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The Veterans Appeal.

We notice that the little appeal having from a few politicians at Springfield a few days ago, is finding its way into the columns of the different newspapers of the district, at the request of the campaign management, of course.

The News does not care to be understood as saying that the men who followed the fortunes of the confederacy and bear the marks of the battle fields is not deserving of honor at the hands of the rising generation, for such is not our position.

We have already shown up the inconsistency of some of the signs of that remarkable document, and we wish to add that that list is simply representative of the policy that prevails all over this land and country. People are ready and anxious to pour sympathy into the laps of those who do not need it, while at the same time they refuse to help the deserving thousands who are in need of their sympathies.

While Col. Lester has a gallant war record, and we have all honored him year after year, yet have you thought of how much he has had, and how little he needs what you propose to give him? There is perhaps no other man in the state of Georgia who has drawn more from the public treasury as an office holder than Col. Lester. He has practically been in office ever since the war, either in the state senate, mayor of Savannah or a member of congress, in other words, he is a perpetual office holder, and now after all these years of office holding when there is a demand from one end of the district to the other for a man capable of looking after the interest of the district, to the extent that we do not lose every thing to which we are entitled, as pointed out in previous issues of this paper. There is a great howl, "Don't vote against a Confederate veteran."

Col. Lester has all this world goods that he needs and to spare, in fact he is what you might term a rich man, especially so compared with the thousands of just as true and as brave veterans who have never had any thing except that which they have dug out of the ground, by the sweat of their own faces. Thousands of these have filled a pauper's grave, and have lived and died unhonored and unsung, some of them have suffered for want of the necessities of life while the mob was clinging to the coat tail and singing the praises of and licking the feet of the man who didn't need their sympathy. But that's the way of the world.

The News takes little stock in this matter of hero worship, especially that of the modern stamp which we have just described. We believe that the man who goes forward and makes an honest living by the sweat of his brow, either between the plow handles or at the bench, recognizing no thing but what he deems to be right between himself and his fellow man and obedience to his God, at the same time maintaining his self-respect and his political independence is the grandest hero of this or any other age. To be and his class are the people to which the country must look for its future safety. If the ship of state is turned over into the hands of the politicians of the latter day stamp she will go to pieces on the rocks of political corruption and do it in short order.

We hope that our friends of the Lester campaign management will not waste all their sympathies by the shedding of crocodile tears at the feet of a man who does not need it, but save some of their wasted sympathies for that large class of battle scarred veterans who have never been honored by either office or reward, but who wear the battle scars on their chests.

RAWLS IS VACILLATING

The above bit of interesting political news comes to us through the columns of the Savannah Morning News.

The insinuation is made that "Rawls is not satisfactory to Chatham," and the bold assertion is made: "Chatham will break the rotation system." It is stated that the Savannah politicians are willing for Ellingham to select the man for the senator from the First senatorial district this time, provided, "he must be a man satisfactory to us." Rawls is vacillating. This is a bit of interesting information. What has Rawls done? We notice that he has recently lined up with the Savannah politicians in the most important fight they have had on their hands in many years. He signed up to further perpetuate their cry, on the threat of the political situation in the first congressional district. Now they tell us he is "vacillating," and the threat is made that he must be shelved.

In view of the recent blood curdling appeal to sympathy, not to strike down an old Confederate veteran who followed the flag of Jackson and Lee, we confess that those fellows have got us rater mixed, when they say "Rawls to the rear."

It never pays to vacillate, while we do not know, or do we particularly care in what particular that Col. Rawls has incurred the displeasure of "The King," but it is apparent to us that he and a whole lot of Ellingham county politicians have "vacillated" until they are in a rather awkward position. The signing of the recent Lester manifesto by both Col. Rawls and Mr. Foy, who are the rival candidates for senator is an evidence of this fact. It would have been more proper for them to have managed their own respective campaigns and allowed Brannen and Lester to have done the same thing, but they had to sign up to place the same despotic rule over the other counties of the First district that Savannah is now flaunting so boldly in their faces.

The present fight in the First district involves the future political independence of the country counties of the district. Mr. Brannen is acknowledged to be the strongest man that the country counties can put forward; and if he is defeated it will be twenty years before a man from one of the country counties will have a show to win. If Brannen can't beat Savannah then there is no man in the district who can do so.

The defeat of the country candidate at this time will perpetuate Savannah's supremacy in the First congressional district to the same extent that it now exists in Ellingham county on the senatorial ticket.

We have no objection to people signing their own death warrant, but we are inclined to kick when they lose their own political independence to the extent that they try to deliver us over into the same condition as they seem to be occupying themselves, viz: That when we show the least bit of political independence and manhood, "we are vacillating." The refusal of either Foy or Rawls to sign that declaration hatched up at Springfield would have brought upon their heads such a storm of indignation from the Savannah end of the line that they would have been kicked out of the race, if it had taken a sacrifice of the rotation system to have accomplished it. They both know this and of course "signed up."

While it is clear that the politicians of Ellingham county are in the clutches of the Savannah politicians, where are the people of that grand old county? Have they too slept until they are guilty of "vacillating" every time that they make an exhibition of political independence and local self-government? We believe not.

The Savannah politicians are always ready to meet the country counties half way, that is if Savannah furnishes the man and the country furnishes the votes.

The indications are that there are going to be some lively times in the national democratic convention. The Cleveland and the Bryan forces are as far apart as ever.

It begins to look as if the "deep water" scheme had given way for the campaign jug. Maybe the Lester management needed something stronger than cold water to enthuse the boys with.
