The Gubernatorial Race.

All six of the candidates for governor are out hustling for votes, and it now looks as though the state will have no trouble in getting a suitable man to serve as governor. In other words, we believe that after Governor Terrell moves out of the mansion on Peachtree street there will be some fellow ready to move in. We are pretty sure now of obtaining a fairly good tenant for the next two years at least.

Hon. Hoke Smith is still asserting that he is the liveliest wire of the whole push. In other words, according to the estimate he is putting on himself, he is strictly "IT." He is telling the people in all the counties that he himself is a mighty good man, while those who would oppose him are a set of racials and have entered into a combination to beat him out of the job. He thinks he ought to have it and is telling the people so. He evidently thinks a whole lot of himself.

Hon. Clark Howell, too, is making the rounds of the state in a manner that is doing him credit as an all-wool and yard-wide campaigner. He, like Hoke Smith, has a mouth to talk out of and is making use of that organ much to the discomfort of some of his opponents. The man who said that Clark Howell could only write and couldn't speak has since crawled into his hole and pulled the hole in after him. Mr. Howell is being greeted by big crowds wherever he speaks, and the way things look to everybody else, except Hoke's blind followers, is that the man who puts it on Howell will camp in the mansion on Peachtree street for the next two years, at least. It is extremely doubtful if that man can be found who will beat him.

Hon. Dick Russell is making about four speeches a day. He has been covering the northern portion of the state so far, and is expected soon to drop down this way. Judge Russell is a power on the stump. He is entitled to credit for one thing done in this campaign if nothing else. He satisfied Hoke Smith along the joint debate line. Hoke met him at Monticello last fall and he has never been able to corner old Hoke again since. Judge Russell is especially strong in north-east Georgia, and it is said that he will carry every county making up his judicial circuit. He is a particularly good talker and will make votes and friends wherever he goes. Look out for Dick Russell when the final show-down is made.

Col. J. H. Estill, the handsomest candidate, and the only man that south Georgia has had the opportunity to support from this section in eighty-four years, is making the rounds of the state, doing a quiet canvass and one that nobody can estimate on. He has no big rallies, but meets the people face to face, and in our opinion he is making about three times as many votes as some of his opponents give him credit for. He has been touring south Georgia mostly, and in the opinion of most people, will carry about forty counties in his section of the state. Just what he will do in other sections cannot be told as yet. He expresses an intention to go among the people of north Georgia soon. He carried a large number of counties in north Georgia before and may do so again. He has two things to commend him to the people of this section not offered by any other candidate in the race, viz: He is the only man south Georgia has in the race,

and the fact that he is an old Confederate soldier. He will draw largely from these sources and it would not surprise us if he goes into the convention with more delegates than he did before, when his showing was quite a creditable one.

Then there is Farmer Jim Smith. He, too, will be a power in the convention. While he is not making so much noise as the other candidates, yet he has supporters everywhere and of course, will carry several counties in his section of the state. His platform is a good one and contains many features not contained in that of any other candidate. He demands that the negro be allowed the proportion of the educational fund that he pays in and no more in other words, the negro should educate his children at his own expense. Jim Smith will begin a tour of the state soon.

Last, but not least, there is Dr. Nunnally, the preacher candidate. Those who know Dr. Nunnally say that he is one of the best and purest men in the state. He served as president of Mercer university for several years and there men all over Georgia who were taught by him in that grand old institution, who love and honor him and will give him their votes. Dr. Nunnally is regarded as the best debater in the entire push. He has been seeking a joint debate with Hoke Smith and Hoke has refused to meet the preacher candidate. Hoke Smith has never been accused of being a fool, you know. He knows a buzz saw when he sees it, and it would take a lot of power and persuasion to get him to meet Dr. Nunnally. The Doctor is known now as "the man Hoke Smith is afraid to meet." Dr. Nunnally takes off Hoke Smith's "gal in the fountain" to good effect. Hoke Smith says he has never seen "the gal," and he knows that should he meet Dr. Nunnally he will have to picture so plainly to him that he can see her every time he shuts his eyes.

Taking it all in all it looks like most anybody's race. The man who says he has it won't just don't know what he is talking about.

ESTILL BOON IS SPREADING

Savannah Candidate's Forces are Being Well Organized

From the Valdosta Times: During the last two or three days there have been a large number of Georgia politicians in Valdosta, the Penitentiary Committee of the Georgia legislature having brought them here on an inspection tour of the convict camps. A Times reporter met one of these at the Valdes last night and had quite a lengthy talk with him on the political situation in this state.

"Do you know what is going on?" he said, in a quizzical sort of way. "There has never been a time in the history of the state that South Georgia had such a good political opportunity as she has at this time? Let me show you something. There are five candidates for Governor of Georgia, all of whom are entering the race from the northern part of the state. Of course, each of them will carry a number of counties, but no one of them will get enough in the mix-up to win.

"South Georgia has only one candidate, and that one is the person of Col. J. H. Estill of Savannah. In the last gubernatorial primary Estill developed remarkable strength in South Georgia, and with only two candidates in the race from the upper part of the state, came within a few votes of blocking the convention. If Estill should carry no more counties than he did before he will block the North Georgia game, and South Georgia will name the next Governor and will name a South Georgia man.

"The foregoing situation is becoming apparent all along the line in South Georgia. It is being talked in the town and country round about. The people are warming up to a realization of the truth and it begins to look like South Georgia will go to the state convention practically solid for Col. Estill.

It is being whispered throughout this section that now is a good time for Congressman Brantly to come and join all South Georgia hands in the work for a South Georgia man. Of course, it will elect Estill Governor, but it means much more than that. It has been a matter of common knowledge that Hoke Smith's ambition is to be United States Senator. It is said that if he had it he would throw down the Governor office to-day to get senatorship. He hopes to step to that over the Governor's chair. If Estill is elected Governor, South Georgia and not Hoke Smith will name the senator.

South Georgia has as able, yes more able, young men than North Georgia. Let South Georgia bring them to the front. It means much for South Georgia's development. It means various appropriations by Congress for the development and improvement of the South Georgia section of the state. Such improvement helps merchants, farmers, laborers and every class.

Don't you see how reasonable this is? Could anything be plainer? he asked. Of course, the whole matter is in South Georgia's hands and this section must work it out for herself. Why wouldn't W. G. Brantley make a good senator? If he is the man South Georgia wants, let South Georgia begin now and elect Estill Governor. If South Georgia stands close together and goes for Estill, the South Georgia candidate—the one will win against the five from North Georgia. It don't take a politician to see this.

"It is said that even in North Georgia the foregoing truth is generally commented upon, and the situation is watched with interest. The question is occasionally asked what will South Georgia do, but the current is beginning to run the South Georgia direction and shows what she will do if her people regard their own interests. We use to beg, but now we are able to make demands and fix our own terms."

TRAGEDY OF THE SEA

Twenty-Seven Go Down with Storm-Wrecked Steamer.

THIRTEEN MEN RESCUED

Passing Vessels Pick Up Survivors Clinging to Raft Bits of Wreck—Life Boats Crushed to Fragments.

A Boston dispatch says: Suffering, mental and physical, and numerous acts of heroism in saving life rarely equalled in the record of tragedies of the sea, attended the loss of the Phoenix Line steamer, British King, which, on Sunday last, in a raging Atlantic storm, foundered about 190 miles south of Sable Island, and carried to death twenty-seven members of the crew.

Thirteen men were rescued from the sinking vessel by the Layland Line steamer, Bostonian, bound from Manchester to Boston, and eleven by the German tank steamer Mannheim, Rotterdam to New York.

Five others, who had been drawn down in the vortex into which the British King was engulfed were picked up by the Bostonian from a frail bit of wreckage, which they had grasped after a desperate struggle for life in the whirlpool. The Bostonian arrived Wednesday afternoon, and the details of the disaster became known.

Captain James O'Hagan of the British King died on board the Bostonian from the effects of terrible injuries sustained in trying to save his ship.

The rescued who were brought to Boston Wednesday include James Flanagan, the second officer; J. D. Crawford, the chief engineer; Adolph Beck, the fourth engineer, and William J. Curry, the steward. The others were cook passers and sailors, mostly Belgians, and one stewardess, Henry Partridge of New York.

Two lifeboats from the Bostonian were crushed to fragments and the volunteer crews which manned them were thrown into the high running seas while engaged in rescue work.

When the first lifeboat was lowered from the Bostonian the small craft was swept against the stern of the ship and destroyed, and several of the crew were bruised and maimed. Yet, despite the brutal condition of the sea, the volunteers were rescued by lines thrown out from their steamer.

A second attempt to lower the ship was successful, and thirteen men, including Captain O'Hagan, were taken from the British King to the Bostonian. Then again a powerful billow carried the vessel against the side of the ship and destroyed it, and the lives were thrown into the sea, to be rescued only after an hour's effort by their comrades.

Volunteers from the Mannheim, after a heroic battle with the waves, had taken off eleven from the British King, but after this neither of the steamers, in consequence of the gale, could make an attempt to reach the wrecked vessel.

At a meeting of men of science in Berlin, Professor Ernst Fischer, writes our correspondent, one of the most celebrated German chemists, announced that he had come to the conclusion, after six years of experiment, that the artificial production of albumen would be possible in the future.

Albumen forming the chief element of nutrition in the food of the animal organism, the solution of this problem may mean that the human race will be saved by an abundance of accessible nourishment, from all risk of famine following a failure of crops or other shortage of food products—London Mail.
