EDITORIALS

A collision of battleships in New York harbor shows us the grim terror of peace that confronts the navy, points out the New York Press.

The Washington Star says it is still a matter of doubt whether the possessor of a high-power motor car is in great luck or merely in great danger.

The worst thing about the insurance investigation, says the Florida Times-Union, is that it will turn loose on the helpless public a vast number of magazine writers to discuss modern methods of finance.

Resignation seems to be the prevailing virtue and nervous prostration the reigning disease. That they occupy, respectively, the position of cause and effect tells the story, remarks the Baltimore American.

The state of Iowa pays \$2 for every cub wolf's scalp, and in consequence, says the Atlanta Constitution, some shrewd and thrifty Iowa farmers have found it more profitable to domesticate and breed wolves than to raise pigs.

According to an English statistician, 152 American girls have given \$101,000,000 for foreign titles, states the Atlanta Constitution. This is a severe drain on American gold by Europe, but we still have half of the world's visible supply of the yellow metal.

Japan's proposal to distribute \$75,000,000 among the soldiers and sailors who carried her arms to victory on sea and land is both generous and wise, thinks the New York Tribune. A nation that thus promptly recognizes the valor and patriotism of those who have served it will never lack defenders.

The Oregon, which doubled the Cape and arrived in time to take a leading part in putting an end to Spanish power on the western continent, is now to be retired to the second line of defense. The new first liners, continues the New York Tribune, will be fortunate if when the time comes for them also to go to the rear they have as fine a record.

The new economic independence of the farmer has become so well established that this independence is not evidenced merely by a bank account. The farmer is now more than ever before free to choose his crop, and this is a matter of tremendous importance. This removes obstacles to the rotation of crops and to intensifying culture and methods. It gives the farmer with ability to raise leguminous crops, with their important benefits to the soil. It enables him to multiply his domestic animals, with further consequences upon tillage and land fertility. It enables him to adapt himself to his best markets with his best crops. The present and assured situation of the farmer makes him a factor of much force and high value in any consideration of the production of wealth by the nation, of matters of taxation, of finance, and of the consumption of products that come to him from sources outside of the farm, concludes George K. Holmes in the New York Times Financial Review.

A young man who will some day inherit an enormous fortune and who is being brought up as a "gentleman" was interviewed the other day. Among other things, he said: "If I did not have my career cut out for me, I should have to look for it myself. I should turn to the law and study some phases of it that interest me greatly." Probably, if the young man were actually thrown on his own resources, he would resort to something less entirely "elegant"—and more useful. But, that aside, what is this "career" that he fancies he has "cut out" for him? To take care of his property. That is, to spend his life at an occupation similar to that of a watchman or a policeman, but far more mechanical and less exciting. What a miserable, what a melancholy conception of a career. To spend one's life at just making money is poor enough use of the opportunity to live; to spend it at watching a heap of money—what dullness, what dreariness! And in a world teeming with opportunities to live intensely, vividly, interestingly, usefully, concludes the Saturday Evening Post.

GOOD FOR FARMERS

Lewis Bill Allows Banks to Loan on Farm Lands.

AN IMPORTANT MEASURE

Given the Husbandman an Equal Chance With His Business Brother in Dealing With National Banks.

A Washington special says: The house committee on banking and currency agreed Wednesday to report favorably the bill of Representative Lewis of Georgia, making real estate security for loans by national banks. Mr. Lewis' bill provides that national banking associations shall be permitted to make loans on farm property on the basis of one-half its value, provided that not more than 25 per cent of the total capital and surplus or undivided profits of any such banking association shall at any time be invested in any such real estate securities.

The agitation for the change in the national banking law has been a long one, but not until the last congress did any committee act favorably upon it. Mr. Lewis succeeded in getting a favorable report upon his bill in the closing hours of the last congress, but, as it was the short session, it was found impossible to pass the measure.

He has kept up the fight, and again has his efforts been crowned with success. There is every prospect of the bill being enacted. Mr. Lewis regards the national banking system as a condition not a theory, and, viewing it in that light, his efforts as a member of the banking and currency committee of the house have been toward the extension of the facilities so that the farmers of the south and west may secure the privileges and facilities heretofore enjoyed only by men in other lines of business in the cities.

By the passage of this bill the owner of farm properties will be placed in a far better position from a monetary standpoint than they have ever been heretofore with the possibility of securing loans from national banks closed to them.

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COVERS RICH TERRITORY.

Seaboard Buys Big Interests in Coal Fields—The Pennsylvania Puta Up Millions.

It was authoritatively stated in Pittsburgh, Pa., Wednesday evening that the plans of the Seaboard Air Line for its new trunk line to the south from Tennessee include the purchase of 350,000 acres of coal lands in Virginia in connection with the new railroad project.

These lands stand in the name of the Clinchfield corporation, which is the underlying company that is building the Seaboard's new line. The Pennsylvania railroad, which dominates the Seaboard's policy, has a hand in the project, and has \$40,000,000 behind it. This will include the cost of the operating head of the Seaboard system, which will aid the Pennsylvania in tightening its grip in the bituminous fields.

The coal properties which have been purchased by the Clinchfield corporation on behalf of the Seaboard Air Line embrace about 250,000 acres of land in Wyeth and Dickinson counties, Virginia. It also owns 12,000 acres of coal lands purchased from the Crane's Nest Coal company. Much of this fuel is in the celebrated Poohuntas field, and the plan of the new line, when its trunk line is completed, is to open a market for it in the south and southwest, and distribute it to the gulf and Atlantic seaports for export.

The engineers engaged in building the new road expect to get a maximum grade of one-half per cent. As previously stated, the South and Western railroad in Tennessee is the nucleus of the new line. It will be extended nearly 285 miles from Johnson City, Tenn., the northern terminus to the coal properties acquired, and also to a connection with the Chesapeake and Ohio at Elkhorn, Va.

From Spruce Pine, N. C., the southern terminus, it will be extended southward to connect with the Seaboard's Atlanta division. Further south, N. C. and will also connect with the Atlantic Coast Line and the Southern railroad.

Detailed announcement of the company's financial plans will be made in New York this spring. The new line will give the Pennsylvania lines west an outlet from Cincinnati and Louisville to the south, and will cement the corollary cooperative relations existing between the Seaboard, the Pennsylvania and the Chesapeake and Ohio. It will also permit the Pennsylvania to further control production in the bituminous fields.

ATLANTA POLICE BOARD RAPPED
Council Condemns Action in Arbitrarily Inaugurating Civil Service
A resolution deploring the action of the board of police commissioners in instituting civil service, contrary to the interpretation put upon the charter by the general council, and in direct conflict with the opinion of the city attorney, was passed by the Atlanta city council Wednesday.

Members of council took the position that the police board had no more right to act independent of council and in conflict with the opinion of the city attorney upon such a matter as civil service than had the board in right to involve the city in debt and litigation.
