Turned Down.**  
Washington, Dec. 10.—Gen.  
Fitzhugh Lee, president of the  
Jamestown Exposition Company,  
had a talk with President Roose-  
velt today about the exposition.  
He thanked the president for his  
interest in the project as expressed  
in his message. He referred to  
the announcement that the sub-  
committee of the house com-  
mittee on industrial arts and ex-  
positions had decided not to re-  
commend an appropriation for  
the Jamestown Exposition, but  
would recommend that provision  
be made for a naval display there.  
The promoters of the enterprise  
expected that an appropriation  
would be made by the government  
for the exposition, and they feel  
that, as the favored they appropri-  
ations for the St. Louis and Port-  
land exhibitions, they ought to  
have similar treatment. The Vir-  
ginia members of congress will  
make a contest for the appropri-  
ation.

GOOD ADVICE NOW.

Savannah News. The advice of Mr. Harvis Judson, chairman of the Cotton Growers' Protective Association, to cotton farmers, to hold their cotton, is good now whatever it may have been earlier in the season. There is much probability that the price of cotton will go lower, while the chances are that, after the present scare passes, it will advance to 8 cents, and perhaps more, a pound.

It may appear a little later in the season that the government estimate of the crop is too high. In that event the price is certain to advance very considerably.

Mr. Jordan lays the blame for the decline in the price on Wall street speculators. Well wasn't it Wall street speculators who put up the price last season to 17 cents? Perhaps when we come to think about it there are just about as many Wall street speculators who are anxious for the price of cotton to go up as there are that it shall go down. Just now those who are betting for a decline have the best of it, because the government's report showed the crop larger than the markets of the world would take at 10, or even 9 cents, a pound. If information should be furnished today that a mistake had been made, and that the crop was only 11,000,000 bales, the price would advance at once to 10, and it may be to 12 cents a pound, and Wall street men who are now betting the price will be lower would immediately begin to bet that the price would be higher.

Occasionally strong syndicates are able to put up or down the price of cotton for a short time, but the price is really made by the supply and demand. The demand is pretty accurately known, and when the supply is known the price is soon approximately fixed. That being the case, the farmer who sells his cotton early in the season does better with it often than the farmer who holds for a higher price does with him.

It looks now as if the cotton farmers had grown a little too much cotton this season if they want 10 cents a pound for it. A 12,000,000 bale crop means about 8 cent cotton and a 10,500,000 or 11,000,000 bale crop 10 cent cotton. Cotton farmers should watch this in mind in planning next season. In a few years probably the world will take a 12,500,000 bale crop at 10 cents or a little better.

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### Plant Breeding

Our Indian corn is not the only plant that can be improved in habit and productivity by careful selection. There is hardly a plant grown on our farms or in our garden that will not yield to the hand of the breeder. Says Prof. Massey in Practical Farmer. Years ago when digging late potatoes we found a hill that had forty-four potatoes, mainly of small size. Right alongside was a hill that had three good sized potatoes and a few small ones. Now we have often heard men discuss the planting of large small potatoes. Suppose we had taken the large potatoes that grew in the hills with few in the hill, for seed. They were certainly the most handsome potatoes. But the hill with the forty-four potatoes showed at least a prolific habit, and we planned them and were not disappointed in the result, for they gave far more marketable potatoes than large ones from less prolific hills. Let's we read in an exchange the experience of a thoughtful farmer who said that in digging his sweet potatoes he found a hill that had eight potatoes that averaged one pound each and the third hill had only one potato of a pound. The crop had been fertilized alike and cultivated alike one plant had eight times the crop of another. Now, we are sure that if the farmer who wrote to us from Colorado that he had found, back in the mountains, a man with a little ranch who is an attentive reader of the Practical Farmer. He had some wheat that he said he had found growing volunteer there, and planted the heads five to six feet apart, and he secured some and sent it to us. We now have that wheat growing in our garden, and will give it special attention and will save the finest heads for seed, so that another year we may be able to say what it will turn out. The results in the selection and breeding of wheat at the Minnesota Station have attracted general attention, and there is no doubt but that either the spring or winter wheat can be greatly increased in yield if careful selections of seed is made and sown along this line. From the finest heads planted. The same is true of the cotton plant. One man will take from the gin any seed so that it is cotton. Another man goes through his field and notes the character of the plant and selects his seed from plants having the character he wants and that are prolific, and in a little while he has a cotton that beats his neighbors and it is named and sold. But the majority of those who buy seed go on getting seed of any sort from the gin, and in a little while the cotton has lost its original character except with the careful man who originated it. The same is true of corn. A careful breeder will get a distant strain and get good prices for his seed, and in a little while the general farmer who buys seed from him will be allowed to deteriorate simply because the farmers do not breed with the same ideal that the original breeder had. Most of the special strains of our garden vegetables have been formed by selection diligently practiced year after year until the new race is gotten so far away from the original stock that it deserves and receives a new name. The world is indebted to the specialist in plants for all the improvement that has been made in varieties. With most of our farm crops as much as with those of the neighborhood has the intelligent breeder of the seed of his money crop at least, and reap the substantial reward of his extra care.
