Company Failed

to Get Captain.

Company A, First Georgia infantry, located at Statesboro, Bulloch county, which gained notoriety in connection with the double lynching in that county something more than a year ago, was disbanded yesterday by orders issued from the adjutant general's office and has now gone permanently out of business.

The trouble with the Statesboro appears to have been its inability to secure a captain. The company's last captain, H. J. McMillan, resigned some two years ago, a considerable time before the Statesboro lynching took place.

At the time of the lynching the company was in command of First Lieutenant C. E. Cone, whose second lieutenant was H. L. Griner. Both of these officers have remained constantly with the company since that time, and each has been tendered the captaincy but declined it for business reasons. The company has had the same difficulty in securing a captain elsewhere, and for this and other reasons, it is stated, has practically requested its own disbandment, through its officers. It is stated at the adjutant's office that the company has a full complement of men, and outside of the fact stated there was no complaint against it for lack of interest at the present time.

This was one of the companies called out by the governor and under command of former Captain R. M. Hitch, of Savannah, whose Savannah company was also with him, on the occasion of the trial of the two negro murderers, Reed and Cato. After the negroes had been tried and sentenced to be hanged a mob formed, took them away from the militia and lynched them. The affair led to a court martial of the officers involved, following which the captain commanding was dismissed from service of the state. Both Lieutenants Cone and Griner were tried before the court. The former was acquitted of the charge against him, while Lieutenant Griner was found guilty on certain specifications and reprimanded by the governor.—Atlanta Constitution.

Smith-Howell Debate.

Columbus, Ga., Nov. 28.—The Smith-Howell debate is a great topic of discussion in Columbus nowadays, and the advocates of each candidate are convinced there will be much excitement here on that day.

The question of the time for holding the debate has arisen, and at first it was thought it advisable to hold it at night, but as the opera house, the only large auditorium in the city will be used that night by a theatrical company, it will be impossible to get it. As the court house would not do, and the out-of-door debate out of the question, the only thing possible is an afternoon debate, from one to four, or two to five o'clock. This would enable people from the surrounding country to come to Columbus in the morning and return home that night, most of the incoming morning trains arriving here from nine until ten o'clock, and they leave from five until nine-thirty at night.

Enormous crowds are expected in Columbus on the day of the debate, large delegations being expected from Macon, Atlanta and other cities some distance from Columbus, besides those from the surrounding towns and villages. The opera house will seat, with chairs on the stage, about 2,000 people, and it is expected that there will be half that many turned away on the afternoon of the debate.

Refused Permit for Fertilizer Plant
Acting upon a petition from the property owners in East Statesboro hear the site of the proposed plant of the Statesboro Guano Factory council, at a special session, refused to grant a permit for the erection of a fertilizer plant on the lot near the railroad crossing. This action was taken after part of the material had been placed on the ground for the erection of the building. It is not known if Mr. Litchstein, the promoter of the plant, and his associates will take the matter into the courts or arrange for a site at another place further out of town. The prison commission met in special session yesterday to hear the case of Jim Carter, sentenced to be hanged in Bulloch county for the murder of his wife, and who is applying for a commutation of sentence to life imprisonment. Carter was sentenced to be hanged December 1, and the special meeting of the commission was called because it was thought the day of execution was close at hand, and this would be the only opportunity to pass on the case. Senator H. B. Strange, of Statesboro, who is Carter's attorney, appeared before the commission yesterday in his behalf, and during the course of the inquiry it developed that upon a motion for new trial pending in the superior court of Bulloch county, a supersedeas has been granted postponing the execution until the motion can be disposed of. It is a rule of the prison commission never to consider an application for executive clemency until every possible remedy afforded by the courts has been exhausted, and for this reason the commission had to decline the hearing.—A. J. Latta Constitution.

Farmers and Your Cotton.

That class of farmers who are not compelled to sell their sea island cotton and, yet are dumping it on the market at the present low price, are doing not only themselves an injustice but an injury to their neighbors as well. The meeting held last week in Valdosta has undertaken to stop this evil, and it is hoped that their efforts will meet with success.

There is no reason under the sun why sea island cotton should be sold for less than 22 cents per pound for good Georgia is the price set by the Valdosta convention.

It isn't a question of a farmer getting out for his labor, but you must remember that there is a small belt on the coast of Georgia, South Carolina and Florida upon which the entire world must depend for their supply of long-staple cotton. They have tried to raise it in Cuba, but without success, and their efforts in other countries have met with equal disaster; in fact, every effort to supplant the crop raised by a small strip of country in this immediate section has failed, and the world must look to us for their raw sea island cotton, which, when manufactured into goods, is sold back to us at \$4.00 per pound in the shape of pure cotton, and equally as much when put into the imitation silk goods for which thousands of bales are used.

Let every farmer in Bulloch hold every bale of sea island cotton he has for sixty days and he will see happen what did in the short cotton market. They said that the hope of 11 cent cotton was only a dream, but you saw that it is here and a reality, and besides its going higher than it is now. Hold every bale of sea island cotton you have and you will get more for it.

THE WORLD WATCHES

All Countries Are Interested In the Action of Congress.

Washington, Nov. 25.—Great interest is being shown here in an article which appeared in a recent issue of the London Statist. This paper is the most ably edited financial journal in the world, and everywhere is regarded as high authority.

The article says that all the world is interested in the action to be taken by the coming Congress on the subject of railroads. Legislation which helps the prosperity of the United States, benefits all the world, says the journal, and the reverse is true. It cites the Sherman Silver Purchase bill of 1890 as legislation which hurt the industries and practically all lines of business in this country and Europe, while the adoption of the Single Gold standard was followed by the greatest era of prosperity ever seen.

If Congress gives the Inter-State Commerce Commission power to fix railway rates, not only the railroads but all business interests will regret it, says the Statist, because the development of the country, the growth of manufactures and the prosperity of the agriculturalists will be retarded.

England has government control of rates and the rates have not been changed in twenty-five years, while in the United States they are only a third of what they were in 1880.

The railway industry does not differ in any material degree from other industries, the Statist declares.

"Its prosperity is governed by the prosperity of the country, and of the traders it serves, and railway presidents and directors have realized that they are bound to charge rates which assist trade and commerce to expand. The railway industry has probably done as much as, or even more than, other industries towards building up the country's welfare; and the enlightened policy which has animated those who have controlled the railway industry has brought advantage and wealth to the country which cannot well be measured."

The article goes on to say that judging from the past history of railroads, it does not seem likely that they will make rates which will hamper trade and prevent its expansion. Every railway manager knows that the prosperity of his company depends on its ability to carry the largest possible quantity of traffic at the lowest possible cost.

As to the charge that the railway stocks are watered, the Statist says it was often necessary for the companies to give away stocks as a bonus to induce people to buy the bonds from which the money was derived to build and equip the lines. The value of these stocks has been more than made good by the money since spent on the properties in reconstruction and improvement.

Rates have steadily dropped for the last quarter of a century. While rates have been greatly reduced, the roads have only been able to increase their earnings by increasing their train load and economizing in every other way they know.

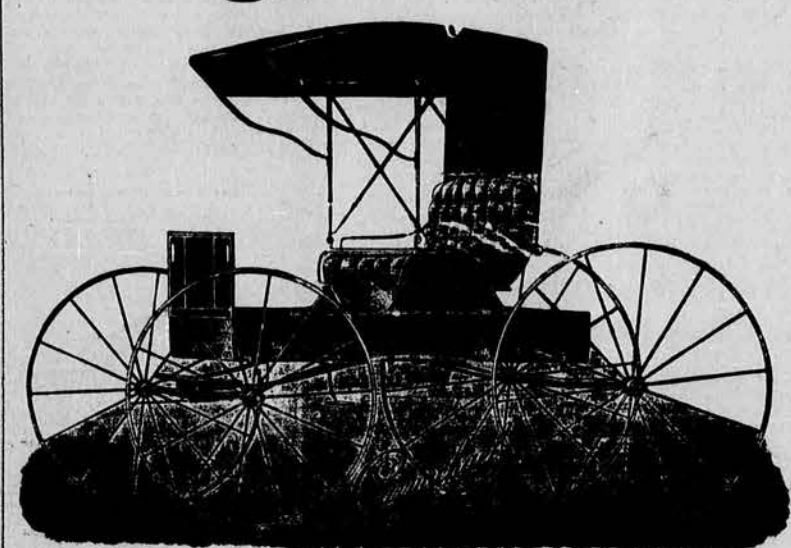

History of Thanksgiving Day.

Yesterday was Thanksgiving, wonder if your readers have ever stopped to think seriously of this day which in the evolution of time has grown to be a national holiday.

The day passed as usual here at Mill Ray, essentially a family. There is little formal entertaining done on the national or any other holiday. Old fashioned hospitality still prevails, and invitations to dine en famille are extended to bachelors and maids but society hostesses for the most part hold up their hands in dismay at the idea of a real dinner party or party of any sort on Thanksgiving day, one or two informal affairs marked yesterday's social and religious record. Except for these the day here was uneventful. A delightful program had been arranged at Macedonia Baptist church and at its conclusion there was a prayer meeting.

Thanksgiving as a custom is old, older than you would surmise at first thought. It dates back to the Hebrew feast of the tabernacle. In the history of England we see that September 8th 1658 was set apart as a day of national thanksgiving for the destruction of the Spanish Armada which was accomplished not so much by the weak English vessels as by the winds which the "Lord of glory blew."

The first thanksgiving in America was Nov. 19, 1621, when Governor Bradford of the Plymouth Colony by a proclamation set aside that day as a day for giving thanks to the Lord for the good crops and for the variety of game with which the colony had been blessed.

The first thanksgiving day we ever had in this country was during the Revolutionary war and was done in pursuance of a proclamation by congress.

Our present national thanksgiving day was instituted by Lincoln during the third year of the Confederate war, and has been kept up regularly by all the succeeding presidents.

Thanksgiving as a day off is nothing. It seems that most people look upon it only as a day of feasting with but little thanksgiving. But if we could only enter into the object of it what a great day for the country at large it is! When we consider that the first national thanksgiving in this great country during the Revolutionary war, when at Valley Forge the patriots were making red the snow with their blood, when we consider that under such trying circumstances as these our nation was being born, we ought to catch the spirit of the thanks we ought to render.
