Dr. C. C. Parish Dead.

On Sunday night the remains of Dr. C. C. Parish arrived in Statesboro and were taken to the family burying ground near Lauson on Monday. The deceased was a citizen of Hawkinsville at the time of his death, where he had resided for the past four or five years.

He was engaged in the practice of dentistry.

The cause of his death was typhoid fever. Dr. Parish was a son of the late Henry Parish of this county, and a brother to Dr. C. H. Parish of Sylvania and Mr. Wayne Parish of Brooklet. He leaves a wife and several children. He married a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lee of this county.

A committee of the K. of P. of Statesboro met the remains at the depot, the deceased being a member of that order. He had done well in his adopted home, and his death came in the very flower of young manhood.

Church Completed.

On Friday afternoon, the handsome brick building of the Methodist church was completed and accepted by the building committee. Contractor A. J. Franklin has put up a fine building and the committee was well pleased with it. It is said that during the progress of the building, which has extended over a period of about seven months, there has not been the slightest jar or friction between the Committee and the Contractor.

While Mr. Franklin has lost about \$500 besides his time, yet he went ahead and gave those people a substantial and honest job. Appreciating this the Committee expressed their intention of seeing that all Mr. Franklin's losses on the building should be paid to him.

The church when furnished will cost about \$9,000.00. The large organ which was furnished by Mr. L. G. Lucas, of the Ludden & Bates Music House has arrived and has been placed in the church, but has not been unpacked as yet. The pews have not arrived yet, they are looked for within the next few days. They will cost \$1,250.00, and the organ will cost \$250.00. An agreement has been made that the \$250.00 organ shall be taken, and the full purchase price applied to a large pipe organ when the church sees fit to purchase one.

STATESBORO WINS AGAIN.

Two Interesting Games Puled Off Between Statesboro and the Y. M. C. A. of Savannah.

Score Stood 8 to 6 in Favor of Statesboro in Both Games.

In the write up it was claimed that Lowndes raised more sea island cotton than any other county in the sea island belt, and that Valdosta was the biggest sea island cotton market in the world. The Journal stated that Tattall ranked second to Lowndes and a "little sea island" was raised in Bulloch and Clinch. We of course attribute the above assertions to the ignorance of the man who wrote the article. It was claimed that Lowndes raised something like 7,000 bales and about this number was marketed in Valdosta. If he had had the trouble to have posted himself he would have seen that by the government cotton report Bulloch raised over 10,000 bales and nearly 11,000 bales were marketed in Statesboro, while Statesboro does not buy all the county's crop, she buys the principal part of the Emanuel county crop and a good deal from Tattall and Bryan. Part of the Bulloch county crop is marketed at other points in the county, viz: Metter, Brooklet, Blitch, Portals, Pulaski, Parish, Register and other points. According to the Government Gin Report, Bulloch is the biggest sea island producing county in the world, and Statesboro is the biggest sea island cotton market in the world; that is in the way of buying from the producer. She has bought 11,000 bales or one eighth of the entire crop of the world the present season. Statesboro has handled 3,000 bales more than Valdosta, and Bulloch raises 4,000 more bales than Lowndes. Now we don't know so much about Clinch, but we are simply of the opinion that there is "a little raised in Bulloch." Bulloch's cotton has classed higher than any other cotton the past season; better staple and better prepared. The ignorance of the Journal writer is so apparent as to appear ridiculous.
