Typhoid is a disease to be dreaded far more than yellow fever yet it does not inspire the same terror among the people. If New Orleans had today 5,000 cases of typhoid fever and a death rate of 800 a day nothing would be thought of it; there would be no disturbance of business no quarantines and no fear anywhere.

Cotton Crop Off

Atlanta, Sept. 2.—According to the August crop report given out today by the state department of agriculture, and made up from data filed by nearly 1,000 correspondents in all parts of the state, on an average date of August 30, there has been a considerable falling off in the average of most of the Georgia crops.

The most interesting feature of the report is showing made with regard to cotton. Georgia's crop last year was more than 2,000,000 bales. The average Georgia cotton crop for the last five years is 1,528,000 bales. The report this year shows that the crop will be slightly less than 75 per cent of the average, or about 1,150,000 bales.

In other words the Georgia cotton crop this year, as compared with that of 1904 is cut just about one-half in two.

The heavy and continuous rains, followed by the two weeks' drought caused serious damage to the cotton crop in the way of rust, black root, shedding, etc. Some farmers complain also of the destruction of squares and bolls by insects. Owing to the weather conditions the crops became very grassy, which prevented their proper working.

**SOME FACTS AND FIGURES ON THE LAST ELECTION FOR CONGRESS.**

There were 10 counties in the first district to-wit: Bryan, Bulloch, Burke, Chatham, Effingham, Emanuel, Liberty, McIntosh, Screven and Tattnal. Two new counties have been added by the creation of Jenkins and Toombs.

In the last primary about ten thousand votes were cast in the counties outside of Chatham, and of these Mr. Lester received about four thousand, while Mr. Brannen

## received about six thousand.

The counties carried by Mr. Lester had in round numbers about forty eight thousand white people, and this includes Chatham; and the counties carried by Mr. Brannen had in round numbers about forty six thousand white people.

Mr. Brannen lost Bryan by twenty six votes and Liberty by one hundred and fifty. A change of fourteen votes in Bryan county would have made the convention a tie. The last time the congressional convention had thirty two delegates where as the next time there will be thirty six delegates, as Jenkins will have two, and Toombs two.

There are twice as many delegates as there are representatives in the legislature, and under this arrangement, the list stands: Bryan, two; Bulloch, four; Burke, four; Chatham, six; Effingham, two; Emanuel, four; Liberty, two; McIntosh, two; Screven, two; Tattnal, four; Toombs, two; Jenkins, two. It will take a majority of the delegates to nominate.

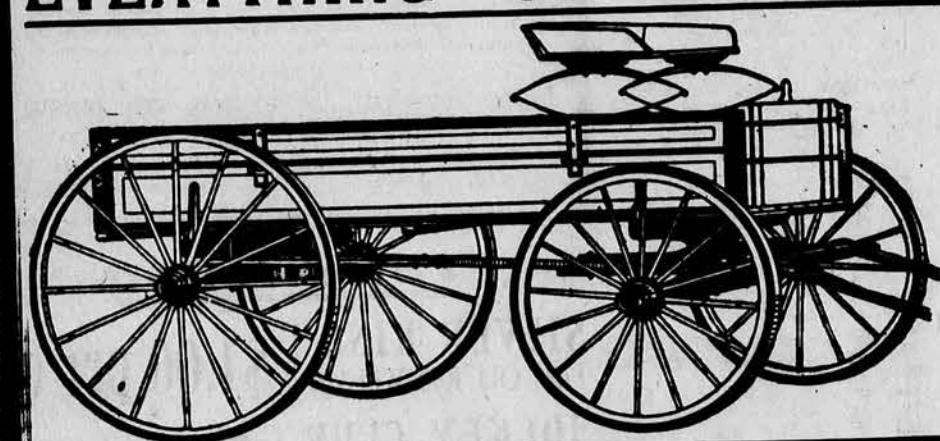

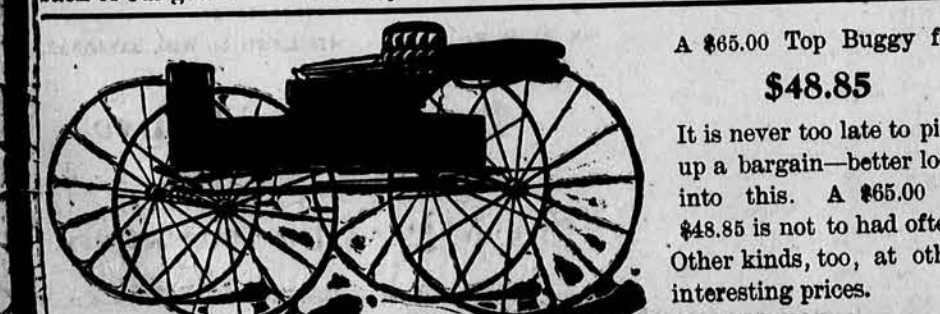
