Baltic Fleet Sails Through Tight Place.

St. Petersburg, April 9.—2:40 A. M.—There was great rejoicing last night at the Admiralty, Yacht and other naval clubs over Vice Admiral Rojstrensky's having successfully navigated the gateway of the China sea without encountering the Japanese.

The admiralty realizes that Rojstrensky faces great odds owing to the immense superiority of the Japanese cruisers and torpedo boats, and reliance in his success is based upon seven battleships which he can oppose Togo's four, while it is thought unlikely that the Vladivostok squadron will attempt a junction with the Baltic fleet.

The danger of the fleet being beset by the warships of the deep in the narrow waters which divide the breastwork of islands of the Malay archipelago and the possible damage to the big ships, so precious in the coming encounter with Vice Admiral Togo's fleet, was so great that some of the naval experts actually favored a route around Australia.

The credit for the strategem by which the feat was accomplished, the Associated Press learns, belongs solely to Vice Admiral Rojstrensky, who accurately judged that as the Malacca straits was the most practicable as well as the most direct route, the Japanese would calculate that he would not dare try to force a passage there. Besides this, Rojstrensky planned a strategem to deceive the Japanese, with the secret of which only two men in St. Petersburg were entrusted, by directing the Russian admiralty to follow the collars which were to follow him in rendezvous in Sunda strait, 500 miles southward of Singapore, feeling sure that the Japanese intelligence department would be equal, as it probably was, to the task of ascertaining the destination of Rojstrensky, and thereby not only throw the Japanese off the scent, but officially deceived his own admiralty, where the news of the fleet having passed Singapore probably created quite as much surprise as it did in the marine department at Tokio.

Several colliers were actually dispatched to the rendezvous and many already fallen into the hands of the Japanese; but Rojstrensky deliberately sacrificed them as pawns in a bigger game. That the ruse worked is apparent from the fact that Rojstrensky did not meet a single Japanese ship in the passage of straits of Malacca, while dispatches from Batavia tell of Sunda, Bali, Lombok, Flores and other straits to the southward being crowded with Japanese torpedo boats guarding the passages. MURDER IN SCREVEN COUNTY

Mr. M. L. Parker, a Prominent Farmer and Merchant, Shot from Ambush--Bud Sasser Arrested

Sylvania, Ga., April 10.—M. L. Parker, of Olney, Ga., was shot and almost instantly killed last night about 11 o'clock. He lived only about two hours. His wife and two small children were in the room when the tragedy occurred, but the person doing the shooting was not seen by them.

Mr. Parker was preparing to retire when without any warning, the murderer fired a load of buck shot through the window penetrating Mr. Parker in the hips. The doctor came a few minutes before he died but could render no aid.

The family are at a loss to know who committed the deed, as he was on friendly terms with everybody in the community. Mr. Parker was a large planter, and also a merchant. He had just come from his store, and was getting ready to retire when he was shot.

His relatives and friends will use every effort in their power to apprehend the guilty party, but at this time no particular person is suspected.

We understand that Bud Sasser, a well known white man, has been arrested charged with the crime. Sasser, it is said, had been working for Mr. Parker, and they had had some trouble of a domestic nature. A son of Parker was visiting in Statesboro when he got the news of the tragedy.

This bids fair to become one of the biggest murder trials Scriven has had in a long time.

On Sunday morning, Wash realized that he was soon to get tangled in the meshes of the law, repaired over to the colored church and laid himself close up to the altar, something the colored brethren say he hadn't been accustomed to do.

He was arrested a few days ago and lodged in jail, where he is charged with the crime of arson, which is punishable the same as murder, when the building set on fire endangers the lives of human beings.

Wash is a well known character both around Statesboro and Blitch. He served a term in Sing Sing for perjury, sent up from the United States court in Savannah, a few years ago.

TOWN COUNCIL AFTER THEM.

City Solers Pass Ordinance Making It a Misdemeanor to Waste Water.

Other Regulations Will Be Made.

At the council meeting Tuesday night an ordinance was passed protecting the town and the tax payers from the wilful water wasters.

The authorities had found out that some of the citizens were very careless with the water furnished by the town at a low rate, some of them were in the habit of letting their pipes run almost all the time, and many thousands of gallons were lost daily. They have made it a misdemeanor to waste water and reserve the right to take water away from people who persist in wasting it. You must keep your pipes closed, and you are not allowed to use it in your garden or lawn except one hour in the morning and one hour in the evening, between six-thirty and seven-thirty o'clock. This is done so as to have water in the tank in the event of a fire at night.

Another nuisance has grown up to the annoyance of the town authorities and that is people who persist in borrowing their neighbor's water all the time. The town is ready to furnish water at a low rate to everybody, but it don't like to sell water to one man in a section and then allow everybody around to get water free.

The town will soon have fire apparatus, and it is the duty of every citizen to aid the authorities in protecting and helping along the water system and not to impose on it. It is said that a one-half inch pipe will discharge over seventy thousand gallons of water in twenty-four hours—more than our tank holds—so you see how it can be wasted.

Another thing along this line is the habit some people have of allowing the water to create quarries and wet places on their premises, and on their neighbor's premises. Any doctor will tell you that a wet quagmire is a breeding place for fever and mosquitoes, and the town is going to stop that kind of business. People who live in a town must always remember that they have no rights except such as do not affect the rights of others, and that it is the duty of each one to protect the public property.

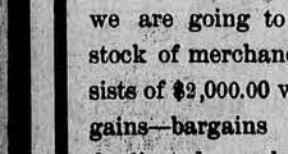

Daniel R. Groover Joins the Silent Majority.

After an illness of only a few days, Col. D. R. Groover died at his home in Statesboro on Saturday last. He had been ill only a few days and it was not until Friday evening that his family and friends became alarmed at his condition. He had started to some of his friends that he expected to die, and he had only recently gotten out of bed from the effects of a carbuncle, which had depleted his constitution. At midnight his heart ceased to beat, and his soul passed from time to an unbounded eternity. When the final moment came he was surrounded by family and friends.

Colonel Groover was born in Bulloch county fifty-four years ago, and had spent his life in the town and county he loved so well. He was the oldest and one of the leading lawyers of the county, and had been an active factor in the progress and development of his town and section.

He had the happy faculty of making friends, and his taking off will be deplored by those whom he had known for years, and who knew him as a candid honest man. He was the pastor of the Statesboro bar, and had long enjoyed a large practice as a member of the firm of Groover & Johnston, and in addition was the president of the Bank of Statesboro, and interested in other enterprises. He married Miss Lula Rawls, who with four children survive him. They are Miss Annie, Daniel R. Jr., George and Frank, all about grown.

Several brothers and sisters, most of whom were at the funeral, survive him, among them being, Mr. Samuel C. Groover, Mrs. Elias Lee, Mrs. Jose Brannen, Mrs. James H. Blitch, Mrs. W. H. Couse, Ben Groover, and others.

Appropriate and simple funeral ceremonies conducted by Rev. G. N. MacDonell of the Methodist church, and Rev. J. S. McMore of the Baptist church took place at his late residence at eleven o'clock yesterday, and his body was conveyed to East Side cemetery and there deposited in another earth where sleep the silent majority.

The pall bearers were selected from among the older lawyers, and they were Messrs. John F. Brannen, Samuel L. Moore, H. B. Strange, A. M. Deal, R. Lee Moore, and J. A. Brannen.

A large crowd of friends and relatives attended the exercises at the house and cemetery, several from Savannah and other places being present.

Cold Wave Damages the Early Vegetables.

The cold wave which set in on Sunday morning has done considerable damage to early vegetables and melons in this section. While none of the crops are reported as killed throughout, yet the leaves of beans and potatoes are pretty well bitten; especially so where they were planted on new land. From the best reports we can get from the melon section along the line of the Savannah & Statesboro Ry., the young vines escaped the cold Sunday night, and what happened to them last night can not be ascertained yet. The cold weather will serve to throw all vegetables and melons nearly a week later than they would have been had the weather continued favorable.

The reports from other sections are to the effect that snow was falling in North Carolina and that the vegetable fields around Charleston had suffered materially.

Russia Expects Togo Will Be Annihilated.

St. Petersburg, April 15.—11:20 p. m.—The week closes with the government's eyes and hopes centered on Vice Admiral Rojensky and gradually something like grave enthusiasm has been aroused by the Russian admiral's hardihood in sailing straight for a combat with the Japanese.

There are many naval officers who do not believe that Vice admiral Togo will accept this challenge. In their opinion the Japanese will be too prudent in such a crisis to risk the destruction of their fleet. They believe that Togo's tactics will be to avoid an open sea fight and that he will launch a series of desperate night torpedo attacks in the hope of throwing the Russian fleet into confusion, scattering the line of ships and giving his faster battleships and cruisers an opportunity to surround and destroy them individually and if some of Rojensky's ships escape to Vladivostok to bottle them up there.

For the moment the conservative councils of the peace party, which offers reassurance that the military situation will be utterly hopeless if Rojensky's fleet is completely destroyed and considered it best to open negotiations before the issue is put to a test, are rudely thrust aside. The admiralty clamors for a chance to retrieve its reputation and the war party generally seems to be convinced that the emperor's position will not be worse if the battle is lost while the destruction of Togo's fleet would spell ruin for Japan. The emperor himself it is understood, expresses great confidence in victory and should victory come he will undoubtedly fix the imperial seal to the big naval program prepared by the admiralty.

North Fleets Not Located. London, April 17.—There is as yet no news of a naval battle in the far east, or of the whereabouts of the rival fleets.

The Hong Kong correspondent of the Daily Mail sends a rumor of a small engagement, but there is no confirmation of this report. Details regarding the Russian ships in Kamranh bay Cochin China, are too meager to be instructive. According to the Daily Mail's Singapore correspondent, the North German Lloyd steamer Prinz Heinrich saw five battleships and six cruisers in the bay, but the dispatches to other London morning papers are not so precise.

The presence of the Russian squadron off the Annam coast is raising keen interest here, in view of the possibility of their infringing Chinese neutrality and of the likelihood of Rojensky's having had to split his squadron.

Mr. Ellarben Daugherty, one of the hunting farmers of the Port neighborhood, was in town on Saturday and brought in a 88 pound ham. He also paid his respect to the News by setting up the date of his subscription another year. The ham he brought in will be one of the attractions in the Bulloch county exhibit at the state fair this fall.

May Fight Near the Pescadores.

St. Petersburg, April 17.—No information from Vice Admiral Rojensky's squadron, but the admiralty would not be surprised to learn of skirmishing between scout ships today or tomorrow, and the inauguration of torpedo boat warfare is not unexpected.

The naval organ here expresses the opinion that Togo was taken completely by surprise when Rojensky suddenly appeared at the entrance of the China sea and is now concentrating his widely scattered fleet near the Pescadores where it is believed a sea fight properly will occur.
