SUNDAY SCHOOLS HAVE BIG DAY.

Large Crowd Out to Attend the Annual Convention On Wednesday.

On Wednesday Statesboro was filled with a crowd of at least three thousand people who came to attend the annual meeting of the Bulloch County Sunday School Convention.

Dr. John I. Lane, marshal of the day, formed the different schools in line in front of the court house, and the long string of little ones marching down West Main street to Brannen Park was a scene that made a magnificent showing for the Sunday schools of Bulloch county. President Booth of the association had active charge of carrying out the program, which was carried out to the very letter.

The address of welcome was delivered by Rev. S. W. DuBoise of the Statesboro Presbyterian church, following was an eloquent address by Dr. S. R. Belk, of Augusta, which was pronounced the best that had ever been delivered in Statesboro. Dr. Belk had the close attention of the large crowd from first to last, and all classes were loud in complimenting his address as the best they ever heard.

At noon a bountiful repast was spread under the shade of the black gum grove, and all were fed as long as they would eat. Immediately after the noon hour the election of officers for another year was held, and the following officers were elected:

W. C. Parker, President; W. A. Hodges, second, vice-president; Hinton Booth, Secretary; John I. Lane, marshal of the day.

Mr. Editor:
If you will allow me space I will say a few words on the road question.

First, I will say this new road law is a humbug.

Why? Because every person that is liable to road duty has been taxed for the purpose of keeping up the roads, and everywhere we see or hear from there is nothing done.

What is the matter?
The county has bought twenty-head of mules for this purpose and nothing done—that cost somewhere from \$4,000 to \$5,000 and our roads unworked. We are paying a man \$40 a month to oversee the changing. What are they doing, cutting more public roads?

We have more roads now than will ever be worked at the rate things are moving at present. We are paying men in each district \$1 per day and a mule furnished him to ride around and collect that \$1.50 twice a year, with the promise: "We are going to work right away," and that is the last we see or hear of him until next pay day, and then it is the same old thing and nothing done.

There is something wrong somewhere, and badly wrong. The people are getting tired of paying these three dollars a year and no work done.

Will some gentleman who is in position to know tell us where the money is that has been paid to these overseers for the purpose of working the roads? Turn on the light brother and let us know if you intend to work or not. If you don't owe \$8 fellows you will have to for it is needed and needed bad.

Young Brannen is guarded during the day by a special deputy and looked up at night. After the preliminary, if he is committed, Brannen will probably ask the judge of the superior court to allow bail.
