## THE BIG FARMERS MEETING

W. B. Moore was elected secretary and authorized to purchase a minute book for the fire company at city's expense.

Fire company to be known as Hose Company No. 1 until name taken away by more effective company.

Company required to practice one and one half hours twice a month, to wit: First and third Tuesday in each month, or such time as may be fixed by the chief.

Members required to be at the court house at practice hours, and to receive 50 cents each, if on time and do the required practice.

On fire occasions, first man at hose house to receive \$1.00 extra, and each man doing duty at fire to the satisfaction of chief, to receive \$1.00.

Statistics prove that nearly two-thirds of the letters carried by the world's postal services are written, sent and read by English-speaking people, states the Chicago Journal.

In the proportion of women teachers to the whole number of teachers employed the United States heads the world, says the Boston Transcript, although in nearly every civilized country the greater part of the teaching is done by women. This is in line with the general tendency toward the advancement of woman to a better place in this country.

**ARMY OFFICER SUICIDES.**  
Assistant Surgeon at Fort McPherson Barracks Tires of Life.

Captain C. C. M. Godfrey, assistant surgeon United States army, committing suicide Saturday night at his residence on Officer's Row, Fort McPherson, Ga., by blowing out his brains with an army revolver. He is survived by his wife and one child, a boy.

## PRESIDENT PALMA TRIUMPHS.

Cuban Elections Assure Another Term for Present Executive. Complete returns in received in Havana Monday from the entire island, which have been delayed owing to the bad condition of the telegraph service, show that in the elections Saturday last for members of the Cuban election boards, the supporters of the government were victorious in every province, not having lost one important place. The victory was so complete that it is now generally admitted to mean the reelection in the member of the President Palma and the election of the vice presidential candidate, Mendez Capote, the leader of the moderate party.

Monday's mail brought to the liberals in Havana the first report from their adherents in Cienfuegos of the riots there Friday last, which resulted in the killing of Congressman Villanueva and Chief of Police Illance. This report differs very little from former accounts, except that it lays on the moderates the blame for starting the disturbances.

Additional reports from Cienfuegos received by the government say that the chief leaders in the alleged dynamite plot were two Italian anarchists named Bos and Grau, who have been making sedition speeches there and elsewhere for some time.

## NO CONTRACTS CANCELED.

Polk Miller, Lecturer, Writes Letter to Thos. Effect. Mr. Miller, the lecturer, has written the Alkalies. Lyceum system to the effect that no contracts with him had been canceled by the Alkalies system.

Mr. Miller, who recently lectured in Atlanta, expected to visit certain Georgia and South Carolina cities after his lecture there, but was prevented from doing so by reason of the fact that those who were to have heard him objected to hearing an entertainment in which negroes participated.

Although Mr. Miller expected to make this tour, the contracts had not been signed and therefore when the Alkalies system wrote him that it had "struck a snag" it was not necessary to cancel contracts since they had not been signed.

## ON CHARGE OF BARRATRY

Two Well Known Lawyers of Savannah Are Indicted. W. M. Heyward and John E. Myrick, two well known lawyers of Savannah, Ga., have been indicted by the grand jury in charge of barratry. They are alleged to have been guilty of the solicitation of civil business.

Myrick several years ago was a candidate for congress from the district, running on the republican ticket.

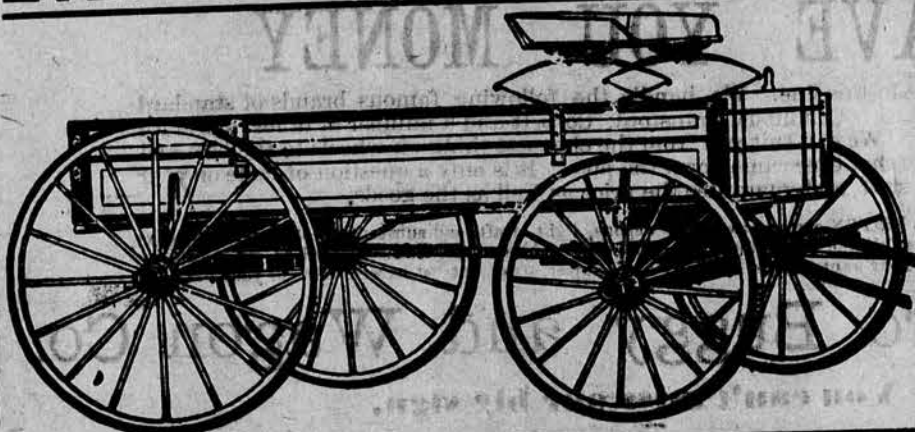
