The Sea Island bank will move to their handsome new place on the corner this week. Manchester, Eng., March 8.—As regards consumption of and demand for sea island cotton in England the position of the trade is somewhat curious, for in contradiction to the almost unprecedented demand for cloth and yarn made from upland cotton, the spinners of sea island are in most cases unable to sell their production, except at prices which leave no profit. The demand is sluggish, and as generally occurs when a considerable decline takes place in cotton, the buyers of yarn and cloth want a corresponding, or even greater, reduction.

The bulk of the comparatively small import of sea island cotton to England this season shows a considerable loss to the buyers, who with the demand for yarn being slow and hardly taking up the production, are chary of buying even at present figures. The price of Jeonovich Egyptian (say 34d. for full, style) is very tempting to spinners, as they can use it in place of practically all Georgia under fancy, and the new crop of West Indian cotton now beginning to arrive will seriously compete with the Carolinas. Some 5,000 bales of West Indian will be marketed this season.

The planters of Georgia and Florida will do well to look after new seed. The cotton grown this season from new seed from the islands is the most satisfactory we have ever seen. There are many complaints of the quality of Georgia and Florida this season. Weakness of staple especially. This shows more in the yarn than in a finger test, thus it is imperative for planters to use new seed, otherwise they may find English spinners buying colonial cotton in preference.

It is understood that when the large thread makers placed orders some months ago, they did not buy anything like the quantity they usually buy, and possible attracted by the prices now current for sea island cotton, they may decide to place large contracts, if so, we may see considerable buying of cotton.

County Board Holds A Rousing Meeting.

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A BIG LION IS BROUGHT TO TOWN.

One of the biggest sensations that Statesboro has been treated to in many a day was the bringing in the city on Tuesday of a sure enough Bulloch county lion by Mr. D. T. Beasley, who lives in the lower part of the county near Pembroke.

The lion was dead, calm and cool, but the fact that he had been roaming the woods and swamps of Bulloch for such a length of time as no man could tell, was enough to cause the blood to run cold in the veins of the more timid of our population.

An account of the chase and killing of the lion is given in full in an article signed by Elder H. B. Wilkinson, which follows this. Mr. Wilkinson being one of the hunters' party and the man who fired the last shot, while Mr. Beasley took the first shot at his lionship as described in the article below. The hide was stuffed and was placed in one of the large show windows of The Simmons Company. It was the center of attraction, and had a circus struck the town it would not have caused a bigger commotion. The crowd swelled as the day wore on. While the animal had not been stuffed by professionals, yet the job was well enough performed that it was easy to tell the size and shape of the huge monster that had been feasting on the calves and pigs of that section for such a long time. We will not at all follow a description of it as all follow in Mr. Wilkinson's article.

Those who saw, and were experts on the animal kingdom, and there were many, a majority of them pronounced it a puma, or what is known as a Mexican lion. A rumor was circulated that a year or two ago an animal of this kind escaped from a show somewhere over on the Seaboard Air Line Ry. It is very probable that this is true, as it hardly is the product of our section.

The hide has been shipped to Savannah where a professional taxidermist has taken the job to stuff it in good shape. Mr. Beasley was warmly congratulated by his many friends on his good luck in bringing in his game and escaping the meshes of its terrible teeth and claws.

AN EARLY MORNING BLAZE.

Citizens Awakened at Early Hour Sunday Morning to Witness a Big Fire. Outland Building Guttled.

At twenty minutes past three Sunday morning there was an alarm of fire sounded and the fire rection was from the heart of the business section. When the scene was reached the store of Mr. P. Williams was found to be in flames. The flames were gushing through the windows near where he had his office about half way on the west side next to North Main street.

Some little confusion was experienced in getting the hose attached to the plugs, and when they were, there was a lack of leadership that caused delay which enabled the fire to gain much headway. About the time that the streams had begun to play on the fire it was learned that there was a lack of sufficient pressure from the reservoir and that the engine at the power house was not fired up, but with the limited pressure of water the boys began to check the flames on the west side. There was imminent danger that the block of wooden buildings to the north of the burning structure would catch; then it looked like we were going to see the adjoining brick buildings enveloped in flames, as the roof on the Brannen building was catching, but fortunately the pressure from the power house was turned on at this juncture and such streams of water was poured into the burning building that it looked almost equal to the task of flooding the

block off down stream. In five minutes after this the fire was under control and the crowd gave a whoop for the success of the Statesboro fire department.

As stated above, the fire was discovered by Night Marshal Mook in the office in Williams' store. Mr. Williams was at his boarding house at Col. Shookley's and did not know about the fire until eight o'clock next morning. He carried \$4000.00 insurance and claims a stock valued at \$9000.00. His store was completely gutted and very little was saved.

Dr. Samples occupied the offices in the north end of the building, separated from Williams only by a thin pine board wall; his fixtures and furniture were all saved but the goods were damaged by the handling and water. His X-Ray machine was fished through the rear window during the hardest fighting between water and fire seen here in a long time. Dr. Samples carried no insurance and will therefore have to stand his own loss, which will probably amount to two or three hundred dollars.
