Graves Forced From The News

Atlanta, Feb.—Hon. John Temple Graves, one of the founders of the Atlanta News and until Tuesday morning its editor-in-chief, has resigned his position with the paper to take effect immediately, as a result of the litigation which has been pending for several weeks between himself and Charles Daniel and others.

Col. Graves claimed that the paper was under the domination of the Southern and Central railways as the result of a trade made between Mr. Daniel and Samuel Spencer, president of the Southern Railway and still asserts his belief in the corporate domination of the paper. Through his attorney, Col. Clifford L. Anderson, he stated Tuesday morning in Judge Pendleton's court such belief was the cause of the severance of his connection with the paper.

SAVED FROM THE NOOSE.

Jim Carter Snatched From the Scaffold By Reconsideration of Prison Board.

Jim Carter, convicted of the murder of his wife last August and sentenced to be hanged today, has been commuted to life imprisonment.

Col. H. B. Strange, who has worked faithfully to save the negro's neck, never gave up, and on Wednesday went to Atlanta to appear before the governor and make one last appeal to save Jim's neck. He had obtained the signature of nearly everybody in town and the surrounding country, as many as it was possible to see in the short time after deciding to make the final appeal. He had been turned down by the pardon board, but decided to put it up to the governor.

On Wednesday morning he appeared before Governor Terrell in Atlanta and presented the petition, together with an editorial from the Statesboro News, stating that the people were surprised at the board, and would be satisfied with a life time sentence. The governor refused to interfere, but stated that the pardon board would be in session that same day to reconsider another matter, and he would put the matter back before them. This was done, and about this time a telegram signed by several prominent men here, among them city and county officials, was received, asking that the sentence be commuted. Col. Strange appeared before the board in the afternoon, and after presenting the matter again, he secured a decision from them commuting Carter to life imprisonment.

When Col. Strange arrived he went to the jail where old Jim was fairly quaking with fear and delivered the message to him. The old negro hardly knew how to

express his thanks to Col. Strange for the interest he had taken to save his neck from the gallows that stood open to receive him. The bag of sand was still hanging to the rope and the black cap was ready. He looked square into eternity. He professed that he had made it right, but his extreme fear of the fate that awaited him made it appear doubtful if he had obtained that measure of forgiveness that would tide him safely over the "river sticks."

He will be taken to one of the convict camps in the state and soon begin to do service for his state for the balance of his days. He seems to be as happy as if he had been set free.

Col. Strange has certainly worked hard and successfully against great odds, and his victory in this matter is quite a compliment to his never ceasing energy when he sets in to win.

The strong petition sent up by the best people of this section goes to show that the white people of Bulloch county are not out for the blood of the negro, they are law abiding, but when a crime is committed like the one on the Hodges family the same thing may be expected here or elsewhere in Georgia.

Sam Hall Gets Good Job.

Mr. S. A. Hall, for several years conductor on the Savannah & Statesboro Ry., has accepted the position of train master on the Augusta & Florida Ry. from Swainsboro leading towards Augusta. Mr. Hall left on Tuesday to take charge of his new position.

Mr. Hall is a first class railroad man, and by his strict attention to business has won for himself a good place with one of the best new roads in this section.

That New School Building at Metter.

Mr. Editor: You hit the nail on the head last week when you said "Metter needs a new school building, and needs it bad." I think there are others that stand with us on this question.

I am now teaching my third term at Metter, and can testify that I have never seen a more generous, hospitable people; they have always responded liberally to every call I have made for the betterment of the educational interest of the community—all but one—they have not built the new house, and to this minute I am unable to say why it has not been done. They are financially able, and seem willing enough, but as Senator Tillman says, "There is something rotten in Denmark." It is the only impediment that checks the possibility of their having a school that is the pride of the town, for I have never seen better material for a good school. Despite of these many disadvantages the school has increased to such an extent that another building and teacher are now being allowed. Still the question is allowed to become a kind of a joke, and is beginning to be looked upon in about the same light as a trip across the ocean on a bicycle would be regarded.

You intimated that it was a matter of petty differences. I am not prepared to defend or refute that argument, but I will say this, and that is enough, whatever the cause may be it is high time the cause is being investigated and a remedy applied, for every cause has its effect, and the more vital the cause, the more vital the effect. The effect will soon present itself if a remedy can't be found.

If I know myself I think I have the highest educational development of the boys and girls of Metter close to my heart, but no superior degree of excellency can be attained till a more suitable building and equipments are procured. That can never be done till every citizen of the Metter school district realizes that he is personally responsible for allowing his children to go to school in a house that he would apologize to move a negro into. Two or three can't do the work; there must be a unit of every man in the district, and they must forget all else but the fact that the new building must come. If they would come together with the interests of their homes and children at heart they would have no time to think of anything else. The "petty differences" would vanish as mists before the mid-day sun.

Mr. Editor, I'll stop. These words are addressed directly to the people of Metter, but if anybody else in Bulloch county is in the same fix let them take a dose of it, too; if that fails to keep double the dose, and don't get mad, for it is often the worst tasting medicine that does the most good; then, too, you know, Bro. Sam P. Jones says it is the hit that will howl, but I don't believe he can howl down the facts I have given him.

Col. Strange's Yard Stick.

Our readers are perhaps familiar with the yard stick published by Col. H. B. Strange in our issue of last Friday.

The questions propounded by Col. Strange to the announced as well as prospective candidates for representative are ones on which our people are pretty well agreed, and the News hopes to see those who desire to represent this good old county in the legislature answer them, and let the people know how they stand. If you are opposed to any or all of the propositions laid down, have the nerve and backbone to come out and say so, then your friends will know how you stand. Give your reasons for your position. The columns of the News are open for your answer one way or the other.

We believe that the questions put forth by Col. Strange are correct and timely. We see a great many people tearing their hair for a failed reform candidate for governor, some man who they think is going to "save the state." Now we can tell you that unless you put in some members of the legislature who stand right on certain questions of reform, which are those laid down by Col. Strange, which are produced here, you had just as well throw away your vote for governor.

As we are informed, any one of the candidates for governor will sign these bills if they are passed by the legislature and put up to them. That is all they can do. A governor can approve bills passed by the legislature, and enforce laws already on the statutes, and that is about all that they can do. That amounts to very much in the way of reforms.

The root of the movement lies in the general assembly, and if you waste all your time looking for reform candidates for governor, and lose sight of the main power, you have accomplished nothing. The questions propounded by Col. Strange follow:

1. How do you stand on the bill to prohibit free passes?
2. Will you support a bill requiring all foreign corporations to incorporate in Georgia?
3. Will you support a bill to prorogue the school tax fund between the white and colored children of this state in proportion to the amount of taxes paid by each?
4. Will you support a bill to regulate child labor in the cotton mills of this state?
5. Will you support a bill to elect the railroad commissioners of this state by the people?

Farm Labor Scarce.

There is an unquenchable demand in this county for farm labor, and one that seems to remain unsatisfied. Our information is to the effect that there are very few negroes working on the farm; they are either working on some public works, loafing around town or going to school. The majority of the young negroes are in school. The plow handles stand idle for the negro to equip himself with an education; then he will be unfitted to grasp them, and unwilling, too. A good many farmers are agitating the question of joining in the movement to import a few car loads of foreign white labor. Unless this is done the labor question is settled in this country—settled in the manner referred to above. The white plow handles will be taken up by the negro who had gloves to school. Then he will learn to think like Bishop Turner, that "a negro is better than a white man."

May be Something Doing.

The air is full of railroad rumors. It may be that we shall see some developments in this section in the near future that will startle the natives.

Railroad up like politics. One crowd is in power today to be supplanted by another tomorrow. It has not been long since Barr and his faction ousted John Skelton Williams and his crowd from the Seaboard Air Line. When Mr. Williams and his friends went, along with them went Mr. Cecil Gabbett. Now we see Williams getting control of the Seaboard again, and Mr. Gabbett made general manager of the Augusta & Florida railway, a line in the hand of John Skelton Williams is plainly visible.

Mr. Williams and party were in Savannah a few days ago. It is rumored that a number of small lines are being absorbed, among them the Miller & Southwestern. If this should prove to be true, then it is plain that the Augusta & Florida will be built from Midville to Garfield, and the Miller & Southwestern used to Vidalia, where a connecting link will be built to Douglas; from there, we understand, they have a line into Valdosta and thence to Florida.

Now, if the same forces who are back of the Seaboard are back of the Augusta & Florida, and they build to Garfield in order to connect with the Miller & Southwestern, then it is as plain as the nose on a man's face that the link between Garfield and Statesboro must come, too. Then by the use of the Savannah & Statesboro at this place, a direct line will be afforded into Savannah.

We don't know much, but just wait and see what will happen in this week of the woods in the near future.

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NUNNALLY RAKES HOKE SMITH. Gal In Fountain Declared Insult to Womanhood of Georgia.

Dr. G. A. Nunnally, one of the candidates for governor, opened his campaign at Monroe, Ga., on Wednesday. He devoted considerable part of his speech to Hon. Hoke Smith's whiskey saloon and its environments. In speaking of the large statue of a woman, bereft of all clothing, which is very prominently displayed in that saloon, Dr. Nunnally made the following strong appeal:

"THE GAL IN THE FOUNTAIN."

"In the furnishing of that saloon," said Dr. Nunnally, "and his money (referring to Mr. Smith) helped to furnish it, he selected as an ornament a statue of a woman. The artist may have taken a Georgia beauty for his model, carved with all the exquisiteness of skill and taste, a woman, diaphanous and undraped. There she stands in all the sweet proportions of nature's noblest effort, exposed to the lechered and lecherous gaze, to bacchanalian mock and jeer of the devil's own emissaries. There she stands, and were it not metal insensate, it would blush at the indecency and obscenity and vulgarity of the situation. There it stands, inviting insult and ribald jest and lustful look and licentious passions. There she stands, and his half drunken patrons with the fires of passion inflamed by the wines and brandy, comment on her beauties, compare her with the fair, pure women who pass the door, and then go out to plunge into deeper pollutions. There she stands, an offense to good taste, an insult to decency, an outrage on virtue, a death at the heart of virginity, a stab at the heart of motherhood, a bolt from hell against the gates of heaven. Women, mothers, daughters, wives, ye pure angels sent of God to make this old world happy and to be the light of the world, rise brighter and purer, hear me: Rise in the wrath of offended and insulted and wounded virtue, and hold the hand of the man who would cast a ballot for a candidate whose public business has wrought such havoc upon humanity, home and God. Use a woman's compelling argument, a love that is invincible and unconquerable, and honor yourselves and save your children from such shame and degradation."

Franklin Agrees With Carpenters

The breach between Contractor A. J. Franklin and the Carpenters Union has been healed and the men will go back to work. The terms on which they go back is that nine hours a day is to prevail, and the men make certain concessions in the way of making good work that does not meet the approval of the foreman at the job. France seems to be bound to have a President with civil wishes, and the Chicago Record-Herald, perhaps this is France's remotest way of endeavoring to pattern after Uncle Sam.

Times have not changed much in a century, thinks the St. Louis Globe-Democrat. In 1801 it was a procession through the streets of St. Petersburg preceded by the carcasses of his grand father, followed by those of his father and surrounded by his own.

The extent of the pressure put upon builders of railroad rolling stock by the enormous traffic incident to a prosperous year is shown by the fact that the Baldwin works turn out a finished locomotive every three and a half hours, excluding Sundays. By this rate of production it will not be long before the demand, continues the Hartford Courant, and the capacity of the plant is to be increased so that a locomotive can be sent out every two and a half hours.

Important historical, grabbing after facts, have destroyed young George Washington's hatchet and taken the apple from the hand of William Tell's little boy, declares the Philadelphia Record. Equally intrusive antiquarians with the fervor of iconoclasts. Pennsylvania University is not alone. The terrible Professor Furtwangler has been the center of the contents of the Chicago Art Institute, some of the treasures of the Metropolitan Museum in New York and valued exhibits of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington.

That much literature of the day is not worthy of attention, that modern philosophy is the creed of brutality, and that the new school of "naturalism" is undermining the moral foundations of society were some of the conclusions of Dr. Emil G. Hirsch in an address before the Hull House Women's Club. "Man is much the same as he was a thousand years ago," said Dr. Hirsch. "The same elemental passions, ambitions and appetites obtain. They are the same as those of the brutes. The latest announcement of modern philosophy is that you may do what you want to, but don't get caught at it. If you do, commit suicide."

Both imports and exports in 1905 exceeded the records of past years, asserts the New York Times. The Government figures complete for eleven months show that a proportionate commerce in December would make a total of \$1,170,000,000 imports, against \$1,035,000,000 last year, and of \$1,257,000,000 exports, against \$1,177,000,000, the "record" in 1900. The excess of imports in 1900, more than \$300,000,000, will not be nearly equalled. Upon the year's total, with December averaged, exports from Atlantic ports have since 1894 increased fifty-two per cent., from Gulf ports 150 per cent., from Mexican border ports 270 per cent., from Pacific border and lake ports 237 per cent.

The announcement under a short time ago by Heinrich Conried of a plan for the foundation of an endowed theatre, devoted to the interpretation of the best plays of the world, aroused fully as much surprise as enthusiasm, relates Harper's Weekly. The importance of the scheme which the prospective manager of the new theatre had outlined was not denied. But it was doubted whether it would be possible, even with the support of millionaires, to attain the objects of the enterprise. Happily for American playgoers, Mr. Conried is not frightened by obstacles. The success which has attended him at the Metropolitan Opera House, in New York City, and the ability with which, for many years, he has managed his own Irving Place Theatre, in the same city, have assured him the capital that he needed for his purpose. With that and his intelligence to help him he will keep his promise.

FOR A LOOK CANAL

President Goes on Record in Transmitting Report.

A LETTER TO CONGRESS

Roosevelt Says That Type of Canal Will Be Built Unless National Lawmakers Should Decease Otherwise.

President Roosevelt Monday transmitted to Congress the report of the board of consulting engineers on the Panama canal commission, together with the letter of Secretary Taft, the report of the isthmian canal commission and a letter by Chief Engineer Stevens.

The letter of the president in part is as follows: "To the Senate and House of Representatives: I submit herewith the letter of the secretary of war transmitting the report of the board of consulting engineers on the Panama canal and the report of the isthmian canal commission thereon, together with a letter written to the chairman of the isthmian commission by Chief Engineer Stevens. Both the board of consulting engineers and the canal commission differ in their report. The majority of the board of consulting engineers, eight in number, including the five foreign engineers, favor a sea level canal, and one member of the canal commission, Admiral Radcliff, takes the same view. Five of the eight American members of the board of consulting engineers and five members of the isthmian canal commission favor the lock canal, and so does Chief Engineer Stevens. The secretary of war recommends a lock canal, and the recommendation of the majority of the board of consulting engineers, and of the majority of the canal commission. After careful study of the papers submitted, and full and mature consideration of the whole subject, I concur in this recommendation.

"It will be noticed that the American engineers on the consulting board, and on the commission by more than a 2 to 1 majority, favor the lock canal, whereas the foreign engineers are a unit against this.

"Each type has certain disadvantages, and there are advantages very much greater in a lock canal, substantially proposed as in the papers forwarded herewith, and the chief engineer, who will be mainly responsible for the success of the thirty engineering feat, and who has therefore a peculiar personal interest in judging aright, is emphatically and earnestly in favor of the lock canal, and, against the sea level project.

"The sea level canal would be slightly less exposed to damage in the event of war; the running expenses, apart from the heavy cost of interest on the amount expended to build it would be less, and for small ships the time of transit would probably be less. On the other hand, the lock canal at a level of 90 feet, or thereabout, would not cost much more than half as much to build, and could be built in about half the time; there would be very much less risk connected with building it, and for large ships the transit would be quicker, while, taking into account the interest saved on building, the actual cost of maintenance would be less. After being built, it would be easier to enlarge the lock canal than the sea level canal.

"Moreover what has been actually demonstrated in making and operating the great lock canal, the Soo, a more important artery of traffic than the great sea level canal, the Suez, goes to support the opinion of the board of consulting engineers, and of the majority of the isthmian canal commission as to the superior feasibility and desirability of building a lock canal.

"The law now on our statute book seems to mean a lock canal. In my judgment a lock canal as herein recommended is advisable."

TRIO OF BILLS ARE PASSED.

One Foretells Gambling in Territories of United States. Three bills were passed under suspension of the rules, and of a two-thirds vote in the House Monday. The first makes gambling unlawful in the territories of the United States, including Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Indian Territory and Alaska. The second provides additional work for the census bureau by requiring statistics on insurance, fisheries, savings banks and crimes.

DEATH MENACES HENDERSON.

Ex-Speaker Has Suffered Stroke of Paralysis. A dispatch from Dubuque, Iowa, says: Speaker David B. Henderson has suffered another paralytic stroke, which has deprived him of his sight. His general condition is worse. It is believed that the end is near.

REVIEW BY THE COURTS

Seems to Be Bugaboo Feature of Hepburn Rate Bill—Cat is Now Out of the Bag.

"We have heard many opinions on the railroad question as there are members of the committee, and each man is afraid to bring the court review feature to a vote." said Chairman Elkins Friday when the senate committee on interstate commerce at Washington adjourned until next Thursday without having taken a vote on a bill or considered an amendment for judicial review of orders of the interstate commerce commission.

This statement was made in the presence of Senators Doolittle and Clapp, who are contending for the Hepburn bill in the form that it came from the house. It was said in fact, but it is believed that it more nearly expressed the situation than any previous alleged authoritative announcement.

The committee agreed that important amendments will not be voted on until Friday of next week. Ostensibly the committee adjourned because Senator Tillman was suddenly taken ill with threatened pneumonia and could not be present, but it is believed that the committee adjourned because Senator Cullum will threaten from Florida some time next week and cast his vote in the committee. The real reason for adjournment is believed to be the attitude of certain democratic members in not disclosing their positions on the court review feature. Neither republican faction in the committee was certain of the outcome and a vote therefore was not insisted upon.

Without taking up the question of judicial review of orders of the commission, the committee considered many amendments offered to other sections of the Hepburn bill. Senator Carmack offered an amendment increasing the interstate commerce commission from five to nine. This amendment was adopted by a vote of six to five, as follows:

Affirmative—Elkins, Aldrich, Keam, Carmack, Foster and Crane. Negative—Foraker, Doolittle, Clapp, McFarland and Newlands. It was agreed, however, that Messrs. Cullum and Tillman may have their votes recorded on this amendment and this may change the result, though this is not believed likely. Several amendments were offered providing for both inclusion and exclusion of express companies and proprietary cars under the bill, but no action was taken. There was also a number of amendments offered to section 1 of the Hepburn bill, on the subject of what is known as joint rates.

No amendments were offered at the session which had a year ago the court features affecting rates fixed by the commission. It had been said that Senator Knox would prepare an amendment on the subject acceptable to the president, but this rumor could not be confirmed.

Both republican factions express the belief that Attorney General Moody is the president's chief advisor on the subject of which express companies and Pullman cars will not be placed under the control of the interstate commerce commission.

HOST OF ALABAMA TEACHERS.

Over Two Thousand Persons Took the Examination for License. The total number of persons who took the examinations for teachers' licenses at the January examination in Alabama was 2,307, of whom 1,541 were successful in making good enough averages to get certificates. This left 666 who did not show enough efficiency to be allowed authority to teach in the schools of the state. The per cent of the entire number who passed was 65.20. Only 46 per cent of the negroes were accepted.

JEFFERSON DAY BANQUET.

To Be Held in Kansas City—Prominent Democrats Will Attend. Governor Joseph W. Folk and Senators Joseph W. Bailey of Texas and William J. Stone of Missouri have accepted invitations to respond to toasts at the Jefferson day banquet of the democratic editorial association, of Missouri, to be held in Kansas City on April 13. Invitations also have been extended to Clark Howell, editor of the Atlanta Constitution, and Governor John A. Johnson of Minnesota.

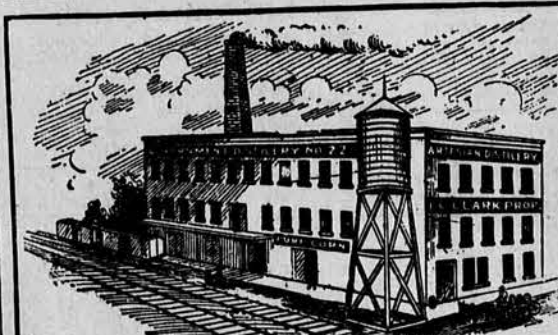
