Cameron, Tex. Aug. 24, '08. EDITH'S NEWS: Perhaps in giving a description of Texas, it is best to give the disadvantages first, but in doing this, I can truly say, that I have found but one serious objection to the country, and that is the frequency of drouths.

Many good veins of coal have been discovered in localities too far from the railroads to be worked. The mineral and agricultural productions of Texas are so various and so great that that it is my opinion that if the state were entirely isolated from the remainder of the world the people could live independently for all time.

The land being so rich, it seems strange that corn does not grow tall here. I think seven feet average height, but the stalk is thick and sturdy, and the weight of corn is fully 50 pounds to the bushel and wheat, often from 60 to 63 pounds to the bushel.

Wheat bread is the standard in this country, but many people, including myself, raised in the old states, refuse to "go back on their raising," and still use corn bread. Farm hands are always in demand here, but those recently from the states are preferred, as it is claimed by farm owners who employ labor that the average Texas raised young man is not as good a "hand" as young men from the East.

Killing At Pulaski.

On Saturday night at Pulaski, John Williams shot Henry Waters, four shots taking effect in the breast. Waters died in a few minutes after the shooting. Both men were white and men with families. The particulars of the shooting are reported as follows: It seems that Williams and Waters were trying to adjust some differences which arose over a settlement, the amount involved being one dollar. They were both drinking; Waters had a gun and was advancing on Williams, when the latter drew a pistol firing effect in Waters' breast as described above. Waters lived only a few minutes afterwards. It is also reported that both men were under the influence of whiskey. The dead man leaves a wife and several children. The remains were interred at the family burying ground on Sunday afternoon. Deputy Sheriff John Ellis went up and placed Williams under arrest and brought him to Statesboro where he was placed in jail. Williams made no effort to escape. A commitment trial will be had in a few days.

Echoes Of The Election.

In 1879 Hon. R. W. DeLoach was in the legislature from Bulloch, and on the petition of a majority of the people, put a high license on liquor, and on July 1st, 1880, the county became dry. Last Thursday the issue came to a vote and the people stood by the law of 1879. Mr. DeLoach was strong against the dispensary, and his district went against it 108 to 15.

The polls opened at Statesboro at 7 o'clock, and the first man to vote was F. N. Fletcher, who voted against the dispensary. His son, Mr. Van Fletcher was in Bryan county, and rode over 80 miles to come to cast a vote against it.

In 1880 when liquor was put out, Bulloch had only 8,000 people, and now the county has over 25,000. Most of the young men who have grown up in the last few years voted against the dispensary.

The people of the county are drawing the line stronger and stronger against the jug method of electioneering, and the candidate who relies on it, drives off two good men, where he only catches one sucker.

The churches, school houses and newspapers all stand against intemperance and the abuse of liquor, and the worshippers of John Barleycorn grow fewer every year.

The people are not interested in liquor. They are seeking for happy homes, sober boys, good houses, nice farms, education, and all the good things that make life worth living.

Liquor is sapping the life and property of many a man, who will discover when it is too late, that he took the wrong road in life, and when he sees himself a wreck, will be willing to acknowledge, that wine is a mocker, and that strong drink is raging, and that whosoever is deceived thereby, is not wise.
