RAWLINGS CASES WILL GO TO U. S. SUPREME COURT.

J. G. Rawlings and his two sons, Milton and Jesse, who were under sentence of death to be executed on January 6, and the third son, Leonard, who was sentenced to life imprisonment, are to have another chance for their lives and liberty by reason of a writ of error to the supreme court of the United States, which was signed at 6 o'clock Saturday afternoon by Chief Justice William H. Fish, of the supreme court of Georgia, on the petition of John R. Cooper, of Macon, the attorney for the Rawlings men.

The claim of Attorney Cooper is unique—that the juries, grand and petit which indicted and tried the Rawlings boys, had on them no preachers, lawyers, dentists and locomotive firemen, and that by this omission on the part of the jury commissioners of Lowndes county, the jury was not composed wholly of the "upright and intelligent men specified in section 818 of the penal code.

The signature of Chief Justice Fish, while in no sense a supersedure in itself, has the effect of operating as one, in that the sentence of death which hangs over three of the men will be necessarily delayed until the supreme court of the United States can pass on the question.

WILL COME TO STATESBORO.

Unusual Character Known As The Great Dillingham to Visit This City.

GIVES AWAY MONEY. Has Made a Fortune in Past Three Years And Wears Many Diamonds.

If reports are true Statesboro is soon to be visited by a most unusual character. At a meeting of the trustees of the Statesboro Institute held at the school building on Monday evening, the following corps of teachers were elected for the next twelve months: Principals, G. B. Franklin and Fred Brinson; assistants, Misses Mattie Lively, Maude Akins, Pauline Smith, Hattie Newton and Ella Trappell; eleventh, Miss Earle Wood; music, Miss Leslie Brannen.

It was decided to augment the school fund by the levying of a matriculation tax of fifty cents per month on pupils below the 7th grade, and \$1 per month for pupils of the 7th grade and above. Half of this amount is payable on entrance. The city council was asked to pass a curfew law, compelling all boys under 16 years of age to be in before 9 o'clock at night or submit a showing from either parent or guardian.
