**EFFINGHAM PUT ON NOTICE.**

We notice through the columns of the Savannah Morning News that the Citizens Club, which is the controlling political organization in Savannah, that a resolution has been passed putting Effingham county on notice, that while they concede that it is Effingham's time to select the senator from the First Senatorial District, composed of the counties of Chatham, Effingham and Bryan, under the rotation system, that Savannah will not consent to his selection, unless he be to their liking.

How is this for bossism?  
Where does Effingham county's rights come in in this matter?  
If she is simply to furnish a man to be used as a tool for a partisan political organization, whose only purpose of organization is spoils and plunder, what do the good conservative independent voters of Effingham get out of the game?  
What is the senator worth to Effingham? What good is the rotation system to a people who have been held up and robbed of every vestige of local self government?  
Is the selection of a senator who is bound heels and hoofs to do the bidding of a political organization, foreign in many respects to the interest of the people of Effingham county worth more than the independence and self respect of the honest and sturdy voters of Effingham county? That is the question that stares the voters of Effingham square in the face, it is that and nothing else; it has been stripped so bare of every vestige of covering that he that runs may read, and if we are not badly mistaken in the make up of the people of that good old county, they will resent it too. The eyes of the good people of other counties are on her.

A writer in the Bryan Enterprise of this week takes it up and puts it to Bryan. He says that under the rotation system when it is either Bryan or Effingham's time, the man who is elected has to be measured by the Savannah politicians' yard stick, but when it is Chatham's time no questions are asked by either Bryan or Effingham, if they did they would be told to keep their nose out of Chatham's business affairs. This looks like a big boy crowing over a small one, an effort of the strong to crush the weak.

The same set of politicians are trying to run rough shod over the First congressional district; they have filled it with hired beelers and ing tenters and the voters in the country counties are going to teach them a lesson that will stick to them for many years. Effingham county may be too weak to save herself of the humiliation that Chatham is trying to heap on her in the senatorial fight, but if she is made out of the same kind of stuff we believe she is, she will join the other country counties in the First congressional district in preventing the same yoke from being fastened on to them that they are trying to put on the first senatorial district.

While Chatham is trying to rob Effingham of her right to select her own senator under the rotation system, Bulloch is sending an Effingham county man to the Georgia state senate without opposition.

What will Effingham do in the face of present circumstances?  
Time alone will tell.

**THE BALLOTS WILL TELL**

Who Are The Victors In The Contest  
Next Wednesday.

Next Wednesday will decide who are the winners in this campaign. The ballots of the sovereign people will decide who shall fill the offices for the next two years. There are only a few contests in Bulloch, as many of the candidates have no opposition, and of course they have easy sailing on the political sea, and can be counted as lucky mortals.

Of course the congressional fight has excited much interest, not only in Bulloch, but throughout the district. What promised to be a tame contest in the beginning has developed into a hard fought battle from the Savannah river to the Altamaha, and from the Atlantic to the hills of old Emanuel. Mr. Lester and Mr. Brannen are both well known to the people of all this section, and the strength developed by Mr. Brannen has brought consternation to the camps of Lester forces, and the chances for Mr. Brannen to be the winner in this contest has grown from day to day, and his friends are jubilant in every county in the district.

For senator of the Seventeenth district, Hon. H. B. Strange has no opposition and will represent our people with ability and credit in the upper house of the general assembly. This is a strong compliment to Mr. Strange, who only a few years ago came to Bulloch from Effingham, and speaks volumes for his ability and integrity.

The race for representative has excited the most interest on account of the number of able men offering for the two places. There are five candidates to fill the two positions, and our people can make no mistake in naming any two of them. Mr. Thomas B. Thorne, who is one of the leading farmers of the county, and stands high as a public citizen, for the first time asks for public honors, and has many friends who are pushing his candidacy. Next comes Mr. Madison Warren, who is well and favorably known to our people, and who has before represented our county with honor and credit, and his friends are hopeful of his success. Next comes Dr. J. S. L. Miller, who is one of the present representatives and made a good record as a legislator, and stands high with the people of the county. This comes Mr. James B. Lee, a prominent and well known citizen, who has a legion of friends to push on his candidacy, and no man stands higher than Colonel Lee. Then Col. Julian Anderson, and while his name has been called last, may be the first when the battle of ballots takes place. He is the only lawyer in the crowd, and in addition to being a good lawyer is a leading farmer, and his friends are pushing his candidacy. The next contest is that for tax receiver, and Messrs. Adam J. Iler and M. D. Olliff are again crossing swords for this office. Two years ago, they had a lively and close contest, and now they again submit the question to the sovereign voters of the county. Mr. Iler has long been a prominent citizen of the county, and held this office about twenty years ago for one term, and was again elected a few years ago, and made an excellent record.

Mr. Olliff is a young man, well known and highly respected, and has also made a good record, and this contest is an interesting fight.

**Mrs. J. T. Rogers Dead.**  
On yesterday morning a telegram announced the death of Mrs. J. T. Rogers the night before at her home in Savannah. The afternoon previous, her relatives here had been notified that she was rapidly sinking, and her brother and sister, Mr. J. L. Olliff and Mrs. Maxie Foy hurried to Savannah, and were at her bedside when she died.

The immediate cause of her death was heart trouble, and she had been in failing health for some time. Before her marriage, she was Miss Lucy Olliff, and leaves a wide circle of friends and relatives to mourn her loss. Just before her death she was baptized in the Independent Presbyterian church; she was Baptist in faith but was too weak to undergo a baptism by immersion, hence she was sprinkled as before stated.

The remains arrived, yesterday morning on a special train from Dover where it made connections with No. 1 from Savannah. A large number of sorrowing friends and relatives were at the depot to meet the train. The remains were taken to the home of Mrs. Foy in East Statesboro.

The funeral was held this morning at 10 o'clock from the Baptist church and was conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. S. McLemore. One of the largest crowds that have attended a funeral here in some time were out to pay to her memory their last tribute. The interment was made in the family lot in East Side cemetery.

**Death of Mrs. J. T. Rogers**  
After a lingering illness, Mrs. J. T. Rogers died at 10:30 o'clock last night at No. 15 Perry street west. The immediate cause of her death was heart trouble. She had been confined to her room for nearly a month. Before her marriage to Dr. Rogers, two years ago, she was Miss Lucy Olliff, of Statesboro. Besides her husband the deceased leaves two brothers, Messrs. Jno. W. and J. L. Olliff, and four sisters, Mrs. W. M. Foy and Mrs. R. L. Sample and Misses Allie and Annie May Olliff, all of Statesboro. The deceased a few days before her death became a member of the Independent Presbyterian Church. The funeral and interment will take place in Statesboro.—Morning News.
