## FIFTEEN CENTS THE SLOGAN.

President Harvie Jordan of the Southern Cotton Association has issued the following address to the holders of short cotton:

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 15, 1905. To Farmers, Merchants, Bankers, and Holders of Spot Cotton:

The balance of the crop remaining unsold in the hands of the people must be firmly held and fifteen cents demanded for every pound, basis middling, at all interior points. The recent estimate of the Southern Cotton Association of 9,448,814 bales was confirmed by Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, through the published November crop condition report of 9.8 by the department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C. In Mr. Wilson's interview thereon as published in the "Washington Post" of Nov. 12, Secretary Wilson states positively that the recent report of his department is as "accurate and trustworthy as a report can be made, and that it indicates a crop in the neighborhood of only ten million bales."

Add to our Association estimate of 9,444,814 bales, the long staple production, Linters and city crop, and we have a grand total in the neighborhood of ten million bales, which is the recent estimate made by Secretary Wilson. This statement by Mr. Wilson forecasts the coming December 8th report to be issued by his department on estimate yield for 1905.

The district school system was voted in without a vote being cast against it, also was Mrs. Kennedy and Stapler and Mr. G. Trappell voted for as trustees for same without a vote in opposition.

The trustees called a mass meeting of the district patrons to say where and what kind of a building should be erected. This matter, of course, was only intended to get the sentiments of the people as to where the situation should be. It was thought proper that a majority rule and not a few.

It was decided that a ballot of those interested was the nearest solution to the problem. Some opposed that and suggested that the meeting adjourn as all the people had not been notified, and appoint another day for the meeting so that all the patrons could have a chance to cast a ballot as to the place of location for the school building.

The day for the second meeting came on and the people gathered about the old school house at Metter with the expressed purpose of voting for a location. A chairman was elected to the chair. One of the trustees named the inducements that had been tendered them which was four acres of land on the south side of the railroad and four acres on the north side of railroad offered as a gift by two different parties for the school.

Next was a vote on the two propositions to see which the majority preferred of the two. The chairman over ruled that motion and simply refused to entertain any motion that would give the people a chance to vote. It seems that the chairman was willing for a few to say on the south side was the only lawful situation for a school building about Metter, that it was unlawful to vote on the question of situation by any means. He said that we must talk that business over, and all hands pull together and give Metter a good school, but he almost said it had to be on the south side of the railroad. He gave all appeals for a popular vote on the matter a deaf ear, and finally, as a last resort, a motion was made to elect another chairman, which was seconded by almost every individual in the house. The new chairman in the chair called the house to order and a standing vote was taken. The north side situation was chosen by a unanimous vote.

It was voted that the building should be of brick, and the style and price be left with the trustees. Mr. Madison Warren was selected to be one of the building committee.

Of course, the first chairman and the south side patrons had all withdrawn and did not participate in the final wind up of the affair. There will be something doing I guess in the way of districts schools in and around our little town immediately if not sooner. I was present and the above is as near accurate as I could see it.

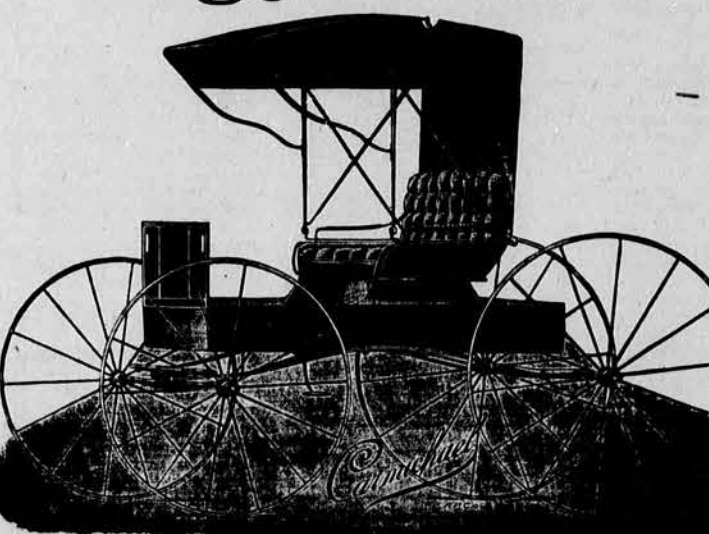

It is clear in the New York Post that the corrupt entanglement of corporations with politics must be taken sharply in hand by the American people.

One of the facts established within a few years is that mosquitoes are the deadliest of all creatures. A writer in the Lancet addresses evidence which indicates that flies, too, cause thousands of deaths, especially of infants, every summer, by contaminating food with diarrhoeal germs.

When American immigrants go to Europe they carry at least \$1000 apiece to spend in the Old World. Our annual visitation costs the country at least \$100,000,000. The visitation of 1,000,000 foreigners to America amounts to a few hundred of old clothes.

We are strikingly reminded of the rapid flight of time when we read of the proposal to commemorate the 100th birthday of Abraham Lincoln less than four years hence, reflects the Atlanta Constitution. The great republic is getting old and the Civil War is fast becoming ancient history.

These are the days when the American farmer smiles. The smile is the most expensive ever seen, for it covers the entire country, East and West, North and South. The crops as a whole are the highest ever. Mother Earth has produced hundreds of millions of dollars' worth more of her bounty than she did last year.

The total number of acres in Great Britain devoted to small fruit is now 78,522, as compared with 77,047 acres in 1904, showing an increase over the latter year of 855 acres, or 1.1 per cent. The acreage covered by orchards is 244,323, as compared with 243,068 in 1904, showing an increase of 1315, or 0.5 per cent.

As General Chaffee couldn't pay an enemy's compliment to save his life, his praise of the French troops as he has seen them in the maneuvers should open the eyes of the world to the excellence of the reorganized and modernized French army. "Admirable in every respect," says the grim old mustache who commands our own army.

Reformers are sometimes so convinced of their own goodness that they resort to devices which they would not the first to try out against if employed by a machine politician. We have got to make our business methods correct, even if some business men are superfluous in wisdom and angelic in character, comments the New York Evening Post. When the law prohibits doing a certain thing, it is no defense to say that it was a good man who violated the statute, with the best intentions in the world.

Is the automobile craze likely to go out as the bicycle craze did before it? asks the Waterbury American. The contributor was talking with a friend who has owned and run a big touring car for two years, and his friend said that he was about ready now to trade that expensive luxury for a good pair of horses. He was "tired" of automobile. He was also a bit nervous. He had had one or two close calls, and he was never sure that a reckless driver would not run him down, even if he himself always kept his machine under control. On his travels this summer he has met two men of large means who have spent their thousands upon automobiles who have gone out of it. He thinks that they are types of many others.

Prejudice against women in the business world generally, and not the superiority of men, is the cause of the adoption of the new policy of a watch company in replacing girls with men in the higher positions, according to women of Chicago who are leading their sisters to wage-earning equality, relates the Chicago Post. They all deny the truth of the reason assigned by the corporation that men are more accurate and do more work. "I have no doubt that those girls are earning every cent they get," said Mrs. Charles Hendrix. "When they place men side by side with those women and find they are doing more satisfactory work they overlook the fact that the men are paid much better wages. If they would put the women on equality on the payroll it would open the employer's eyes to a fact they never dreamed of before."

# A BLOODY MUTINY

Raged Fiercely in Streets of Kronstadt, Russia.

# ALMOST AT CZAR'S DOOR

Pevel Breaks Out Suddenly, Troops Are Called, Machine Guns Play and Many Riots Are Mowed Down.

A St. Petersburg special says: It is reported that a massacre occurred at Kronstadt Wednesday night and that the infantry, using machine guns, fired on the people. The British embassy has requested General Troop to protect the British subjects at Kronstadt.

A dispatch to a news agency in London from St. Petersburg says sailors of the Russian squadron at Kronstadt mutinied, overpowering their officers, and landed and attacked the shops, public buildings and spirit stores.

Later reports only magnify the horror of the situation. The mutiny was complete. According to the latest reports, not only the sailors, but the garrison of some of the forts, joining in the insurrection.

The few soldiers and sailors who remain loyal, fought all night against the mutineers and the workmen who enlisted under the banner of revolt. Barricades were thrown up. The report that machine guns were used is apparently confirmed.

The Maxim guns fired all Wednesday night and Thursday morning the streets were drenched with blood. The number of dead and wounded runs far into the hundreds.

Later two regiments of Cossacks and the Imperial Horse Guards were dispatched to Kronstadt from St. Petersburg, and a regiment of Cossacks were sent there from Oranienbaum, a few miles west of Peterhof. Another 20,000 troops are engaged in quelling the insurrection.

According to some reports, the sailors and strikers were finally surrounded, but would not surrender. Both sides have been losing heavily. The troops lost eight officers killed or wounded. Other reports say the Cossacks deserted to the mutineers, and are now fighting against the imperial troops.

The inhabitants of Kronstadt are in a panic. The boats to St. Petersburg have stopped running and telephone and telegraph communication have been severed.

Both Count Witte and the emperor have made another surrender. General Troop has been removed from the powerful position which he occupied, that of governor general of St. Petersburg, and assistant minister of the interior, and Russia's premier has agreed to immediate universal suffrage.

**BALLOT BOXES IN STREET.**  
Sensational Developments in Contest Over Election in New York.

The contest over the majority election in New York, inaugurated by William Randolph Hearst, the municipal ownership candidate, developed interesting and spectacular features Thursday.

For twelve hours the boxes containing nearly 50,000 ballots, on Tuesday's election, choked the streets in the vicinity of the headquarters of the board of elections in Sixth avenue.

The ballot boxes had been gathered during the night by the police, and conveyed in motor wagons to the election board's headquarters. There the officials refused to receive the ballot boxes and the police, acting under a court order signed by Justice Gaynor, compelling the police authorities to turn the ballots over to the election board, had nothing to do but remain outside and await the pleasure of the city officials.

Apprehensive of the situation, the attorneys for Hearst appeared before Justice Decker of the state supreme court and secured from him an order compelling John R. Voorhees, the president of the board of elections, to accept the ballots. The order was served promptly and the ballots were, for the first time, received for the election board.

Charges that several ballot boxes had been stolen before they returned were reported and that others were found unsolved were made during the day. The investigation of the election promises to be the most thorough ever made in New York city.

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# BOOST IN COTTON

Fifteen Cents Per Pound is Now in Sight.

# FARMERS URGED TO HOLD

Conditions Point to Maximum Crop of Only Ten Million Bales and Fifteen Cents is Logical Price.

Fifteen-cent cotton is now the slogan of the Southern Cotton Association. The recent report of the United States department of agriculture strongly supports the information which the association has gathered from its many correspondents throughout the south, and all of this goes to show that the maximum crop this year will be 10,000,000 bales.

Based on these facts President Harvey Jordan of the cotton association declares the remainder of the crop should not be sold for less than 15 cents. This he states will put the entire crop into the hands of the spinners at an average price of 12 cents.

President Jordan says: "The open declaration of Hon. J. B. Wilson, secretary of agriculture, in an interview published in the Washington Post on Monday that the recent cotton report of 68.5, published by his department, is accurate and trustworthy and which shows that the year's crop will be in the neighborhood of only 10,000,000 bales, should knock out all the high-sounding people and put everybody down on the working basis of a short crop."

"It is surprising to know that Secretary Wilson's estimate of the cotton crop corresponds so nearly with that of the Southern Cotton Association. And the latter and city crop to our association's recent estimate of 9,441,000 bales, and we have a crop in the neighborhood of 10,000,000." Secretary Wilson's estimate forecasts the department figures for December 3, and there can be no chance for the better during the next fifteen days.

"As we now have the most accurate information from the two most authentic and reliable sources that this crop will be about 10,000,000 bales, inclusive of short and long staple, it is unquestionable that the balance of the crop remaining in the hands of the planters should not be marketed for less than 15 cents. This would average the crop to the spinners at about 12 cents, and that price is not high, considering the present abnormally high prices and unprecedented demand for cotton goods."

He should, therefore, issue at once a proclamation to the planters and holders of spot cotton in the south to stand firm for 15 cents and follow this up with the most active campaign yet undertaken by the association throughout the entire cotton belt. My recent investigation among the cottoners supplies, jobbers, searers of cotton goods and the now confirmed shortage of the crop from all reliable and trustworthy sources lead me to take this action, and I want the active co-operation of every one in favor of higher prices."

**MONUMENT TO CONFEDERATES**  
Proposed to Be Erected in Arlington Cemetery at Washington.

Plans for the raising of funds to erect a monument in Arlington cemetery at Washington to the Confederate dead are to be formulated by a joint committee from every Confederate organization in the district of Columbia, at a meeting for that purpose to be held shortly.

The cost of the construction and erection will be placed at between \$10,000 and \$20,000, to which fund it is proposed to ask contributions from all Confederate societies of the south.

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Move for Autonomy Causes Financial Panic in St. Petersburg.

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The formal proclamation of martial law throughout Russian Poland and the promulgation of the government's intention to suppress the Polish movement to secure autonomy almost effected a panic on the course in St. Petersburg Monday, imperial forces again falling to 20.

Private and reliable reports from Warsaw say that all the parties there are joining in the nationalist movement, following the tactics of Finland for a complete strike.

**MARKED WITH CROSSES.**  
Great Massacre of Jews Planned by the "Black Hundred."

Stories are being industriously circulated that a regular St. Bartholomew massacre of the Jews and intellectuals has been planned by the "Black Hundred" of St. Petersburg. It is declared that all the houses containing intended victims are marked with a red cross.

**TRouble Feared by Palma.**  
Cuban Government Suspects That a Revolution is Brewing.

A special dispatch from Havana says: It is believed that the government fears a coup d'etat, as the number of police at the palace has recently been tripled and for the last two nights the policemen have been compelled to remain continuously on the palace floor.

### Sea Island Growers Organize.

Meeting at Court House On Saturday Elects Delegates to Valdosta Convention and Prepare to Fight the Speculators

Owing to an error in the notice of the meeting there was not as large a crowd of Sea Island Cotton Growers out to the meeting on Saturday as was expected, but there was a representative crowd present from all sections of the county.

Mr. P. R. McElveen was elected chairman and J. R. Miller secretary. Hon. A. M. Deal was present and in a few well chosen remarks stated the object of the meeting. Chairman McElveen and Mr. R. Simmons each made a short talk. After some discussion the following delegates were elected to the convention which will meet in Valdosta tomorrow: R. Simmons, A. M. Deal and C. B. Aaron.

There was considerable discussion as to the size of the present crop in this county, and the following is about the gist of the information obtained from those in attendance from the various sections of the county:

There is less cotton in the fields now than there was the first day of January of last season; in fact, picking is reported to be practically over, and the ginners' present report that there is very little now being offered at the various gins, in the fact that gins are much clearer of cotton than they were a month later last season. Mr. Simmons, who, by the way, is authority, stated that there was a shortage up to the present time as compared with last season in the Statesboro market of at least 2,500 bales of sea island cotton. That means that up to the present the receipts here, which is the biggest inland sea island cotton market in the world, are at least 80 per cent reduced as compared with the same time last season, and the further fact that there is much less to draw from than last season makes a still greater shortage stare us in the face.

The object of the Valdosta meeting, we understand, is to promote a better grade of cotton and a reduction in the acreage along the same lines as accomplished by the short cotton growers of the south. It will be very probable that some action will be taken, too, to hold as much of the present crop of the market as possible.

**ANOTHER STORE OPEN**

In the case of the parents of these two young men troubles come thick and fast, and they have the sympathy of a large circle of friends throughout the country.
