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## GRAVES WON'T MAKE THE RACE.

Atlanta, Feb. 24.—Hon. John Temple Graves gave out his letter today declining to enter the race for governor this year and putting his declination on the ground of health and important business affairs. His letter of declination was written to the following citizens of Waycross, who addressed him a letter suggesting the change in the office and asking him to enter the race: John W. Greer, editor Waycross Journal; V. L. Stanton, J. H. Gillon, H. C. Stevens, Frank C. Folks, G. R. Brinson, H. J. Benton, T. S. Paine, C. J. Paine, A. G. Traylor, W. P. Sims, E. O. Williams, J. W. Moore, F. M. Mills, M. T. McGoogan, W. R. Newsom, W. W. Maddox, A. T. Summerlin and J. C. Hart.

Mr. Graves, after expressing his thanks for the honor tendered, gives his views on certain questions relating to the governorship. He says in part: "I think that the governor of the state should be not only the executive of its laws, but, to the full measure of his capacity, the fearless leader and exponent of its public sentiment. I think that no governor should tremble and hesitate in vital issues waiting to see and follow the popular current, but should feel that his high and central station laid upon him the obligation to think and speak his honest judgment both as to measures and to men. "I think that the governor of Georgia should never use his power and station to build an administration machine to further the ends of his ambition. The only combination which a chief executive can ethically make is between the governor and the people upon this natural and honorable alliance he should be willing to rise or fall.

"I think the governor of Georgia should hold the appointive power as a serious and a sacred trust. He should have no friend so near and so insistent as the state. He should pay no political debts and take no political gifts on the offices of the commonwealth. He should hold the judiciary as the highest and the holiest citadel of public virtue. He should safeguard the educational interests of his state with appointment of men not chosen for political service, but for educational equipment and consecration to the noblest development of youth.

"To sustain these high ideals and to facilitate these noble ends and to remove the temptation to offend them I believe that the governor should hold office for a single term of four years and be ineligible for re-election until the expiration of a term of years. I think the governor should stand always and everywhere as the champion of the people against all interests that are indifferent or antagonistic to their own."

He concludes with the statement that his health will not permit him to enter into the long campaign that would be required.

## Bryan at Valdosta Scored Democratic Reorganizers

Valdosta, Ga., Feb. 7.—Hon. William Jennings Bryan spoke here this afternoon to a large audience of men, woman and school children in the Court House square. Mr. Bryan came almost unexpectedly, the announcement being made only yesterday, though it was well advertised last night and this morning.

Mr. Bryan was taken in charge by a committee of twelve from the Board of Trade, including Republicans and "Goldbugs" and "silverites." Probably three-fourths of his audience was opposed to his views on the money question, though he was given an exceedingly cordial hearing and was frequently applauded.

His speech indicated some bitterness as a result of the campaigns four and eight years ago. Referring to the desire for harmony on the part of the reorganizers, he said that he had suffered as much for lack of harmony as they had. He said that the Democratic party lost ground during Cleveland's administration because the President was controlled by a coterie in Wall street. He also said that wherever political corruption is found Democrats are side by side with the Republicans in sharing in the spoils.

He said that more than half of the voters of Delaware received pay for the voters, and touched upon corruption in various cities and also upon the disclosures in the congressional and senatorial investigations to show how general and widespread corruption has become. He said the time had come when an awakened public conscience must be put against money, and he appealed for morality in all quarters.

He referred to the daily papers as the "daily bulletins of corporations," and spoke of the praise which they bestowed upon a trust magnate who happens to be beneath money for public institutions of any sort. On the money question, he said the increase in gold since 1896 had given just what the silverites were contending for.

Mr. Bryan said that the Republican scheme is to make silver money redeemable in gold, and then retire it with an issue of bonds.

He denounced imperialism, and said that the Southern people who endured carpet bag rule after the war were in a position to sympathize with the Filipinos, whom we have bought at \$2.50 a head.

Mr. Bryan stated that he was speaking for pure Democratic principles as against the plan of the reorganizers, and he appealed to his audience to help him keep the party in line with the platform which was adopted at Chicago, and reaffirmed at Kansas city.

### APRIL 20th FOR PRIMARY.

State Primary Has Been Called--Congressional and County Primary May Be Held Then.

The state executive committee has fixed Wednesday, April 20th as the day for the state primary. This is earlier than usual, but it is best for the people to get through with politics as early as possible. This means that Bulloch county will hold a meeting on March 19th to select a new executive committee and to name the day for the county primary on the same day for the nomination of county officers. Short campaigns are always better and now the best thing that you can do is to go and register so that you can vote in the election on April 20th.

### WAR IN FAR EAST WILL NOT SPREAD

Paris, Feb. 27.—Reports of international entanglements growing out of the war continue to occupy a prominent place in the sensational branch of the press. But, within a week the officials of the government who are in close and constant touch with the cabinets and other capitals, have satisfied themselves first that no international complications are imminent or likely at least for the present; second, that France is in no present or prospective danger of being embroiled in an international conflict.

Concerning the ability of France to hold aloof from the war, the officials base their belief on the experiences of the first few weeks of hostilities. At first the determination to observe neutrality brought out a sentimental reaction favorable to Russia, and popular demonstrations and subscriptions in behalf of that country. The authorities have now been able to take into account all the various currents, the result being a firm resolve that France will not have her hand forced by international agitation or external complications.

An official said today that the new Korean-Japanese treaty had been the occasion of putting out a number of reports calculated to foment discord between France and Korea, and perhaps force the hand of France in relation to other powers, particularly Russia. The authorities had taken note that the reports emanated from high Japanese sources. But, the officials declared, French policy was definitely fixed to maintain neutrality, and to refrain from the slightest active participation in the alleged treaty.

The recent bourse panic brought about a rather thorough survey of the situation throughout Europe, as the heavy decline in securities resulted mainly from fears that the European powers might be drawn into the conflict. The inquiry discloses that, while the possibilities of unexpected complications are always present, there is no immediate reason to expect European complications, the military activities at various points being the natural result of an outbreak of war between the great powers.

It is the understanding in government circles that Japan will not ask the powers to give formal recognition to the Korean-Japanese treaty.

Korea's position is likened to that of Roumania after taking advantage of the Turkish war to declare her independence, but before the Berlin congress had sanctioned its becoming a kingdom.

Berlin, Feb. 27.—The silence of the German press toward the war projects itself upon the attention of any one searching the newspapers here for an opinion about it. The news dispatches from abroad are printed with occasional explanations of their meaning to military and naval students, but that is all. The German newspapers, on all questions growing out of the war, are, with the exception of the few mentioned, completely silent. As a matter of fact, the press is so silent that it is a patriotic duty at this time.

The government has given the press to understand that neutrality in attitude and reserve, as well as the complete absence of the government's own interest in the war, is a patriotic duty at this time.

They are required to do this and after the small outlay is made they will have no further cost. Some seem to think that they will have to pay the carrier. This is a mistake. The government requires you to put a box up side of the road on the route of the carrier and he does the rest. Your mail will be just as safe in the box as it will be in the post office as any one going into it without authority or tampering with it in any way will be looked after by Uncle Sam as when his agents who is the carrier put the mail in the box it comes under his jurisdiction.

We hope our subscribers will take boxes as it will assist us no little in getting their papers to them regularly.

### A PROGRESSIVE COUNTY.

Liberty county is one of the progressive counties of the state. It believes in good roads. It knows the value of them and has taken an important step in the direction of getting them. Its grand jury has recommended that an issue of bonds amounting to \$80,000 be made for the purpose of making the roads what they should be.

Liberty is the first county to second the efforts of Chatham county in the matter of good roads and her system of good roads when completed could easily be brought into touch with the Chatham county system.

The Ogeechee road, one of Chatham's improved roads, is a part of the routes southward through Bryan, Liberty and McIntosh counties. It is in good condition to the Little Ogeechee river. With this road improved to the Ogeechee river and the bridge across that stream rebuilt, (it was destroyed during the Civil War), it would only be necessary to build across "Bryan Neck" in order to connect Chatham's system of roads with that of Liberty county. The distance across the neck is short, and doubtless the work would be done by Bryan county.

The counties immediately around Savannah should move immediately in the matter of good roads, they being about the best advertisement a county can have. They encourage immigration to look tolerantly upon it as a sharp and successful stroke of "business." And so even conscientious and courageous opposition was rendered futile.

## BIG FIRE IN ROCHESTER.

Rochester, N. Y., Feb. 26.—The worst conflagration in the history of Rochester started shortly before 5 o'clock this morning in the basement of the Rochester Dry Goods company's store. The fire was discovered soon after it started, but the spread of the flames was so rapid that before the department could arrive the entire building was in flames, Assistant Chief Jaynes at once sounded a general alarm, and later Chief Litt, realizing the flames were beyond control of the local department sent appeals to Buffalo and Syracuse for help. Nearly 100 hours later steamers arrived from Syracuse.

Within an hour after the discovery of the fire it had spread to the big granite building, occupied by Sibby, Lindsay and Carr and hundreds of business and professional men. The extreme cold made fire fighting difficult as the ladders were coated with ice. Assistant Jaynes was hurt, hit in the head by flying timbers. At 10:30 the loss was estimated from \$4,000,000 to \$5,000,000.

Among the big firms burned out are Beadle & Sberburns Co., Lindsay Co., Rochester Dry Goods Co. and Walk-over Shoe Co., besides hundreds of offices, the Vacuum Oil Co., and Bradstreet's mercantile agency, in the granite building.

Several engines arrived from Buffalo at 11 o'clock, and at that hour the fire still burned briskly, but Chief Little believed the flames could be kept under control, as no wind was blowing. The firemen used dynamite early, but its use was soon abandoned.

## THE DISHONOR LIVES.

We've got Panama, and it cannot be denied that, owing to the canal, it is a most valuable possession. Yet it must ever be a source of regret that we did not get it honorably. This is about all that is left to be said.

Poor old Senator Hoar! He has a conscience that worries him, but it always proves to be less compelling than his devotion to his party. He would be more comfortable with the easy conscience of non-existent conscience, of the junior senator from his own state, for it is a distressing thing to have persistent inner promptings, and yet turn to them a deaf or hardened ear.

Everybody knows—it is plain to a school-boy—that the establishment of the "republic" of Panama with the aid of American ships and marines, and its instantaneous recognition as a treaty-making power, violated all precedent (except the somewhat similar case of Hawaii) and defied the most common obligations of international good faith and friendship.

But the thing was done in a hurry, without either consulting congress or hearing from the people. Once done, it was not easily to be undone. Moreover though it was gained a national advantage, and thus there was a growing disposition to look tolerantly upon it as a sharp and successful stroke of "business." And so even conscientious and courageous opposition was rendered futile.

## COL. BRANNEN'S RACE.

### Opinions of People Who Are in Touch With the Voters of the First Congressional District.

That Col. J. A. Brannen is making a winning race for congress in the First district has never been doubted for an instant by those who are in touch with his campaign management. He has the assurances of a large vote in every section of the district. In several big counties Col. Lester will not receive even a complimentary vote, and even in Savannah, the home of Col. Lester, the Brannen sentiment is becoming so pronounced, that if it were not for the reason that a man has no desire to contest a man's election around his own door, he would be encouraged to make a fight for Chatham as well as the other counties. And the result may be such as to surprise even his majesty, the Mayor. Mr. Brannen certainly has reasons to feel proud of the expressions of confidence and offers of support that he is getting from Savannah. But that is the home of Col. Lester and he is entitled to its vote. Below we print a few expressions from men who are in a position to know what they are talking about:

Mr. J. A. Davis, traveling representative of the Savannah Morning News, says that in his travels over the district he finds the people everywhere for Brannen. Mr. Davis expects to see him win by a much larger majority than even his most enthusiastic supporters are claiming.

Mr. T. S. Gries, of Savannah, says that the sentiment among the people coming to Savannah is almost unanimously for Brannen.

Hon. E. K. Overstreet, of Sylvania, says Brannen would give Brannen a very large majority.

Mr. J. H. Blitch, commissioner of Bryan: "I regard Bryan as safe in the Brannen column. I know of but one man in my entire section of the county, containing forty or fifty votes, but what is a straight out-spoken Brannen man. He will carry the upper half of Bryan county almost solid" declared Mr. Blitch.

Mr. W. J. Strickland, who now makes his home at Pembroke, and is engaged in the grain and flour business there, stated that there was but one of two Lester men in the 19th district of Bryan county that he knew of. "Almost every man you meet, said Mr. Strickland, is an out-spoken Brannen man." The district just referred to polls about one third of the vote of Bryan county. Mr. Strickland was asked if he regarded Bryan as being in any way doubtful ground, he replied: "No, it is for Brannen by as big a majority as Bulloch."

Mr. J. J. Hayman, one of the prominent citizens of Clyde, stated that Mr. Brannen would carry the Clyde district four to one, and Bryan county will go for Brannen by a big majority.

Col. J. L. Whitley, whose home is in Savannah, but has a business at Vidalia, said: "I have occasion to pass through Tattall every few days, and I can tell you that it is almost impossible to pass through Tattall without telling that it is overwhelmingly for Brannen. The people are out-spoken, and there is no room to doubt as to who they are going to vote for."

Col. W. G. Warnell of Hagan, stated in Savannah on Saturday, that Brannen would carry Tattall two or three to one on a conservative estimate. He has just made a trip through Liberty county, and says there is no doubt that Liberty is safe in the Brannen column by a good majority; he wouldn't be surprised to see the majority in Liberty a big one.

Mr. John Powers, traveling salesman for Henry Solomon & Sons of Savannah, says he travels the entire district and his observations are that Brannen is strong in every section of the district.

Mr. B. N. Shearhouse, one of the leading business men of Effingham, who lives at Marlow, states that the Brannen support is strong in Effingham, and that he himself, along with many of his neighbors, are for Brannen.

Mr. G. M. Shearhouse of Guyton, states that the Brannen vote in Effingham will surprise some of those who are not posted.

Mr. S. H. Morgan of Guyton, who is one of the leading business men of his city says, "Tell Brannen we are for him, and are going to give him a good vote in Effingham."

At the democratic mass meeting in Sylvania on last Thursday, Hon. E. K. Overstreet was unanimously nominated to succeed himself for representative. Mr. Overstreet took the stand and made a speech of acceptance; and then branched off into a Brannen speech. He said that he had rather be defeated for representative himself than see Brannen defeated for congress. He considered that it would be a calamity which would be felt all over the district, and would perpetuate the rule of a certain set of politicians who have been running things in the First district for years. After this, both Judge S. L. Moore, ordinary of Bulloch county, and Mayor G. S. Johnston of Statesboro, were called on, and presented Mr. Brannen's claims on the voters. They were liberally applauded, and a conservative estimate placed the crowd at least 6 to 1 for Brannen.

Mr. B. L. Robertson returned to Highnote, Ala. on Saturday after a visit to his family at Nubert. Mr. Robertson says that the town of Highnote is what you call a dispensary town, the county operates a whisky dispensary there. He says it is a terrible nuisance not only to the naval stores men, but to the country at large.

Every Saturday night he has thirty or forty of his negroes drunk on dispensary whisky. He says that the negro women are about as bad as the men to get drunk. They fill the road for a mile or two, drinking and carousing day and night and it is dangerous for people to travel the public highways. He says that there is a town a few miles away that has no dispensary, and all the trade and all the business is going there. Highnote has a whisky dispensary, and a few old half rotten stores, the number of business houses growing less every day, no bank or anything else that makes a town. Hartford, the other town referred to, is a few miles away, has no dispensary, but has stores, two banks already and the third one now going up. When people want whisky they go to Highnote, but when they want anything else they go to the other town.

## Swainsboro Wants the S & S

The people of Swainsboro are taking active steps looking to the matter of offering some inducements to the stockholders of the Savannah & Statesboro Ry., to carry their road to Swainsboro, instead of going ten miles north of that place, as proposed. Swainsboro is a good town and would derive benefits from this road a hundred-fold. It would give her a direct line into Savannah, and would also be of benefit to Statesboro and Savannah. The extension will in all probability be made soon, and we hope that our sister town may succeed in getting what she wants.
