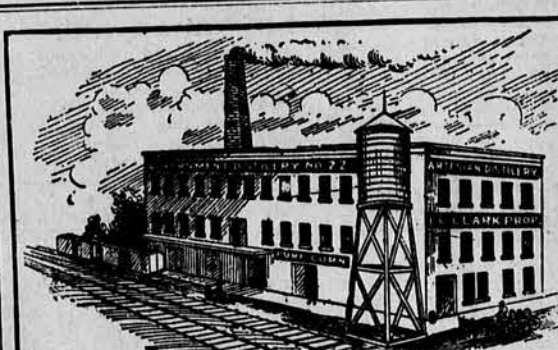

Jim Carter Begins His Life Service.

A guard from the penitentiary convict camp at Macon came down on Sunday and took Jim Carter, the negro who was to have been hung last Friday, off to the penitentiary where he will serve a life sentence. He will do service in a brick yard near Macon. At the train his two little boys bade him good bye. He gave to them some good advice, holding up himself as a terrible warning for them. He told them, showing them his hands cuffed together, to never live so that the hand cuffs would be fastened on them. He told them how to avoid it; to keep away from bad company, let whisky and cards alone and never touch a pistol. He held up his handcuffed hands to the large crowd of negroes gathered about the depot, and addressed a few words of sound warning to them. He told them to look at him and his plight and forever take warning not to follow his example. He seemed to be in fine spirits. The fact that he is alive seemed to overshadow all the hard labor that now confronts him.

The following is his dying statement dictated to Rev. T. J. Cobb, a few hours before he learned that his sentence had been commuted to life imprisonment. It is worth reading. It shows him to have been a man above the average of his race in point of intelligence.

Last Dying Words of Jim Carter.
When gathering clouds around I view Days are dark and friends are few On Him I lean, but not in vain I have experienced every human pain.

When each can see his brother's sigh Farewell to all.

EDITORIALS

The Publishers' Circular says: We hope the mystery of the north and south poles will never be discovered. The nations ought to keep those regions as international reserves of world mystery, almost the last of the unknown which is not unknown.

A Pekin newspaper published the following as to court fashions at the Chinese imperial palace this winter: "Ermine robes were first worn this season in the palace on the 22d last. Squirrel skins are the next on the list, to be followed by fox, and lastly sable at the new year."

The census returns show that five millions and more women are employed in the nation's industrial life. There are now three times as many women typographers as there were ten years ago, while the number of women bookkeepers and accountants has doubled. The percentage of saleswomen also shows a corresponding increase, continues the Kansas City Journal. Women have risen to be treasurers of street railways, presidents of national and savings banks, secretaries of financiers on salaries of \$10,000 and \$12,500, executive heads of building and contracting firms, buyers for large stores, etc.

Higher standards are not a matter of thought, but of life, declares the Sunday School Times. We cannot raise our standards of life merely by thinking about them. No inventor ever grew in fertility of successful ideas by confining himself to abstract thought, or to paper-and-pencil theory. He must put his ideas into practical and successful operation if he would gain fresh and improving ideas. And this is our only hope of spiritual growth. God cannot or will not, reveal new truth to one who is not living the truth that he knows. Standards have got to be lifted, if we would have them higher, and it takes the lift of life to raise them.

A striking confession of the enormous cost to the German people of the great armament which German statesmen have built up since the Franco-Prussian war is contained in a statement of the national debt, made by Chancellor von Bulow in the Reichstag on December 10, 1902. "The national debt," he said, "was free from debt until 1871, but now the empire owes \$750,000,000 and \$250,000,000 must be paid annually for interest on this sum. Adding to the empire's debt the individual debts of the States forming it, and the grand total is brought up to \$1,750,000,000—more than \$62 per capita. In the United States the debt is less than \$12 per capita. In spite of rigid economy Germany's expenses have increased rapidly and in advance of the revenue. Germany has been living from hand to mouth, and her deficits have been growing larger since 1899."

The English Board of Trade has compiled some rather interesting statistics concerning the consumption of tea and coffee in various lands. The amount of tea used in England exceeds that of all the other countries of Europe and the United States together. In 1884 the tea consumption in that country was five pounds per head. In 1900 it rose to nearly six pounds. Russia and the United States come next in the quantity which they consume, but they did not use more than a pound each, while the Frenchman cannot get rid of more than one-twentieth of a pound per annum. In the use of coffee there is a different story to tell. Except Russia, England drinks as little coffee as any nation in the world. Seven-tenths of a pound per year is sufficient for an Englishman, while an American requires ten and a half pounds. The next largest consumers are the Germans, with six pounds per head, and the French, who consume more than four and a half pounds.

MAY RETAIN BOTH SETS.

The two departments in Washington to continue Statistical Work. That both sets of government statistics, those from the department of agriculture and those from the census bureau, should be continued was the expressed opinion of the representatives of all interests as given to the house committee on agriculture. That congress should take the necessary steps to perfect the present systems was also the universal opinion.

PLAN TRUNK LINE

From City of Cincinnati to Tap Points in South.

IS SCHEME OF SEABOARD

Is Backed by the Pennsylvania and All Arrangements Have Been Perfect for Building a New Line.

A great railroad project, destined materially to change the face of the industrial south, will be officially announced by the Seaboard Air Line railway company in Portsmouth, Va. The project is nothing less than the construction of a trunk line from Tennessee to the states of Alabama, Georgia and Florida, and to ports on the southeast Atlantic coast. This line will also afford the west and middle west the shortest route to the gulf states from Cincinnati, the gateway to the south.

Plans for this gigantic undertaking have been under way for the Seaboard Air Line for a long time, but they have been closely guarded until they were well enough along to guarantee that they could not be thwarted. The trunk line project of the Seaboard had its inception in the purchase of the South and Western railroad of Tennessee. This comparatively insignificant line is in operation between Johnson City, Tenn., and Spruce Pine, in the same state. With a short branch its operated mileage is only 75 miles.

The Seaboard Air Line purchased the property, the rights of way and the franchises of this little Tennessee line several months ago, but it has kept the purchase quiet, fearing that if it leaked out its rivals would obtain an inkling of its plans and thwart them. Now, however, ownership of this line will be one of the things announced by the Seaboard in a few days.

In pursuance of the Seaboard's trunk line plan extensions to the South and Western have been quietly going on ever since the line was bought. The work is now being accelerated by large additions to the construction forces, which on February 1 were brought up to 10,000 men. Connection has been made with the Norfolk and Western at Dante, Tenn. The road will next be extended northward through Tennessee to Elkhorn, Ky., where it is proposed to connect with the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad, a road allied with the Seaboard at other points, and over whose tracks it will obtain entrance into Cincinnati.

Southward the South and Western will be extended to a point at or near Columbia, S. C., where connection will be made with the Atlanta and Savannah division of the Seaboard. When these plans are carried out they will give the Seaboard the leading position among the roads which reach the great river from the south and backer, who was run over and killed Saturday night by a Coast Line passenger train, in the local yards, officers have been at work upon clues indicating that Baker was "doped" and robbed a short while before train time, and laid upon the track for the train to finish the work.

The new trunk line will also give the Seaboard, which has heretofore confined itself to eastern coast travel to and from the south, an entrance into the middle west, and will make it a formidable rival to the Louisville and Nashville and the Queen & Crescent. The last named lines, as well as others between the Alleghenies and the Mississippi, will undoubtedly bitterly resent the entrance of a rival into their territory, but the Seaboard's project has the powerful backing of the great Pennsylvania system, both financially and in a traffic way.

The Pennsylvania lines west of Pittsburg, Pa., especially will cooperate with the new line south from Cincinnati, and will give it a big freight and passenger business from the first days of its operation. The extension will be costly for the Seaboard. The construction of 250 miles of railroad is necessary to give the new line the South Carolina junction to Cincinnati.

It will take about two years, it is stated, to complete this construction, and trains will be moving over the new line from the Cincinnati gateway by the spring of 1908.

BANDITS HOLD THEIR PRISONER

Ransom is Paid for Hannigan, But He is Still a Captive. The bandit who kidnaped Robert Hannigan, the Deming, N. Mex., ranchman, from a stage near Silver City, N. Mex., are alleged to have collected \$2,000 ransom money to date, but they still hold him. Officers fear to attack them in their retreat in Mogollon mountain lest they kill the prisoner.

MOB EASILY DISPERSED.

Crowd Had Gathered to Lynch Negro in Shreveport. A mob gathered about the jail at Shreveport, La., Wednesday for the purpose of lynching the negro, Coleman, who killed a school girl. The militia on guard dispersed the mob without serious trouble. The grand jury met at noon to act on Coleman's case, and an indictment quickly followed.

BRIBE OFFERED CHINKS?

Such is Sensational Accusation Made Against Minister Rockhill at Pekin by Congressman Hull.

Chairman Hull of the military affairs committee, in presenting the army appropriation bill to the house, Wednesday, urged the necessity of complete preparedness as to our army and navy for trouble in the Orient. He declared that if nations not prepared to defend its position in China might as well haul down its flag and quit the Pacific.

Mr. Hull had read a newspaper dispatch from Pekin, which had been patch from the Orient, and which he vouched for as entirely accurate, which gave an account of an interview between Minister Rockhill and Mr. Na Tung, president of the waipung. Mr. Rockhill reminded the Chinese official that the United States intended to return the 20,000,000 pounds sterling, its part of the Boxer indemnity.

Mr. Hull characterized these utterances on the part of Mr. Rockhill as "injudicious."

"I do not believe that the representative of this government had a proper conception of the character of the Chinese people," continued Mr. Hull, "when he offered them a bribe of 20,000,000 pounds sterling, or whatever the United States' share of the Chinese indemnity may have been, to be good."

"They are a people," he said, "that in my judgment would take any such offer as that as an indication of our being rather more afraid of them than otherwise and it seems to me that a man occupying his position should have left whatever information necessary came from the government of the United States direct and not have given it to the newspapers."

Mr. Hull said he had been informed extensively of the Chinese situation. He read a lengthy letter, the author of which he declined to divulge, which rebuffed the idea that Japan was causing trouble in China. Mr. Hull endorsed Mr. Na Tung's statement in the letter that the boxer indemnity ought rather to be used to build battleships for the United States than be returned to China.

REVOLTING CRIME ALLEGED.

Young Man "Doped," Robbed and Placed on Railroad Tracks. James T., alias "Peacole" Goode, who has figured before the courts in several escapades in the recent past, was jailed at Bainbridge, Ga., Wednesday, under suspicion of being implicated in one of the most revolting crimes in the history of the county.

PURE FOOD BILL PASSED.

Measure Goes Through Senate by Decisive Vote of 63 to 4. After fifteen years of more or less serious consideration of the subject the senate Wednesday passed a pure food bill by the decisive vote of 63 to 4.

The bill makes it a misdemeanor to manufacture or sell adulterated or misbranded foods, drugs, medicines or liquors, and prohibits the shipment of such goods from one state to another or to a foreign country. It also prohibits the receipt of such goods. Punishment is by fine of \$500 or by imprisonment for one year, or both.

FOR IMMENSE MARBLE QUARRY

Papers of Incorporation Are Filed With Alabama State Secretary. Papers of incorporation of an immense marble quarry in Talladega, Ala., were filed Tuesday in the office of the secretary of state at Montgomery. The company is capitalized at \$366,000, and will mine marble on an extensive scale in Talladega. The incorporators are H. M. Atkinson, P. S. Arveright, R. E. Cumpane and G. McCorratt.

LEGAL ACTION RECOMMENDED.

New York Life Will Be Asked to Refund Campaign Boodle. Recommendations that legal action be instituted to recover campaign contributions made by the New York Life Insurance company were submitted to the trustees of that company at New York Wednesday by the special investigating committee headed by Thomas P. Fowler. It is recommended that the money be recovered from such officers and trustees as counsel shall decide are liable therefor.

DEMAND REFORMS

Armstrong Insurance Committee Makes Its Report.

IS A LENGTHY DOCUMENT

Most Important Recommendation Is Actual Control of Companies by Policy Holders—Department Censured.

The committee appointed at the last session of the New York legislature to investigate life insurance made its report Thursday. The report is extremely voluminous, being in the form of a printed pamphlet. It embraces a long review of the testimony taken by the committee and its recommendations and conclusions as to remedial legislation.

In addition there is a chapter devoted to the state insurance department, in which the committee declares that it would seem that the superintendent of the department had been imposed upon by the insurance companies, but that the supervision by the department has not proved a sufficient protection against instances of gross mismanagement, extravagance and maladministration.

The remedial legislation recommended by the committee provides for the safeguarding of the rights of policy holders in mutual companies in the election of directors; recommends that stock companies be given authority to retire their stock and become mutual companies, but that such mutualization shall not be compulsory; various regulations are urged to prevent unwise investments and to improve the management of the funds of the companies.

Further recommendation are made on the valuation of policies, surrender values, surplus, forms of policies and publicity of all facts pertaining to a company's business. It is recommended to the penal code is recommended to provide that the person receiving a rebate should be equally guilty with the one who gives it. In its detailed report of the investigation of the companies, the committee says that the acts of the mutual insurance companies should be thoroughly examined in order that the extent to which the money has been misapplied and the responsibility for any misappropriation which may be shown may be determined.

REUNION DATE UNCHANGED.

Confederate Vets Will Gather in New Orleans on Schedule Time. The dates for the Confederate reunion to be held in New Orleans April 25, 26 and 27 have not been changed, as has been erroneously published. At a meeting of the local committee Thursday the following was given out: "The attention of the committee being called to a conflict of dates between those of the reunion and the date of Memorial Day in the state of Mississippi, and carried that it is the sense of the committee that it is impracticable at this late date to change the date of the reunion."

WOMAN ADMINISTERED OATH.

Alabama New Chief Justice Is Sworn In at Montgomery. Judge Wesley, the newly appointed chief justice of the supreme court of Alabama, took the oath before Miss Mamie Offutt, a notary in the office of the governor at Montgomery Thursday. He at once announced for election to the position next fall.

HOUSE SNUBS GEORGE.

Motion to Adjourn in Honor of the Birthday of Father of His Country Is Voted Down.

The house of representatives refused to adjourn in celebration of Washington's birthday and its members participated in a general field day of debate on the army appropriation bill.

The speeches took a wide range. First, the system of promoting and retiring army officers was attacked by Mr. Prince of Illinois, who elicited many interjected comments from members in disapproval of the method by which he said the president and senate were responsible, and which, he pointed out, has resulted in a retired list, costing yearly \$2,700,000, consisting of officers who, he said, were holding the flag with one hand while the other was in the treasury for money that had never been earned.
