of built it out of my head." Which in turn also proves that modesty is one of the largest crops to be found in the county which he represents, being the oldest living citizen of Statesboro, a fact of which he is very proud.

GREAT STRIDE OF STATESBORO  
When Mr. Miller first arrived in Statesboro it was nothing more than a cross-roads, quietly continuing its long sleep of a century. Today this capital of the county named after Governor Bulloch boasts 4,000 souls and a prosperity made possible by both the enterprise and the energy of its citizens and exceptional fertility and marvelous resources, due to the special kindness and generosity of the Creator. But again, the exhibit tells this story in a way that all who run may read.

Mountains cats appear to be another product of Bulloch, the same kind that lures President Roosevelt to the west in his search for the mountain lions of the Rockies. But this tremendous specimen is that of a stray mountain lion, the first and only one that has been captured in this state this long, long time.

The mountain lions left Georgia with the Indians and according to many, this is the only Georgia mountain lion still remaining in the state. It is perfectly safe being caged in a sort of log cabin made of eight varieties of sugar cane except that the top of this cabin has a pagoda-like appearance that suggests the Oriental rather than the Georgia type of architecture.

### VERSATILITY OF THE SOIL.

Just notice these: 100 varieties of hay, fifty varieties of wheat, as many of oats, sirups that appear as sweet as the memories of a first love affair; twelve varieties of sweet potatoes, some large and some small and all of the tempting things that appeal to and make valuable live stock in making them strong for work or fat for the market, varieties of hemp, that grows on the earth, in the air or the water under the earth, world without end, in Bulloch county, amen.

And no intention of sacrifice at that.

Vegetables from Chinese cabbage to common field peas and back again, they are all included. Turnips bigger than our imagination can paint them; 40-pound watermelons that make visitors long for cutting them, pumpkins for unbacked pies that make visitors talk about Thanksgiving day next month and everything else you can think of and can't think of. It's just the same way with fruits, from persimmons to the most luscious of peaches, pears, apples and everything else. It would take a book bigger than a seed catalogue to tell separately of the good things exhibited in Bulloch.

But while Mr. Miller has so many good things in his display, there are others still better. These are the kind that come in jars and under the direct supervision of Mrs. Miller and Miss Mae Morgan who are just as enthusiastic in their way as are the men folks connected with the exhibit and who have worked so hard for its success. These include 500 bottles of home-made wine in fifty varieties. Wouldn't that make a signed pledge thirsty? And also some 2,000 jars of preserves, jams, pickles, jellies, meat sauces and everything known to the goodly housewife who finds her highest and best development in satisfying the biggest and most appreciative appetites that grow in Georgia. It's impossible to go into details. Just the labels are enough to make a trustee want to break the commandment that deals with the sin of stealing. And Presi-

dent Roosevelt will see them all, for he has accepted an invitation to inspect Bulloch county's displays.

Yesterday thousands thronged the big exhibit. Many were from Bulloch county. These left no doubt about this matter for they told each other the fact in tones so loud that all those who passed by could hear. And the citizens of Bulloch looked much like the products displayed, larger than the average, prosperous and happy and healthy. All stopped to congratulate "Neighbor Miller" and tell him he was sure of the prize, but more than that, he had done more for his county than any one could ever appreciate except those who knew something of the tremendous work and expense involved.

But after everything is said and done there are better qualities displayed in this exhibit than those mentioned, although they are not entered for prizes and would be the very last to recognize their worth and these are the people who come from Bulloch to give the goodly people from all parts of Georgia a chance to see what can be done in a seacoast county of the state. These include Editor Miller, whose newspaper, one of the most influential of the state, has done so much for the development of Statesboro and the county; his very good wife, Miss Mae Morgan, R. H. Donaldson and Herbert Franklin. And still better than any of these is one of the latest products of Bulloch county, in fact the very best product even when all of her wonderful resources are remembered, a very recent member of the Miller family who looked down from the sheltering arms of the mother love on both the exhibits and the thousands of admiring and wondering spectators quite as a matter of course, her big eyes apparently realizing that she has the greatest of all privileges as her right, that of being a native Georgian and in the midst of her parents a still greater honor, if such is possible, that of being a native of Bulloch county.

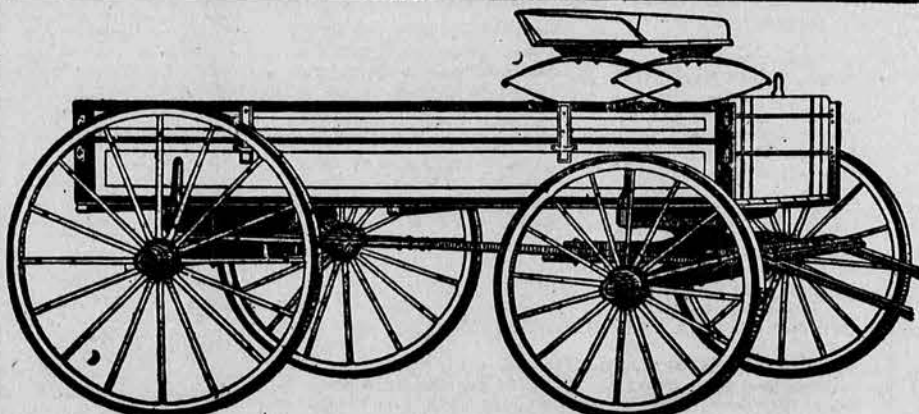

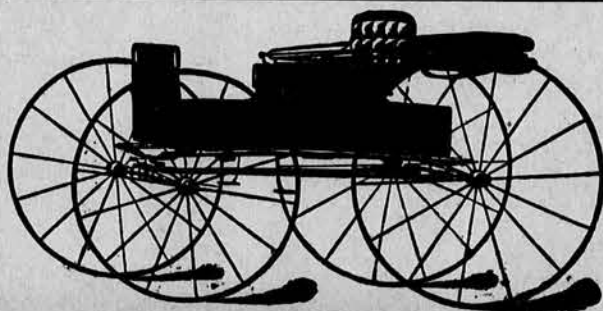

## BULLOCH WINS SECOND PRIZE

Bulloch County Is Awarded First Prize of \$500.00 At the State Fair, and Bulloch Comes In for Second Prize of \$1,200.00.

We were going to press Mr. Miller wired the News from Atlanta that the committee in charge of the awarding of prizes at the state fair in Atlanta has made up their decision and bestowed the first prize of \$1,600.00 upon the county of Bartow and that Bulloch outranks all the rest, coming in for second place, with a purse of \$1,200.00.

This announcement comes somewhat as a surprise, for Mr. Miller and a great many others confidently expected that Bulloch would take first place. The dissatisfaction is such that notice of contest has been filed with the committee by the Bulloch county management. It is contended that in a majority of points Bulloch excelled the exhibit of Bartow. The question raised in the contest will be passed upon by the committee within a few days, and it is to be hoped that they can be induced to alter their decision in our favor.

Still, it is not so bad to be given the second place at the greatest agricultural fair ever held in the state of Georgia. Atlanta offered large inducement to exhibitors and the displays set up at the state fair this year have been the best and most extensive ever shown before in the history of the state. It was frequently remarked that the agricultural exhibits shown in Atlanta would have done credit to the St. Louis fair.

Bulloch county has been thoroughly advertised to the world through the exhibit sent up to Atlanta, and the people from all sections of the state and from other states have been most favorably impressed with what Bulloch county can do. There is no doubt but that the county will reap a large amount of substantial benefits from having been represented up there and the winning of second place among so many competitors is very greatly to our credit.

The aeronauts who survive their journeys above the clouds, especially in big cities, say the dangers are even greater than can be imagined, so far as people in general are concerned, will be restricted for many, many years, if not for ever, to railroads and steamships, as at present.

The criticism of our American school system on which an English educational commission sent to this country a few years ago dwelt most emphatically was that we are "feminizing" our boys by reason of the great preponderance of women teachers. It seems, however, from a census bulletin prepared by Professor Walter F. Willcox, of Cornell University, a distinguished statistician, that relatively to the whole number of teachers women are about as numerous in England as in this country, observes the New York Sun.

J. A. Everett, an Indiana man, is now seeking a location for his "model city," an arcadia on co-operative lines. His hope is to obtain an option on a town of 4000 or 5000 inhabitants, and there found what he believes will be taken on all land for miles. Land owners who are on the land when Mr. Everett acquires it will be permitted to retain their homes and twenty acres. The rest of the property will be laid out in twenty-acre tracts, which will be offered to settlers.

Consumption, as a result of the adoption of more enlightened methods of prevention and treatment, works a little less havoc now than formerly, declares the New York Tribune. Pneumonia, on the other hand, finds a greater number of victims in proportion to the population. There is ground for the belief that grip has contributed materially to this result, because it is often a prelude to an attack of pneumonia and it sadly disqualifies a man for successful resistance to an illness of another nature. However, whatever the cause, the increased prevalence of pneumonia has excited the gravest alarm and perplexity in the medical profession.

The commission which was appointed last year by the New York Board of Health to study pneumonia, and whose preliminary report has just been summarized by the press, is composed of men of high professional rank, remarks the New York Tribune. Yet the problems involved in the inquiry are so serious that there is no danger of securing too exalted a grade of talent for their solution. The disease which the commission has been considering has risen into peculiar prominence of late. At one time consumption caused more deaths than any other malady, and pneumonia ranked second as a cause of mortality. Within the last ten or fifteen years the two have exchanged places in some parts of the United States, if not in the metropolis.

Experiments recently undertaken by Germans in the interest of the mariner are described in a consular report sent to Washington a few days ago, says the New York Tribune. They were meant to test the efficiency of a device which some one has proposed to use as a check upon the eccentricities of the compass. To begin with, the needle points directly to the north at very few places on the globe. Again, the amount of deviation itself varies with locality, so that from time to time the captain of a ship must make an increasing or decreasing allowance in order to maintain his course. Were this all that he had to consider, and were he provided with a freshly revised magnetic chart, he would have little trouble. But there are additional and more perplexing "distractions" to deal with. To compensate for the influence of the metal in a ship it is usual to locate near the compass a bar of iron, whose effect should theoretically be uniform. Unfortunately, it is not. Every now and then something interferes, and the previously prescribed corrections for deviation are found to be a degree or two out of the way.

## BANKERS IN CONVENTION

National Association Holds Forth in Washington—Thirty-Three Hundred Delegates on Hand.

There prevailed in the important speeches before the American Bankers' Association convention in Washington Wednesday the sentiment that financial legislation is necessary. Thirty-three hundred bankers applauded Secretary Shaw to the echo when he concluded a lengthy address, the burden of which was a panorama of the prosperity of the country contrasted with a monetary system, which is inflexible and liable thereby to bring disaster at any crucial time.

Frank A. Vanderlip, of the National City Bank of New York, former assistant secretary of the treasury, saw the same prosperity and he also saw dangers. Secretary Shaw suggested a remedy—a "flexible" national bank note currency, which would be drawn forth at times of unusual demand for money and by reason of the tax be retired immediately upon changed conditions.

Mr. Vanderlip had no advice to offer Mr. Ridgely, controller of the currency, pointed out the necessity of changed methods in some respects in the government's supervision of national banks.

President Swaney of the association reviewed its growth and development for the year. President Roosevelt was applauded and thanked for his successful efforts in making peace between Japan and Russia.

The president received the bankers and the ladies accompanying them at the white house. There was music and floral decorations, but not speeches.

The president shook the hand of every one of the visitors and extended his warmest greetings.

Noted Prisoners Have Many Callers in Savannah Jail.

P. W. Meldrum, counsel for Greene and Gaynor, when asked when he would make application to Judge Speer for admission to his clients to bail, replied that he had no idea of doing so.

The prisoners have settled down to "housekeeping" and are comfortably situated at the jail. Every day they receive visitors and some of the most prominent people in the community have been among those who have called.

The prisoners expect to be brought to trial at the coming term of court.

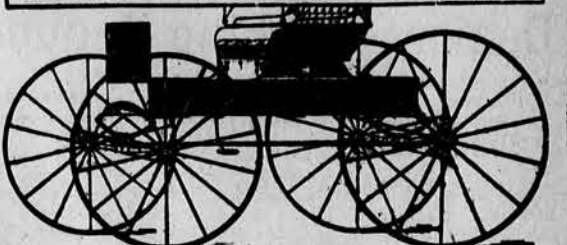

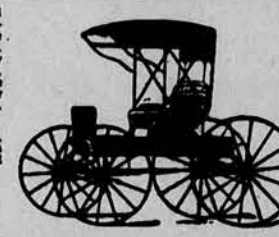
