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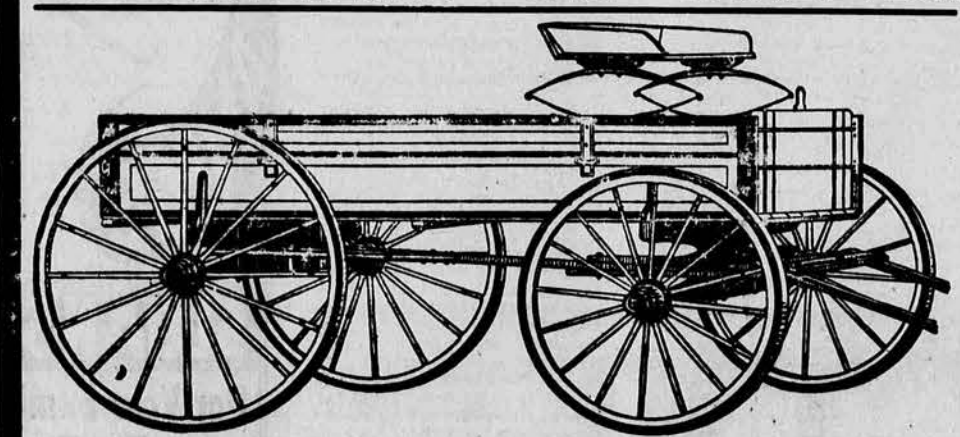

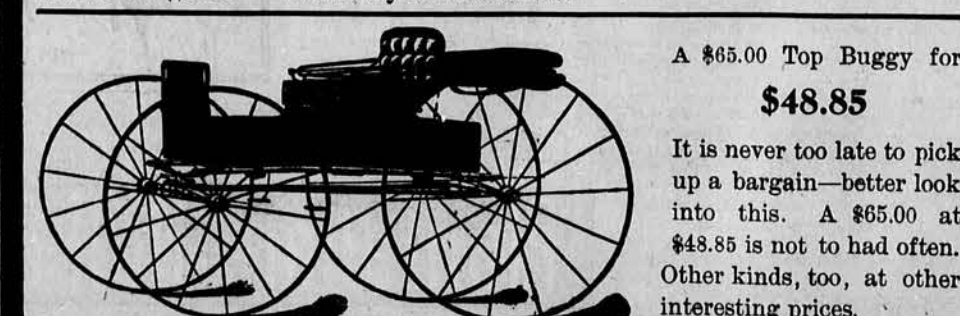

Delay in the Report

of Cotton Shred
Washington, Oct. 26.—The Census Bureau issued a bulletin today placing the cotton ginned in the United States up to Oct. 15, at 4,940,728 bales, round bales being counted as half bales. The statement is based on reports made by the bureau's special agents in the field.

No estimate is made of the total crop for the year, but figures are given over concerning crops of former years. The figures show that up to this date in 1904, the products of the gins had reached a total of 6,417,804 bales out of a total of 18,093,279 bales for the year.

In 1903, the total production was 10,045,615 bales and the ginning output up to Oct. 25, 8,709,248; in 1902, the total was 10,827,168, and the output to Oct. 25, was 5,683,000.

To day's report covered 26,864 ginneries and the statements upon which it was prepared were supplied by telegraph by 702 special agents in the field, most of them representing one county each.

Court Going On.

The superior court has been in session all the week. Mr. W. H. Cone was selected as foreman of the grand jury, and that body has been diligent in looking after the law breakers. A large number of true bills have been returned for various offenses extending from murder to gambling.

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About Not Grass.

I see in your paper where Mr. F. W. J. gives a remedy to destroy nut grass. He says build a lightwood knot fire on a patch of it and let it burn for three days, and if this remedy failed he would not charge anything for the prescription.

Now I will say in answer to Mr. F. W. J. that this remedy is no good. I burned three log heaps on a patch about the size of a ten foot room, and the following spring, I think, it came up on that spot as thick as ever. I then put two sacks of salt on this spot and left it lying on top of the ground, and in two weeks the nut grass came up as thick as ever.

The roots of nut grass grow so deep and so thick until it is impossible to get rid of it. I then planted velvet beans on the land, as I had heard that they would destroy it, but the next spring, when I went to plough the land the grass had taken such a hold on it until it would turn in a shield. Now I have tried every remedy that can be tried and have found nothing that does any good.

If you have nut grass on your place my advice to you is to sell your land and leave it. There is not a man in existence that knows how quick it will ruin land only those who have tried it.

I would not give anything for land that has nut grass on it. You can throw out the land it is growing on and take in new one, but if you don't ditch around the land you throw away it will soon get on the adjoining land that you take in. Now if anyone doubts this I can sight you to three places in Bulloch where it is growing and you can look for yourself.

GRAND JURY PRESENTMENTS

We, the grand jury chosen and sworn for Oct. term 1905 superior court of Bulloch county, beg to submit the following general presentments:
We have received and adopted the report of the committee appointed by the former grand jury to examine the books of the county officers, said report is hereto attached and made a part of our general presentments.
We have examined the books of the various magistrates and justices of the peace, and find them correctly kept, with the following exception: The J. P. docket of the 48th district, G. M. the cost bills are not properly itemized, and some of the entries are made in pencil.
We elect Messrs. W. A. Hodges, J. A. Fulcher and D. E. Bird as members of the board of education to succeed themselves.
We endorse the efforts of the board of education in building new school houses and laying off school districts as the law directs.
We have elected J. B. Lee, H. S. Parish and C. S. Martin as a committee to examine the books of the various county officers.
We understand that the county commissioners have employed a superintendent of roads for the county and endorse this action and approve this change in the method of working our roads.
We recommend that our commissioners furnish an itemized

statement showing the amounts of collections and all expenses for road purposes for each district separately, also a report as to condition of roads, and that these reports be published quarterly.
We recommend that the chain gang be required to work the two public roads running through Statesboro within the city limits in the same manner as the roads in the county beyond the city limits.
We have examined the office of the sheriff and find his books neatly and correctly kept. We commend the sheriff for the efficient and systematic manner in which his office is kept.
We have examined the office of the ordinary and find his office correctly and well kept.
We have examined the record of county commissioners' court and find that some of the commissioners, to-wit: Morgan Brown, M. J. Bowen and W. J. Denmark receive pay as expenses in going and returning from said courts \$1.00 per day extra to the \$3.00 per diem, making \$4.00 per day, which we think is in violation of said act creating said board.

ERASTUS BRANNEN WAS CONVICTED

Erastus Brannen who was charged with the murder of Jack Ellis was convicted last week by the jury and sentenced to the penitentiary for life. Both he and his brother Jim were jointly indicted, but the jury found the one guilty. The killing of Ellis occurred in June last on one Sunday night along the public road. Jack Ellis in company with Lester Olliff and Conley Barnes were on their way home, and they say that when they overtook the Brannen boys, that the Brannens opened fire on them and killed Ellis and wounded Barnes. The Brannens insisted that they were going along the road and were overtaken by the other crowd and fired into without warning and that they shot only in self defense. Brannen is a young man only about twenty years of age. The case was hard fought on both sides and much interest manifested in the trial. A motion for a new trial has been made by his attorneys which will be heard at an early day.

JIM CARTER WILL HANG

At the session of the superior court last week Jim Carter, a negro, was convicted of the murder of his wife and was sentenced to be hanged on Friday, December the first, in private, as the law directs.

Some time during last summer Jim killed his wife because she would not live with him. He came back from South Carolina to induce her to return with him, and Jim, believing that she was unfaithful to him, proceeded to kill her in the presence of witnesses who testified against him on the trial of the case.

He fled to South Carolina after the murder of his wife, but Sheriff Kendrick got on his trail and in a few days had him landed behind the bars in the Statesboro jail.

Jim is a one-eyed negro about 40 years old, and will be the first negro to hang since Alonzo Evans was strung up for the murder of Henry Dutton about ten years ago.
