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ALLEN OUT ON BOND

Little Girl That He Abused Has Been Called to a Better World

Our readers will remember the account of the arrest of John Allen in Tuesday's News. Since then he has given bond and been released from jail. The little girl, who, while on her dying bed was caught hold of and abused by him, has, too, been released—she was born on angel wings to a better world on Monday night. The interment was held at Bethlehem church cemetery on Tuesday afternoon.

When Allen reached home and was told of the little one's death, he broke down and wept like a child. His wife has left home in fear of his assaults being renewed, and we understand has filed suit for a divorce.

It is reported that on Sunday before leaving home, he demolished the furniture in the house and broke all the dishes on the place. It is also reported that some weeks ago, when his eldest son died, he sat on the side of the bed and wept the lifeless body lay, and refused to allow it dressed for burial for several hours. He would pray and curse at intervals, and it is said to have actually cursed God in his ravings over the misfortune that had struck his home.

He is a man of considerable means, owns two or three of the best farms around here, and after being out to jail, nearly three hundred dollars in cash was found secreted in his house, yet it is claimed that his family have continually suffered for food and clothing. He is reported to have compelled members of his family to go for weeks without even a pinch of salt in their bread.

This is the third time that his wife has quit him, and she may forgive him again, as a woman is prone to do. Yet the neighbors in the community have grown tired of his acts, and it is evident that he, is destined to be regulated this time in a manner that will do him good.

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A Cowardly Assault

Judging from the report of the Dublin newspapers, and those of Messrs. D. W. Davis and T. M. Bennett who were in Dublin at the time, the shooting of Mr. Carl Deal by Policeman Cowart of that city on Saturday evening, was one of the most uncalled for and cowardly assaults that we have heard of in some time.

It seems that there had been a dispute between another musical instrument and the keeper of one of Dublin's private boarding houses over a board bill. The man referred to got the officer and hunted up the two men, who, it seems, were sitting at the supper table together with a number of ladies and other members of the family at another boarding house, and the pair rushed in on the party and began firing at young Deal, wounding him in the leg. The ladies were very much frightened by the occurrence. It is said that young Deal is dangerously wounded and may die of his injuries.

He is remembered in Statesboro, where he and other members of his party stopped over for some time.

Cowart is also remembered by some of Statesboro's people who took in the big base ball excursion last summer was a year ago. He ran a twenty-five cent boarding house near the depot; his sign and price hanging over his door, but when a man went in and went through the grab game to get a mouthful to eat, he was charged fifty cents at the door as he came out. When called on for a reason for the raise in his rates as compared with his sign, he answered that there was a big crowd there and he could get any price he might charge; in other words, he was taking the advantage of the crowd to squeeze them for an extra quarter.

A man that will stoop to a mean trick like that for twenty-five cents can be depended upon to do any other kind of a mean dirty act. We notice that the city council of Dublin has stripped him of his brass buttons, and suspended him for his conduct. They are to be commended for this act.
