in Matter.

LAST REQUEST HAS BEEN MADE

Little Republic is Asked to Force Concha to Sign Treaty—Refusal May Mean Trouble For Her.

A Washington special says: The Colombian government has been asked in a curt note by the United States minister to give preliminary orders to Minister Concha to sign the canal treaty or to grant some one else authority to act in his place.

No answer has been received to this request up to the time the cabinet meeting ended Friday. If Colombia does not see fit to grant it, there is a good possibility that the South American republic will be given a taste of roughshod American diplomacy. In other words, there is a chance that this government will start in to build the canal without waiting for the consent of Colombia, but will rely entirely upon its purchase rights and franchise of the Panama Canal Company.

The treaty which Minister Concha refused to sign was prepared by the Colombian government and was accepted by the United States in its entirety. Concha's only excuse for not signing is that he does not consider it a good treaty. Minister Hart, at Bogota, asserts that the Colombian government has not changed its mind and that it wants the treaty signed. It is a misapprehension that is solely trying to mislead the officials in Washington.

NEGROES LOSE THEIR CASE.

Circuit Court at Richmond Sustains New Virginia Constitution.

The court, however, dismissed both sides from the case, and no jurisdiction of the action being against the state. An appeal will be taken.

All the questions of the chief justice indicated that virtually every contention raised by complainants had been passed, upon adversely by the supreme court.
