### Jim Crow Cars

Republicans say the South-Townsend Bill will abolish them.

The Macon Telegraph, The Mail-Telegram of Fort Worth, Texas, and other representative southern newspapers have found a sure enough "nigger" in the "woodpile."

Former United States Senator Candler of New Hampshire, favors national control of the railroad because it would abolish Jim Crow cars in the south.

Under the South-Townsend Bill, it becomes a law, a negro man can go on any car on any interstate train and take a seat with any passenger, a white lady or a white man. He could do it on trains between Atlanta and Birmingham, Atlanta and Chattanooga, Savannah or Macon and Jacksonville, Americus and Montgomery and so on.

Walker D. Hines of Kentucky and other able lawyers say that Senator Candler is certainly right in his construction of the law and that national control of the railroads will do away with separate cars on interstate trains.

Some of the papers are calling the attention of their congressmen to this feature.

### Some Facts About Yellow Fever.

An acute specific disease.

Restricted to certain geographical limits.

Characterized by a high fever of short duration, gastro-intestinal disturbances, hemorrhages into the skin and mucous membranes, and a yellow tint of the skin.

First definitely recognized in the West Indies in 1647. It is infectious.

Prevails in the West Indies, west coast of Africa, Central America and southward along both coasts of South America and northward to the South Atlantic and Gulf states.

It has been brought to North Atlantic seaports by vessels. The mosquito is blamed for the spread of the disease.

Prost stops yellow fever. Survivors of one attack of yellow fever become immune from further attacks.

The yellow fever germ has not yet been discovered. Yellow fever develops usually from three to four days after infection. Sometimes it takes seven days.

The attack comes on with severe chills or rigor, when it comes suddenly. It may come on more gradually with languor, headache and malaria symptoms. The temperature goes to 105 degrees, sometimes higher. The fever lasts from three to five days, attended with pain in the back, limbs and head. There is nausea and vomiting.

The yellow tint of the skin, from which the fever gets its name, begins on the second or third day.

In severe cases small hemorrhages take place into the skin and mucous membrane. The vomit is at first white. Later it becomes very dark and in appearance like coffee grounds, when it is known as "black vomit." There is bleeding at the nose, mouth and gums. Delirium usually follows, then unconsciousness and death.

Heat, moisture, bad drainage, uncleanliness and unhygienic conditions favor the disease, but the mosquito is most of all responsible.

Experts seem to agree that the first step to combat the spread of the fever is to attack the mosquito.

Complete rest and careful dieting constitute the principal treatment for yellow fever. Different drugs are used to help assist the body and organs toward a natural condition.

### Relentless Are the

#### Jap Demands.

Portsmouth, Aug. 14.—The plenipotentiaries began their session at 9:30. The excessive heat wave which had almost driven the foreigners to distraction, is broken, and after a good night's rest the plenipotentiaries appeared bright and cheerful.

The discussion of conditions relating to the status of Korea, was resumed. Witte continued to urge that the language of the clause should explicitly show what he contended was true of the Japanese intention regarding the hermit kingdom—namely to make it a province of Japan.

It is evident that if there is to be a rupture as has been informed people believe there will be, each side will maneuver to place the responsibility on the other. It will be several days at the present rate of progress before either of the crucial points of difference are reached. The exact order of conditions is not known, but it is practically certain that the demand for reimbursement of expenses of the war precedes that for the cession of Sakhalin. Relentless method is behind the Japanese system in the peace negotiations as in their military and naval operations.

An official communication issued at 1:30, says that article first was disposed of and the plenipotentiaries proceeded with discussion of article two. The meeting adjourned at one o'clock, to be resumed at three. It is not stated what article one consists of, but it is understood to be Korea.

Article one as agreed to was modified to nearer meet the wishes of the Russians, but to what extent cannot be definitely stated. M. Witte had insisted that Japan's purpose was to make a dependency of Korea, and he wanted the language at least to show that Japan intended to establish a protectorate over Korea.

Jacob Schiff, of Kuhn, Loeb & Co., Oscar Strauss and Isaac Seligman, will arrive this afternoon for an interview already arranged with Witte, on the Jewish question in Russia. It is authoritatively stated that there is no question of a Russian loan involved.

Come to Agreement.

The three "articles," as they are officially designated in the brief communications, authorized to be given to the press, are, in substance, as follows: "First—Russia's recognition of Japan's 'preponderant influence' and special position in Korea, which Russia henceforth agrees is outside of her sphere of influence, Japan binding herself to recognize the suzerainty of the reigning family, but with the right to give advice and aid to assist in the improvement of the administration of the empire."

"Second—Mutual obligation to evacuate Manchuria, each to surrender all special privileges in that province, maintaining the status quo, and to maintain the principle of equal opportunity for the commerce and industry of all nations in that province (open door)."

"Third—The cession to China of the Chinese Eastern railroad from Harbin southward." There was never any question about the acceptance on the part of Mr. Witte of these articles, the first two (crying in more emphatic form the contents of Japan in the diplomatic struggle which preceded hostilities. The third is a natural consequence of the result of war. The cession of the railroad, the building of which cost Russia an immense sum, estimated by some at between \$100,000,000 and \$200,000,000, is to China. Japan and China, therefore, will arrange between themselves the method by which the former is to be remunerated, and through this financial operation, Japan might have a very considerable portion of her claim for the "expenses of the war" liquidated. The railroad is ostensibly the property of the Russo-Chinese bank, although built by government money advanced through the bank, and since its completion, operated, managed and policed by the Russian government.

## PETERS SUSPENDED

Vice-President of Cotton Association Asked to Resign.

**ACTION TAKEN BY JORDAN**  
Charge Made That Vice President Has Been Working Against Association—Action Approved by Majority of the Directors.

President Jordan of the Southern Cotton Association has demanded the resignation of E. S. Peters, vice president of the association. The action of President Jordan meets with the approval of the executive committee of the association, he having consulted the members of the committee by wire before taking action. After hearing from 17 members of the committee President Jordan telegraphed Vice President Peters a Washington demanding his resignation and suspending him as an officer of the association. The action of the president is based upon certain utterances made by Col. Peters at Washington July 31, and his actions there since that time, where he has since remained. President Jordan demands that Col. Peters' statements and actions clearly indicate that he is not in harmony with the president and Secretary Chamberlain in their efforts to push the investigation of the bureau of cotton statistics, not in harmony with the views of the members of the Southern Cotton Association. It is also charged that he is a partisan of Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, whom he openly defies.

**OIL RATES MADE UNIFORM.**  
Sop is Handed Out to Standard Oil by Railroads. Sweeping reductions on northbound freight rates on petroleum products so as to make the tariff northbound and southbound uniform, especially noteworthy in view of recent charges of a combination between railroads and the Standard Oil company for exacting higher rates northbound, were announced in new schedules filed at Washington Friday by the Illinois Central and Louisville and Nashville railroads. The reductions are: From New Orleans to Chicago, from 41 cents a hundred pounds to 23 cents; to St. Louis, from 35 cents to 18 cents; to Cincinnati, from 35 cents to 22 cents; and to Louisville, from 35 cents to 18 cents.

The charges of combination were made in a complaint recently filed by the Gulf Refining company of Port Arthur, Texas, which alleged that it permitted the Standard Oil company's producers to enter territory in the south. ## IF ROOSEVELT FAILS

### PEACE PLANS ARE OFF.

Tokio, Aug. 19.—6:30 p. m.—It is confidently believed here that the peace conference at Portsmouth, N. H., will result in a rupture, but this news was calmly received.

The weight of popular belief seems to anticipate and be reconciled to the failure of the peace negotiations at Portsmouth. The Japanese have resolutely supported the demand relative to reimbursement for the expenditure of the war and the cession of Sakhalin island, and evidently prefer a continuance of the struggle to the acceptance of lesser terms. The press and others are urging that Manchuria and Vladivostok should be vigorously pressed and also the seizure of Russia's possession on the Pacific coast.

The rains have ceased and fighting in Manchuria country soon will be possible. Tokio continues exceedingly quiet and calm. The market is showing some weakness, but the declines are slight.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 19.—President Roosevelt has stepped into the breach and is making a last desperate effort to save the peace conference from shipwreck. That, in a sentence, is believed to be the situation this morning.

Just what the president is doing has not transpired, but it is regarded as certain that he has appealed both to Tokio and St. Petersburg to induce the warring countries to show a spirit of concession and not allow the conference to go onto the rocks next Tuesday.

Mr. Griscom and Mr. Meyer may have been instructed to make direct appeals to the emperors of the

two countries. If the co-operation of France and England, the allies of the respective belligerents is secured something may be accomplished.

"Russia will not pay a copeck of tribute," is the language of Mr. Witte.

That is believed to be Russia's last word on that question. The question of the cession of Sakhalin may be arranged. But unless Japan relinquishes her claim for the cost of war hope is gone. It is at Tokio, consequently, that the peace will probably be decided. France, it is certain, will support the president's efforts. If England will now bring pressure to bear, as it is definitely stated she is preparing to do, the situation may be saved.

Mrs. Roxie Alderman Goes to Her Ward

On Friday morning last at her home about 7 miles west of Statesboro Mrs. Roxie Alderman breathed her last. The deceased had been ill for several months and death came as a relief to her sufferings. The remains were interred in the family burial ground near the home on Saturday morning. She leaves many friends and relatives to mourn her loss.

Carried to Ashlyn.

On Saturday Sheriff Kendrick and Dr. Temples went up to Milledgeville to accompany Mrs. O. N. Marsh to the asylum. Mr. Marsh has had the misfortune to lose her reason and has been adjudged insane. It is hoped by her many friends that she will soon be restored and able to return.

### Fever Hidden in Mississippi.

New Orleans, August 17.—The announcement of the discovery of nine cases of fever at Mississippi City, within three miles of Gulfport, the terminus of the Gulf and Ship Island road, and the fact that the fever has been in existence there since before July 20th, when announcements were made here, is expected to set on foot some of the severe criticism of the Mississippi answer to New Orleans for failing to find the local infection earlier.

The family in which the fever first appeared at Mississippi City is that of Major Gee, of Carrollton, Miss., who stopped a week in New Orleans, on their way to Mississippi City, where they arrived on July 20th. Only one of the cases is seriously ill.

Troops have a drawn cordon around the infected section.

### Rural Carriers to Have Big Time.

The rural carriers of the First congressional district will hold a convention at Statesboro on Monday Sept. 4. It is the intention of the local carriers to have a big time of it. Both Coles R. Lee Moore and A. M. Deal have accepted invitations to deliver addresses before the meeting. Hon. Alf. Herrington has also been invited to speak and will probably be here.

A business meeting will be held at eleven o'clock in the court house after which the speaking and other exercises will be held in Brannens park.

A basket dinner will be spread for the visitors. It is expected that visitors from all parts of the First congressional district will be here. The patrons of the mail routes are also invited to come out and take a hand in the meeting.
