## Hon. F. H. Saffold Endorsed for Judge

By Board of Commissioners  
of Emanuel County.

[From the Forest-Blade.]

It is gratifying, indeed, for all who are interested in the race for the judgeship of the Middle circuit, to note the gains that are being made in the contest by Emanuel's clever and popular candidate, Hon. F. H. Saffold. The newspapers of the circuit are more friendly to the candidacy of Mr. Saffold than they were at his first announcement, and the people generally are beginning to realize, to agree and to concede that it is high time that the section of the circuit, the "Wire-grass" counties, should have a say in the selection of a judge. It is not so much a matter of section, as there are good and true men in every part of the Middle circuit, who would make a good judge, and one section produces just as good brain, and just as able men, as another; but the people are getting wise to the fact that the lower portion of the circuit has not had a judge within the memory of the present generation, and as Emanuel county has placed her favorite son in the race for this honorable office, all things else being equal, they are going to give the wiregrass candidate their support.

While territory or place of residence should not be the only qualification for a judge, yet we are of the opinion that the same is worthy of consideration, and when we present to the circuit a man with knowledge of the law, experience at the bar and ability to serve the people of the entire circuit with honesty, uprightness, justice and fairness, he ought, and we believe will receive the support of all fair-minded people.

Saffold's home people, those staunch and sterling citizens of this good old county of Emanuel, those who by constant contact and close association best know the man, are squarely behind his candidacy, and are doing all they can for his election. Disgraced Clergman Ends Life With Poison  
Peoria, Ill., Feb. 6.—The Rev. George Simmons committed suicide last night. He was found dead in bed by a member of the family this morning. He had taken cyanide of potassium.

Dr. Simmons was pastor of the First Baptist church and originator of "A Substitute for Coffee." He was the author of religious books and widely known as a lecturer.

Recently he was chosen to take charge of the senatorial campaign for ex-Governor Yates. Dr. Simmons was one of the best known preachers in the West.

It was not until last week that any word had been whispered against his personal character. Saturday complaint was made to the state's attorney that Dr. Simmons had been corrupting the minds and morals of the young boys of the Baptist Boys' Brigade.

A fact investigation revealed the facts, though they were kept from the general public.

Monday the editors of the local papers called Simmons before them and gave him 24 hours to leave town. This he agreed to do. He resigned the presidency of two banks which he had organized.

Atlanta has a way of getting all that she goes after, but Macon is working like a Trojan, and may take off the prize. Atlanta gave \$45,000.00 for it last year, and the chances are that the city that gets it this year will pay well for it.

## To Make the Saloon Business Respectable.

One of the questions to be settled in the present campaign, so we are informed, is to make the saloon business respectable by electing a saloon owner governor of the state.

Our good friend, the Dublin Times, in its support of Hon. Hoke Smith to the governorship, reasons this issue, and jumps with both feet on the author of a certain circular received by a minister of Hoke Smith. Our good friend, the Times, loses its temper in the discussion of the circular, the saloon and the saloon candidate. The circular is reproduced below, and we submit that the position taken by its author is in place and a matter for the good people of the state to consider.

Now, as we understand it, it is true that Mr. Hoke Smith is a one-third owner of the Piedmont hotel saloon in Atlanta. His money went to equip it and run it until his opponents made it too hot for him, when he is said to have "drained" it like a hot potato and let it out on shares. We believe the first excuse was that Mr. Smith was too pious to use any of the profits from the sale of whiskey over his bar and gave it to charity. Seeing that the charity dodge won't work, he has let it be thing out on shares. Now Mr. Smith claims that he opposed the saloon business, but a majority of the stockholders forced him into it.

Now, it seems to us that if we were opposed to the saloon business, we would simply unload by selling our interest in said saloon, and not dodge around the corner by letting it out on shares.

In Mr. Smith is elected governor, Georgia will have the distinction of having what no other state that we know of has, viz: a proprietor of a whiskey saloon sitting in the gubernatorial chair. And if that doesn't tone up the business we don't know how it could be done.

Will You Vote To Save Our Boys? I appeal to you as Christian men to see that Mr. Hoke Smith, who partly owns the Piedmont bar in Atlanta, does not succeed in being elected governor, and thereby make respectable the business of conducting a groggery.

The saloon with its enticing pictures, fine statuary and gilded adornments does more to entrap and destroy our young men by reason of its very attractiveness, than any low dive could.

Not content with running the Piedmont bar, Mr. Smith is also an active member of the Capitol City Club of Atlanta.

Can we who vote as we pray ask sanction of our Maker in assisting to make the destruction of our young men respectable; and one of the agencies of their ruin the chief executive of model commonwealth?

Pray over this subject, and then vote to save your sons, as well as the husbands of your pure daughters from the tears, the suffering and the curse of intemperance.

That you may be convinced, by your own sense, of the seductive

and deadly influence of this pitfall of sin, we only ask that you inspect at your convenience the Piedmont bar in which Mr. Hoke Smith is one of the co-partners.

Will Get Ten Per Cent Judge A. H. McDonnell, referee in bankruptcy, was in the city on Tuesday for the purpose of adjudicating the bankruptcy case of P. Williams. The assets consisted of about \$2,000.00 insurance money, and the liabilities amounted to about \$3,000.00. ## EDITORIALS

There are too many small towns, too many small villages and too much small politics in Iowa, declares the Des Moines Register.

Save the fringe Constitution! Save the big trees of California! Save Niagara Falls! Don't think you have discharged your full duty as an American when you have saved your cigar labels, admonishes Pack.

The New York Evening Post says that more moose and deer have been killed in the State of Maine this year, according to unofficial estimates, than in any year for which statistics are available. On a basis of the carcasses shipped by rail, the kill of deer is put at from 20,000 to 25,000, and that of moose at 450 to 500.

It is very difficult to say what have regular proposals—why some girls attract attention only, while others attract "attentionless." There are pretty and popular women, continues the Lady's Realm, to whom nobody proposes; there are plainer ones with whom every second man finds himself contemplating marriage.

There are in the United States at present, states the Philadelphia Inquirer, 154 trust companies, with resources aggregating \$2,502,000,000; 5757 national banks, with resources of \$7,472,000,000; 1157 savings banks, with \$2,175,000,000; total active life insurance resources something less than \$2,500,000,000; currency in the United States Treasury, \$228,000,000.

The Rochester Post-Express says: Many persons have an objection to riding in elevators, or, more properly speaking, this objection should be changed to a feeling of dread or fear, but according to the superintendent of a big office building in Philadelphia the safest place for a person to be is in an elevator—that is, statistically speaking. In the set of elevators for which statistics have been kept by the superintendent there has been an average transportation of 2,400,000 persons each year for seven years, an aggregate of 16,800,000, and of this number but one person has been injured, and that injury did not result fatally.

As a result of recent scientific investigations, it may be possible to revise our ideas of the barrenness of the Sahara Desert, since it has been found by bores that there are numerous springs which rise to the surface and make possible a system of irrigation, states Harper's Weekly. In the territory to the south of Algeria a government irrigation survey has been at work making a series of deep-test borings, some of which are as deep as 2000 feet. In this way considerable water has been encountered, and in certain cases already twice the usual amount of water has been made available for the palm groves.

The study of English is compulsory in the Mexican public schools, says the Review of Reviews. Every year Mexico sends to the United States a number of school teachers to study American pedagogic methods. A great many Mexican children are being educated in the schools and colleges of this country, where formerly they were sent to Europe. The number of Mexican visitors to the United States and the number of visitors to Mexico are increasing every year. It is now said that Mexicans know New York better than the City of Mexico and that most coast Mexicans are more at home in San Francisco than in their own capital city. Thus each year the American way of living is taking deeper hold on the Mexican people.

French men of letters, those who produce books that are worth while, their home public less and less appreciative, according to the writer of a Paris letter in the Pall Mall Gazette. Others have noted the same condition, which is attributed to a remarkable outbreak of amateur industry. The correspondent says that "every man with any pretensions to social consideration produces his own novel, which he lays with immense pride on his drawing room table." The skilled and conscientious literary writer is not the only one who suffers from this wholesale competition, for the general reading public has the "keen edge" of its literary appetite taken off by vast and woolly books published because the author pays the bill.

## GEORGIA BRIEFS

**Four Candidates Favor Macon.**  
Dr. G. A. Nunnally, candidate for governor, has expressed himself as favoring Macon for the state democratic convention. Messrs. Howell, Russell, Estill and Nunnally have agreed that Macon is the place.

**All Favor Wheeler Memorial.**  
Georgia, through its governor; Atlanta, through its mayor, and the Atlanta chamber of commerce, through its secretary, have become enthusiastic advocates of the Wheeler memorial to be held in Atlanta on the last day of the present month.

**Suspected of Being Bank Robber.**  
James Dayton, a young white man, is under arrest at Savannah. He is severely wounded in the leg, and is suspected of having recently burglarized the bank at Grays, near Macon, with confederates, and with having stolen a horse and buggy and made his escape.

**Will Experiment With Tobacco.**  
After visiting a number of points in the Gainesville district with two tobacco culture experts Congressman Bell has returned to Washington. Mr. Bell arranged for experiments to be made with Sumatra tobacco in Hall, Gwinnett, Cherokee and White counties. These experiments will be paid for by the United States government, and the experts believe will be successful. The soil appears to be suited for the successful growth of Sumatra tobacco. The experts will keep in touch with the results so that a fair test may be obtained.

**Eleven Counts the Limit.**  
At a meeting of the executive committee of the Georgia Farmers' Union held in Atlanta the past week, a circular was prepared instructing the farmers of the state not to sell their cotton until it reaches 11 cents, and to hold cotton seed until price reaches \$20 a ton.

This circular was sent to all the members of the Farmers' Union in Georgia. Similar action in regard to making the price of cotton 11 cents or more will be taken at the coming meeting of the national executive committee, thus pledging all the members of the union in the United States to hold cotton until it reaches 11 cents.

**To Make Present of Sirup Plant.**  
According to a Washington dispatch the government of the United States will present its sirup experiment station at Waycross to the Georgia Agricultural experiment station, if the officials of the experiment station will agree to continue its operation at Waycross. This was determined at a meeting of the house agricultural affairs committee.

**To Advance Rawlings Cases.**  
With the idea of advancing on the docket the appeals in the case of J. J. Milton and Jesse Rawlings and others, sentenced to be hanged in Louisiana for the murder of the Carter children, Attorney General Hart is preparing a motion which he will present to the United States supreme court.

In the ordinary course of business the supreme court would probably not reach these cases for over a year, and it was for the purpose of hurrying matters that Attorney General Hart decided to prepare his motion. Attorney Cooper, for the elder Rawlings, appealed the case on a writ of error. It is usual for the supreme court to grant requests of this kind made by the various states.

**Report of Tag Sales Withheld.**  
The announcement is made at the state department of agriculture that no statements regarding the number of fertilizer tags sold to the manufacturers, will be given out until the close of the season, which is October 1, next.

It will be recalled that acting under suggestions from various sources, former Commissioner of Agriculture O. B. Stevens gave out statements from time to time last year regarding the sales of fertilizer tags, and these statements resulted in no little discussion in the newspapers and some criticism of the department because it was claimed, a large number of the tags sold were not used, but wasted. The charge was made that these tags had been purchased in large quantities for the purpose of bearing the cotton market.

**Costly Blaze in Valdosta.**  
A fire originating in the paint shop of the Henderson, Cranford Busby company at Valdosta destroyed property valued at \$125,000. The property destroyed included the Georgia Southern railroad freight depot, eight or ten freight cars on the Georgia Southern tracks, loaded with merchandise, two blocks of cottages, the Valdosta

laundry and Armour & Co's warehouse.

The heaviest losses are the Henderson-Cranford Busby company, who carried a stock valued at \$20,000 and occupied a building worth \$30,000. The company had insurance for two thirds this amount. The railroad losses will be from fifteen to twenty thousand dollars.

**Alleged Wife Poisoner Arrested.**  
A sensation was sprung at Moultrie's two days ago when the coroner was called upon to investigate the death of Mrs. Stacy Tucker, wife of E. W. Tucker, a well known farmer, living near Hartsville. Mrs. Tucker died nearly a month ago, and was buried, but rumors were quietly set afloat, it seems, to the effect that she had been poisoned by her husband.

It developed the past week that the Phoenix Life Insurance company, in which Mrs. Tucker was insured for \$5,000, has held up payment of the policy, and that they have in their possession an affidavit made by the nurse attending Mrs. Tucker that the deceased made a dying statement to her that she had been poisoned by her husband.

On the evidence of Mrs. Abbott, and at the request of the relatives, the jury recommended that the body be exhumed and an autopsy held.

**New Science Hall Burned.**  
The James M. Smith science hall at the state normal school, which was burned to the ground on the night of the 31st instant.

The building was almost finished and would have been turned over to the school authorities by the contractor within the next six or eight weeks at the latest. As it is the loss falls on the contractor, George B. Hinman of Atlanta.

The insurance on the building amounted to about fifteen thousand dollars and the loss will be about \$17,000.

The building was the handsomest on the campus of the normal school. The work of plastering the second story was progressing and when it became apparent that the temperature would fall below freezing two stoves were placed on the second floor to prevent the freezing of the plastering.

The fire caught from one of these stoves. The city fire department responded to the call for assistance. The fire had gained too much headway, however, to save the building and the attention of the department was devoted to saving the other buildings.

As soon as possible the state normal school authorities will provide for the construction of the building again.

**President Johnson Urges Loyalty.**  
President Johnson of the Georgia division Southern Cotton Association has issued the following statement to the farmers, merchants and bankers who are interested in the welfare and prosperity of their own sections:

"The Southern Cotton Association is now in the midst of the most important period of its existence. The Georgia division is expected to take the lead in the movement which promises fifteen-cent cotton. The necessity for thorough organization, a loyal membership and sufficient financial support is now most pressing. The county associations are urged to get together and push this work without delay."

"Each of these important points is particularly to be stressed, in view of the campaign outlined for the next ninety days."

"First—There is the battle for fifteen-cent cotton. Surely the great good done by the association in the past, and the vast volume of money which has gone into every business in the south, will command the loyalty of cotton growers and merchants. It would be their duty to stand by the movement which would rise up and curse its maker."

## RATE BILL IS BIFFED.

Much Fault Found With the Measure by Its Supporters in the House.

Considerable fault was found with the railroad rate bill in the house Monday, considering the fact that it is a measure of both parties.

Mr. Tilden of Maine opened the day with a whirlwind speech, in which he pointed out the drastic and far-reaching effect of its provisions. The committee, he said, had done much better than the president had recommended, and much further than he was willing to do. He would not vote for the bill.

Mr. Grosvenor of Ohio ridiculed the alleged popular demand for legislation, picked flaws in the construction of the bill, complained because amendments were to be allowed, and concluded with the statement that he would vote against the bill.

Developing his contention that under the bill the commission could regulate the differential between the long and short haul, Mr. Littlefield said he was unwilling that a political commission should say whether or not the New England cotton manufacturers should or should not be wiped out.

He would, he said, demonstrate from their own record the utter incapacity of the interstate commerce commission to administer rates.

"And I will give them that square deal that we have talked of so much and see so little practiced." (Laughter.)

He said that out of twenty-four decisions regarding undue discrimination, eight of them had been sustained by the courts. The bill made four a quorum.

This made it possible for a president to remove these members and leave the whole great power in the hands of three men, a majority of the four, who could be of any political belief which happened to predominate.
