





Littlefield's Bill Providing For "Publicity " Favored.

COMMITTEE BRINGS IN PEPORT

Republicans in Congress Agree to Support that Plan for Checking Evils of Gigantic Combines.

A Washington special says: The sub-committee to which was referred the anti-trust bills reported favorably to the full committee Friday on Mr. Littlefield's bill providing for giving publicity to the affairs of commercial publicity to the affairs of commercial combinations, with certain amend-ments. Acting Chairman Jenkins, of the judiciary committee, appointed a sub-committee Friday consisting of Representatives Littlefield, of Maine; Oversirect, of Indiana; Powers, of Massachusetts; DeArmond, of Missou-

Massachusetts; DeArmond, of Missouri, and Clayton, of Alabama, to which all anti-trust bills, including the publicity bill, have been referred.

Provisions of the Bill.

The publicity bill, as amended, provides that every corporation, joint stock company or similar organization. engaged in interstate or foreign com-merce, and every such corporation which shall be hereafter organized, shall file with the interstate commerce shall he with the interstate commission, on or before September ist each year, are turn, stating among other things its name, date of organization, and, if consolidated, the names of the constituent companies, and the same information concerning them. If the concerns have been reorganized, the organization or corpora-

the concerns have been reorganized, the original corporation or corporations are to be named, wi... information concerning them.

It is also provided that the amount of authorized capital stock, shares into which divided, par value, whether common or preferred, and distinction between each, amount issued and outstanding, amount paid in, how much, if any, in property, and if paid in property a description and cash market value of the property at the time it was received in payment, shall be stated. The indebtedners, its nature and for what purpose incurred, is to be and for what purpose incurred, is to be given, also a statement of the assets at their present cash market value, giving upon which the market value is

based.

'It also is required that the total earnings and income, operating expenses, interest, taxes, permanent improvements, net earnings, dividends declared, with rate and date during the year preceding the 1st of the preceding July; salaries of officials and wages of employees be disclosed. It is provided further that the treas-

It is provided further that the treasurer or other officer of concerns affected by the bill, having the requisite knowledge, shall answer on oath all inquiries that may be made in writing, under the direction of the interstate commerce commission, relative to its financial condition or to its capital stock. Such answer is not to be used as evidence against the nerson making stock. Such answer is not to be used as evidence against the person making it, except in prosecutions under the

It, except in prosecutions inner the proposed act.

A tax of 1 per cent per annum is imposed on so much of the capital stock outstanding, which is not fully paid in cash or other property at its tull eash market value, and provision is made for collecting the tax.

Penalties imposed.

Any concern contemplated in this

Any concern contemplated in this bill failing to pay a tax imposed is to be restrained on the suit of the United States from engaging in interstate or foreign commerce. It is made the duty of the attorney general, at the request of the interstate commerce commission, to enforce the provisions of the proposed act, and suit may be brought in any district court of the United States at the election of the attorney seneral, where an offending concern

general where an offending concern has a place of business. Provision is made that the inter-state commerce commission shall prepare and publish a statement showing a list of corporations and disclosing their condition. The till does not apply to any concern the amount of capi-tal stock of which does not exceed \$500,000.


