### Disgraced Clergman Ends Life With Poison

Peoria, Ill., Feb. 6.—The Rev. George Simmons committed suicide last night. He was found dead in bed by a member of the family this morning. He had taken cyanide of potassium.

Dr. Simmons was pastor of the First Baptist church and originator of "A Substitute for Coffee." He was the author of religious books and widely known as a lecturer.

Recently he was chosen to take charge of the senatorial campaign for ex-Governor Yates. Dr. Simmons was one of the best known preachers in the West.

It was not until last week that any word had been whispered against his personal character. Saturday complaint was made to the state's attorney that Dr. Simmons had been corrupting the minds and morals of the young boys of the Baptist Boys' Brigade. A quiet investigation revealed the facts, though they were kept from the general public.

Monday the editors of the local papers called Simmons before them and gave him 24 hours to leave town. This he agreed to do. He resigned the presidency of two banks which he had organized.

### Mistrial in Groover Case

He takes the position that our white primaries, as they have been held in the past, insure the state against the negro and at the same time rob us worthy white man of his right to vote. He further takes the position that if you make the ballot the prize for education, the negro will lay down the shovel and the hoe and fill the school houses.

Mr. Howell is on a safe, sane and conservative platform, and his election as governor of the great state of Georgia is a foregone conclusion.

### White Man Shot Negro in Head.

Montgomery, Ala., Feb. 6.—Jim Cotton, a negro was shot to death Sunday at Elminville by a mob of white men.

Saturday Cotton, who was drunk, cursed Jim Phillips, a guano salesman, and the white man administered a thrashing. That night as Phillips sat in his room, some one fired upon him with a shot gun loaded with small shot. Several window panes were broken, but Phillips was not injured.

There was evidence that Cotton had fired the shots, and Sunday morning a number of white men went to his home and shot his brains out.

So far no arrests have been made, but a searching inquiry into the affair will be made by the authorities.

WHY HE RESIGNED DEMOCRATS BOUND

Former Engineer Wallace of Canal Commission Talks. San Domingo Treaty. CROMWELL A HANDICAP ARE FORCED INTO LINE.

Chief "Advisor" Proved Heavy Burden on Wallace's Shoulders and Job Was Thrown Up to Shake Him Off.

John F. Wallace, former chief engineer of the isthmian canal commission, testified before the senate committee at Washington Monday on his resignation.

Mr. Wallace said he had taken every precaution to avoid a private talk with Secretary Taft. This was denied him. In regard to the type of canal, he was asked to be expressed from anxiety to the thought that he had been placed in a secondary position.

One of the reasons for his withdrawal, he said, had been that he had drawn many mistakes in his attitude toward the canal, and that Secretary Taft and Mr. Cromwell had made mistakes in doing so.

The inquiry was pursued by Senator Morgan to determine "what Mr. Cromwell had to do with it." Mr. Wallace then read from a public letter issued by Secretary Taft, saying that Mr. Cromwell, through designation of the president, had been retained in an advisory capacity.

Mr. Wallace said he felt that Cromwell had a great deal of influence with the controlling force in the management of the property.
