### APOLOGY

### Mr. Blitch Sold Place.

Mr. W. Homer Blitch who has resided at his place near Ogeechee for about thirty years, has sold his place consisting of over a thousand acres to Mr. E. B. Lane of Savannah county.

It is probable that Mr. Blitch will move to Statesboro with his family, while Mr. Lane may move to his place.

Mr. Blitch is the oldest merchant in the county, and one of the largest farmers.

### Change in Time

Statesboro will change from sun time to railroad time on October 15. The county board made the change at their meeting held on Tuesday, at the request of the business people who were troubled with the two times in use. The difference is thirty-six minutes between railroad and sun time, and the court house clock will be set back thirty-six minutes. This will stop the confusion of time, and we will have the same time that has been adopted over the state.

### Eleven Cents is Asked for Cotton

Union, S. C. Sept. 18.—The cotton growers of Union county hereby pledge to hold our cotton for 11 cents per pound in order to support and stand to the minimum price of cotton that was made by the Southern Association at the Asheville meeting, September 6th. This is the resolution adopted at an enthusiastic meeting here today by a vote of 68 to one.

A committee from each township was appointed to collect from each member three cents per bale to provide funds for strengthening the whole organization. The cotton mills here have agreed to store cotton at 15 cents per bale on certain conditions, but conditions were not announced. Advice just received by the Union Cotton Exchange say that Spartanburg, Laurens, York, Fairfield counties today adopted the same measure.

### Mrs. Reiser McCran Dies in Atlanta.

The body of Mrs. Reiser McCran, who died in the hospital in Atlanta Wednesday, was interred at the cemetery here on yesterday morning, together with her was buried an infant boy, whose birth was only a few days ago.

Mrs. McCran was Miss Bennie Wilson, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Moses Wilson living in this county near Dover. The young couple married last October and have been living in Macon since that time.

### Opening of Metter High School.

The Metter high school began its year's work last Monday morning with appropriate exercises and with exceedingly flattering prospects. At the ringing of the bell about fifty pupils took their seats. Rev. J. W. Witherington, pastor of the Baptist church, began the exercises by reading a scripture lesson and a brief admonition to parents and teachers, after which he offered a petition for God's blessings upon the school.

Dr. A. H. Stapler then addressed the school as chairman of the board of trustees. He made a short, earnest speech, earnestly requesting the co-operation of the patrons with the trustees and teachers. His central theme was the election to be held on October 21, for the purpose of levying a special tax to operate an absolutely free school.

Dr. J. C. Solomon, of Atlanta, was then introduced by Prof. Etheridge and made a very forcible and eloquent lecture. Those present can testify to their entertainment and edification while listening to this soul-filling address by one of Georgia's greatest sons. The sentiments he expressed were high and noble, containing an earnest appeal for the betterment of the educational facilities of Metter. He called upon the patrons of the school to view their almost dilapidated old school house as a monument of their indifference to the sacred cause of education. This fact was made more impressive when he emphasized the probability that he was positively talking to a future governor of Georgia or a "Gennie Lind."

Prof. Etheridge, in a short talk, assured those present that they would find him in the future as they found him in the past.

The trustees were fortunate in securing the services of their last year's teachers—Prof. Hamlin Etheridge, as principal, of Johnston, S. C., and Misses Isabel Hollingsworth and Pauline Hart as assistants, with a music teacher to be elected.

It is probable that a business department will be added in which will be taught stenography, bookkeeping and typewriting. We believe the people of Metter are now ready to get out of the dust and get on pace with the times.

Last year was pronounced the best in the history of the school, but we predict that this year will surpass the highest realizations of last year.

Besides the regular students the following boarding students are enrolled: Messrs. Cecil Brannen, Bobbie Watson and Misses Lottie Parish and Sallie Mae Roberts. It is remarkable to note the good feeling existing between the pupils and teachers.

Alyceum course has been arranged for. The first attraction will be Sept. 29, at which time Miss Annie Blalock, a well known lecturer and entertainer, will lecture in the school house. It is hoped that the people generally of Metter will liberally patronize this course. Special rates have been asked for the pupils of school.

### Look Out for Glanders.

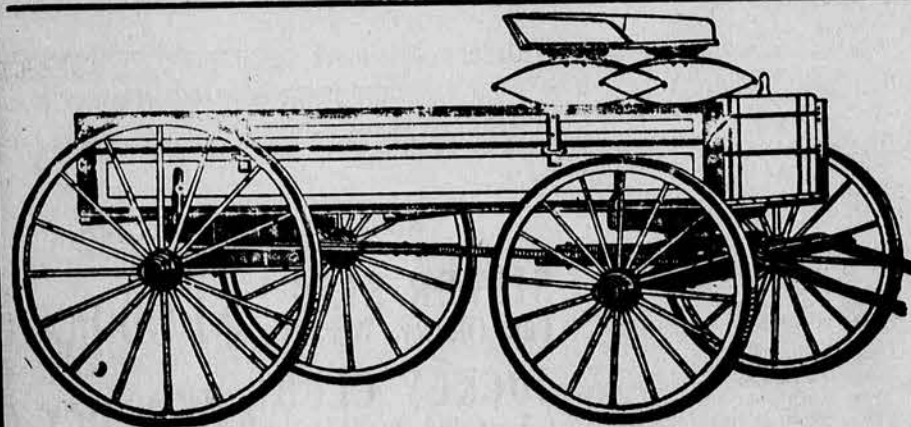

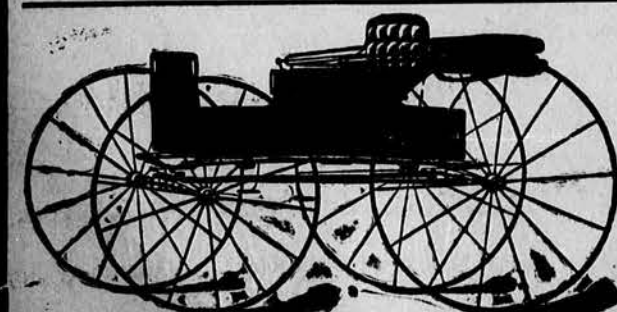

Within the span of five years the Panama Canal will be dug, is the estimate of Theodore P. Shonts, Chairman of the Isthmian Canal Commission.

What people will do to get their names in print is only less surprising than what they will do to keep their names out of print, observes Harper's Weekly.

This country has ever depended on the intelligence and patriotism of its citizen soldiery, says the Baltimore Herald. It was found that experience in campaigning can be readily secured. It is likely to continue to rely principally on the forces mobilized from its men in civil life.

In the picturesque old days of naval warfare, when battles were fought between seventy-four gun battle-ships under sail, when the mainbrace was applied and obstreperous tars were keelhaunched, the crew going into action often had gunpowder mixed with its rations. That was supposed to put fighting blood into the jacksies, says the New York American. Gone has that pleasing superstition, along with much of the picturesque of the old navy. But it seems that now the navy burns almost as much gunpowder in starting out a peace conference as it used in winning a battle.

Many of our people think of China as a land of ignorant coolies who are so inferior to ourselves as to rise scarcely to the plane of human beings. The fact is that China contains a greater number of educated and cultivated people than any other country in the world, asserts the Review of Reviews. Their culture is not like ours, but it is based upon long study of literature, ethics and philosophy, and it has been transmitted through many generations. The Chinese have not yet learned how to act together; otherwise we should never have dared to treat them recklessly and unfairly.

A Montreal paper assumes, with what seems to be fair justification, that the next Canadian census in 1911, will show a population of 7,000,000, or practically that of the United States. In 1811, states the New York Sun, this recital that Canada will be the twentieth century what the United States was to the nineteenth. Beginning with about 7,000,000 people in 1810, our own population increased 24,000,000 during the next fifty years. Even if Canada grows in the next half century with only a half that rapidity, its population in 1960 will be 20,000,000.

Englishmen looking for the germ of their national pride with bat and ball trace back to the thirteenth century, recalls the New York World. The name of cricket was first applied about the year 1550. Under Edward IV. sport was put under the ban as being detrimental to the practice of archery, which was important to the nation's defense. In 1748 the Court of King's Bench held that it was "a very manly game, not made in itself but only in the ill use made of it by getting more than ten pounds on it." Judged by American baseball standards, cricket is a game with a fatal slowness in it. So much weight of history has per haps made it so.

In a recent address before the Southern Union of Scientific Societies at Reigate, England, Professor Petrie, of University College, London, remarked that about half of all the energies of the nation was used up in the replacement of the present generation by its successor. The first and most obvious bearing of this expenditure was that the more it could be reduced in quantity and increased in quality, the better for all. The death rate has been steadily reduced by civilization. Probably the sanitary progress had halved the death rate and doubled the average length of life. That did not mean that on human replacement was spent only half of what was spent before, but that it was possible to spend twice as much on the better quality of the life, health and training of each generation. The unhealthy towns in the kingdom were wasting life a quarter more than London, or wasting one eighth of their whole income in needless loss. To put an extra tax on all incomes in the Liverpool of 2s. 6d. per pound, in order to bring its mortality down to that of London, would be true reform.

## FLAMES DOOM SEVEN.

Mysterious Explosion and a Resultant Fire in Big Factory Deals Death and Destruction.

The explosion of a fuse followed by a fire in a building of the Cummins Fuse company at Avon, Conn., Friday afternoon, caused a panic among twenty employees in the building and resulted in the death of seven and injuries that doubtless will prove fatal to several others.

There was no way of coping with the flames, which soon spread rapidly, and in less than an hour after the explosion occurred those who were unable to escape were buried in the flames. The exact cause of the fatal accident may never be known, but it is the accepted theory that in an effort to burn out a stoppage in one of the machines, a workman caused an explosion of a fuse with the hot iron held in his hand.

Those who were in the room where the explosion occurred say that the explosion was not severe and that it did not have caused a panic. Inflammable material, however, was set on fire and in a few moments the room was a mass of flames. In an instant there was a mass of flames for doors and windows, and during the scramble many were pushed back into the building while others were severely burned.

### INSTRUCTIONS OF GOVERNOR.

Georgia Chief Executive Backs Up Officers of State Health Board. Governor Terrell is backing up the action of the Georgia state board of health in enforcing state quarantine against yellow fever territory.

The governor has addressed to each of the quarantine inspectors appointed by the state board of health a letter directing them to follow in every particular the instructions given them by the state board of health and to permit no interference with their duties from any source.

In addition to the foregoing action, the state board of health Friday issued its third order, directing that the credentials of the state quarantine inspectors must be honored in the state, and as far outside the state as it is necessary for them to travel. If this is not done their trains will be stopped for inspection at the state line. The new order reads as follows:

"Order No. 3—September 14, 1905. It is hereby ordered by the Georgia state board of health that all railroads, steamboat lines and sleeping car companies operating in Georgia be notified that after this date the commissions of health officers of the state board of health must be honored for transportation anywhere within the state of Georgia, and as far out as the adjoining states may be by them be deemed necessary for proper inspection. Failure of any company or companies to comply with this order will immediately necessitate the stopping and detention for examination at the state border of all trains, steamboats or sleeping cars belonging to such company or companies."

## GEORGIA NEWS

### Epitomized Items of Interest Gathered at Random.

**Premiums for School Exhibits.**  
State Superintendent of Schools Merritt has sent out a letter to County School Commissioners naming the premium lists which are offered by the state fair for the best exhibits of school work.

**Simmons Will Filed.**  
The will of the late Chief Justice T. J. Simmons has been filed for probate in Atlanta. It is understood that the estate left by the distinguished jurist amounts to about \$18,000, which under the terms of the will, is to be equally divided among his widow and three children.

**Orders Issued to Railroads.**  
Railroad and steamboat companies operating in Georgia have been notified by the state board of health that tickets cannot be sold to points in the state from territory infected by yellow fever except to passengers holding properly issued health certificates.

**Johnson Appeals to Growers.**  
M. L. Johnson, president of the Georgia division of the Southern Cotton Association, has issued a strong statement, urging the cotton growers of Georgia to hold their cotton for the minimum price fixed by the association. He also appeals to organized counties to join the movement and not let it be said of them that they have reaped the benefits without doing their part of the work.

**Colonel Smith Enters Race.**  
About 1,200 people crowded into the court house at Elberton to hear Colonel James M. Smith of Oglethorpe, open his campaign for governor.

**Rawlings Trial Raises Rate.**  
The county commissioners of Lowndes have fixed the tax rate of the county at \$3.10 on the \$10,000, against \$2.70 last year. It was expected that the rate would be reduced to \$1.10, which is the lowest in 25 years, but the cost of the Rawlings trial made it necessary to raise an extra \$5,000.

**The cost of that case up to the present is just about those figures.** The attorney's fees alone amounted to \$990, the record being one of the longest ever taken in a criminal case in the state. It consisted of over one thousand pages or about 400,000 words.

**Rucker Remains Until January.**  
Lieutenant L. S. D. Rucker, sixteenth infantry, U. S. A., who has been detailed to the office of the adjutant general, Georgia state troops, will be connected with that office until January 1, 1906, his period of assignment having been extended for three months from October 1st.

**The assignment of Lieutenant Rucker was to have expired in October, but, owing to the many important matters in which he is interested, and the splendid work he has done on the staff of the state troops, the state adjutant general has requested that Lieutenant Rucker remain until January.**

**Contract Let to Build Line.**  
The Central of Georgia railway has announced the letting of the contract for building the extension from Greenville to Newnan, Ga., to Oliver & Co., of Knoxville, Tenn.

**Work on the extension will begin as soon as it is possible to get the equipment on the ground. This will not require more than a week and the limit for the completion of the contract is nine months. The extension will be about twenty miles long. A narrow gauge road from Greenville to Columbus will be widened, but the work will not be done by contract.**

**Preached Funeral Anyhow.**  
The execution of J. G. Rawlings and his sons Milton and Jesse and the negro accomplices in the murder of the Carter children, A. T. Moore, were not halted at Valdosta Friday, the day originally set for the execution.

**While Judge Mitchell overruled the motion for a new trial in the cases of Rawlings and his sons, their attorney, Hon. John F. Cooper, appealed the cases to the supreme court. A stay of execution has, therefore, been granted.**

**It is believed that owing to the importance of the cases the supreme court will give them precedence over some other matters at the session which meets in October.**

**The cases of A. T. Moore and Frank Turner, the other negroes sentenced to the penitentiary for life, will take the same course as the Rawlings cases.**

## National Farmers' Congress Opposes Government Rate-Making.

Richmond, September 16.—The growing opposition among shippers and producers everywhere to the fixing of railway rates by government authority, as proposed by the Federal Commerce Commission, is indicated by the action of the National Farmers' Congress yesterday at its annual convention here. The Congress is made up of representatives from every state in the country, the representation from the south and middle West being especially large.

Last year the Congress was in favor of giving the Interstate Commerce Commission the power to fix railroad rates and resolutions to this effect were introduced this year and were supported in able speeches by Congressman Adams of Wisconsin and others. But the members of the Congress were convinced that government regulation of rates, with the consequent fixing of the rates on an arbitrary basis, would mean that they would be compelled to pay more for shipping their products to markets, or that the middlemen would have to pay more, in which case it would come out of the farmer's pocket.

While declaring strongly against rebates and unjust discriminations, and in favor of the enforcement of the existing law on these subjects, the farmers refused to endorse the proposition to give to any government body the power to name the actual rate which a railroad shall charge for the transportation of freight. The resolutions adopted are as follows:

Whereas: We favor active enforcement by the general government of all existing law in order to prevent the giving or to be favored shippers and.

Whereas: We expect that the Interstate Commerce Commission will aggressively and promptly apply all remedies at their disposal; now therefore,

Resolved: That if the existing laws for the detection and punishment of the giving or acceptance of such rebates or special favors are insufficient or defective in any respect, we favor the enactment of such further legislation as may be necessary adequately to deal with the evil and to prevent such practices in the future.
