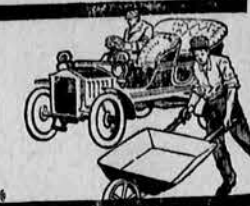

Applauds Estill

Claxton, Ga., April 28.—Hon. J. H. Estill, South Georgia's candidate for Governor, last night addressed a monster audience here. The school house auditorium was completely filled by those who had gathered to hear Col. Estill and his speech was received with the greatest applause and the utmost enthusiasm.

Col. Estill was introduced by Hon. John P. Moore, Mayor of Claxton, who paid his respects to the five other candidates for Governor by fitting them up with jobs suitable to their callings, and closed by saying that Col. Estill is the logical candidate and should be elected.

Though tired from a long trip to Greenville, Col. Estill spoke for about one hour on his usual line, with the exception of refusing the charge that had been made against him relative to the wage of a laboring man.

From the commencement to the close of his address, Col. Estill received great applause. He can safely count upon the votes of seven-eighths of those who heard his speech.

THE PRIMARY RESOLUTIONS.

At a meeting of the state democratic committee, held in the city of Atlanta, this April 30, 1906, called for the purpose of fixing the time and prescribing the rules for a state democratic primary election, and fixing the time and place of holding a state democratic convention for nomination of democratic candidates for governor, state house officers, judge, solicitors general and such other officials as are to be elected by the people of the state, at the ensuing elections, it is ordered:

1. That a democratic primary election be held on the 22d day of August, 1906, in each of the 145 counties of the state, of which all white democratic voters who have registered in 1905 or 1906, not less than ten days before said primary, shall have an opportunity to cast their votes for democratic candidates for the following offices, to wit: Governor, attorney general, chief justice of the supreme court, treasurer, commissioner of agriculture, state school commissioner, three associate justices of the supreme court, one United States senator, one prison commissioner, judge of the superior court, solicitor general. And the democratic executive committee in each county is hereby directed to prepare and furnish to the managers of such democratic primary a list of the qualified voters in said county under the terms hereinafter provided.

2. The names of all democratic candidates for offices to be filed as stated above, shall appear upon the official ballot, and shall be voted for directly, the voter striking on said ballot the names of all those candidates for offices for whom he does not desire to vote, and leaving on said ballot the names of those candidates for whom he wishes his ballot to be counted.

3. That on August 23, 1906, at noon, the democratic executive committee of each county shall assemble in the county court house, and consolidate the vote and declare the result, and in each county where any candidate for office shall have received a plurality of the vote cast in that county for said office in said primary election, the delegates selection from such county to the state convention shall be considered as instructed to cast the votes of said county for such candidate in the state convention, and the chairman of the democratic executive committee of such county shall appoint as delegates from said county to the state convention such democrats as the candidate for governor entitled to the vote of such county shall designate in writing. Each county shall be entitled to delegates for each member that is entitled to in the house of representatives. All vacancies in delegations shall be filled in the same manner as prescribed above for the original appointment of delegates. But no county shall send more delegates than it is entitled to individual votes in said convention.

4. The state democratic convention composed of delegates selected in the manner aforesaid, shall assemble in the auditorium in the city of Macon on the fourth day of September, 1906, to nominate a state democratic ticket for the above named offices.

5. In each judicial circuit, where the judge or solicitor general is to be elected, the white democratic voters in the several counties shall express their choice on the same ballot as hereinbefore provided for, and under the same terms as to qualifications for electors. It is ordered further that the vote of the several counties in each circuit for judge and solicitor general shall be consolidated by the county executive committee of each circuit, forwarded to the chairman of the state democratic executive committee, whose duty it shall be to consolidate the vote of the several counties in each circuit for judge and solicitor, and to report the result of such consolidated vote to the state convention, which shall, in turn, declare the result and make nomination accordingly for the several circuits. All candidates for judge and solicitor general receiving the highest vote in their respective circuits shall be placed on the state ticket as the democratic nominees for said office.

6. The official ballot to be voted in said democratic primary election shall have printed thereon the following caption: "STATE DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY ELECTION, 1906."

"By voting this ticket, I hereby declare that I am an organized democrat, and I hereby pledge myself to support the organized democracy, both state and national."

No ballot cast in said primary election without such caption and obligation shall be counted by the managers.

7. While white voters, without regard to past political affiliations, who desire to align themselves with the democratic party, are hereby invited, in good faith, to participate in said primary, this invitation is extended to only such voters as accept it in the same spirit of good faith in which it is extended.

Inasmuch as there has arisen a controversy as to the intent of the word "align" in the foregoing, we declare that, as herein used, it means to join the organized democratic party and become a democrat in good faith.

8. In the case of a vacancy occurring in the office of judge or solicitor general in any circuit of the state, the chairman of the state democratic executive committee is hereby authorized to call for a nominating primary election in such circuit to fill the vacancy in ample time before the election shall be had.

9. The chairman of this committee shall prepare a form of official ballot to be used in said democratic primary election, containing the names of all candidates for offices named in paragraph 1, and shall furnish the same to the chairman of each county executive committee in the state at least ten days before said primary election.

10. In the event any ticket is voted in said primary election with the name of any candidate for any of the aforesaid offices omitted therefrom, such ticket or tickets shall be declared invalid, and shall not be counted.

11. No person shall have the right to vote in said democratic primary election whose vote has been purchased, and no candidate who buys or procures to be bought votes in said primary shall receive the nomination of his party, and the democratic executive committee of the county shall have the

power, and it is hereby made its duty to throw out and take time to hear evidence, and to refuse to declare as nominee any candidate who purchases or procures to be purchased any votes at said primary election, and the county democratic executive committee, when notified of a contest for such purposes, or on other irregularities, which do not contain the caption and pledge hereinbefore prescribed, and also said purchased votes, also all ballots when the result is declared, either party interested shall have the right to appeal to the state democratic executive committee, which may adopt such rules to hear such appeal as to it may seem proper.

12. Each candidate for state house offices, supreme court judges and United States senator shall be assessed \$50 to meet the expenses of said democratic primary, which sum shall include all assessments against such candidates for state and county primary elections, and the name of no candidate shall appear on the ticket who fails to pay the same thirty days before said primary.

13. The county democratic executive committee shall appoint the managers for said democratic election ten days before said primary, and, as far as practicable, shall give representation to contesting candidates in the selection of managers of said primary. Upon timely request and refusal of the county committee to comply with such requests, any candidate shall have the right to appeal to the state democratic executive committee.

14. It is ordered that upon a consolidation of the vote in each county the candidate for United States senate receiving the highest number of votes for that office shall be declared the democratic nominee from that county for said office, and the representative or representatives and senators from such counties, and the senatorial district including such counties, are considered instructed to vote for such nominee in the next general assembly.

Gov. Signs Respite For the Rawlings.

Atlanta, Ga., May 1.—Governor Terrell this morning issued respite to June 8 for J. G. Rawlings, his two sons, Milton and Jesse, and the negro, Alf Moore, all sentenced to die Friday for the murder of the Carter children.

This date was arrived at by the governor after consultation with Attorney-General Hart and careful computation of the time necessary for the decision of the United States supreme court to be made the decree of the Georgia courts.

As thirty days is necessary for the decision to arrive here from Washington that would throw the date to May 16, counting from the time the decision was handed down at the national capital. Some twelve days more will be necessary for the Georgia supreme court to pass on it, and send the remittitur to Lowndes county superior court.

As nearly as possible, Governor Terrell computed the time on this basis, arriving at the date of June 8. The respite went to Valdosta this afternoon.

As yet no formal petition has been presented to the prison commission asking for a commutation of sentence for the father and his two sons. Gen. Evans stated this morning that, inasmuch as the respite had been extended to June 8, the commission would not go into the case at the meeting next week, and probably not until early in June.

Rural Routes in Danger.

To the Patrons of Rural Free Delivery.

There has been a recent ruling at headquarters whereby R. F. D. routes not doing a certain amount of business will either be made tri-weekly routes, going only three times a week, or be discontinued altogether. There are some routes in Bulloch county that are not handling the required amount of mail because of the lack of appreciation of certain patrons on these routes. They are served by faithful carriers who are anxious to give their people the best service possible and would hate to see the routes changed or discontinued, because they have their patrons' interests at heart; besides they make their living this way and would be very glad to see the people take more interest in their routes by writing and receiving more letters, taking more papers and increasing the mail deliveries and collections. The cost to each family would be very small, but in aggregate would amount to a great deal and likely keep the route in commission.

I hope the people will appreciate this and take more interest in and maintain our splendid system of rural free delivery. Let's don't go back; let's be progressive and keep abreast of the times in this fine old section of ours. The farmer has enjoyed no appropriation but rural free delivery; let's hold to it by building and keeping up the standard.

Backache, "The Blues" A QUICK VERDICT

Both Symptoms of Organic Derangement in Women—Thousands of Sufferers Find Relief.



Atlanta Woman Who Slew Sister Found "Not Guilty."

MADE PLEA OF INSANITY

Closing Chapter of the Most Sensational Tragedy Ever Enacted in Atlanta—Some Features of the Trial.

"We, the jury, find the defendant not guilty," was the verdict reached in less than ten minutes in the case of Mrs. Willie Standiford, who was tried in the criminal branch of the superior court in Atlanta Friday for the killing of her sister, Miss Chaplin Standiford, on March 9 last.

The verdict was given in a silence that was oppressive. The stillness was so intense that the breathing of the people in the packed court room was audible. There would probably have been an outbreak of applause if Judge Ross had not commanded that there should be no demonstration, no matter what the verdict was. He called to the sheriff to stop the jury, as it was about to file into the court room, and said:

"There must be no demonstration, whatever the verdict in this case may be. This is a court room, and I instruct the deputies to arrest the first person who makes a demonstration." "That was why the verdict was reached in such deep silence. The women who sat near the prisoner, her sisters and friends, dropped their faces in their hands and wept. Mrs. Standiford looked about her like a frightened child, and clasped and unclasped her fingers nervously.

The last chapter in one of the most pathetic tragedies that ever occurred in Atlanta had ended. A poor, frail woman who had been the victim of her own passion for justice for slaying her own sister. Her plea was that she was so crazed by a heartless husband, that she had been driven to the crime. Her sister was found in her room, a victim for his faithlessness, that she was so madly in love that she had been driven to the crime. The jury was out nine and a half minutes when they announced that they were ready with a verdict. The foreman of the jury, who took it to the court, said:

"We, the jury, find the defendant not guilty."

The story had all been told, and Mrs. Standiford left the court room, with her sisters and lady friends, a free woman in the eyes of the law, and doubtless in the sight of God to whom she appealed in the last words of her statement to the jury. At one time while Mr. Westcott, the woman's attorney, was speaking to the jury, Mrs. Standiford fainted, and her sisters rushed to her aid. Two startling events marked the trial. One was Mrs. Standiford's plea of delusional insanity and the other was the ruling out by Judge Ross of letters from Standiford to Miss Collins, which were to have been introduced at the trial of Standiford on a charge of immorality; the testimony also of G. W. Bailey, negro hawker, of James Filbro, the negro hawker, who swore at the preliminary hearing that he had taken Standiford and the girl to a questionable resort on Collins street on the night before the tragedy, was ruled out.

The Farm

Haunting Manure to Field.

While it is admittedly the better plan to get the manure to the fields as soon as it is possible, the plan has its greatest value when the manure is spread as soon as it is placed on the soil—that is, do not put it in a heap to spread at some later period, but, if possible, load it from the stable directly into a spreader, so that as soon as it reaches the field it can be put on the soil, where it will be in the best position to do its work. The idea of carting the manure direct to the field is to have it improving the soil instead of letting it lie in a heap, where it is the air, as is the case when it lays in the barnyard all winter.

Poultry Yards and Shrubbery. The best poultry yard for fowls that have not very large is the one with plenty of shrubbery in it and one in which grass may be sown to allow the birds plenty of green stuff to eat. It is advisable to have two yards, and while the birds are living in one some seed in the other. The quantity of time first used will be a good plan to turn the soil in the yards and the birds will get many worms and insects. If there are no trees or shrubs in the yard it is very troublesome to plant a few there. The hens, and little chicks, especially, will appreciate them on hot days. It is a pleasant thing to have a few trees to remain on in the brooding sun, with a flock of little ones, trying to keep cool. And then so many persons forget to get a few trees to water to their fowls in hot weather. There is nothing that is more of a drawback to the health and comfort of the birds than to have them in a yard that is so warm. They get run down and their systems are in a condition to get all the diseases that are going around—Mirrors and Farmers.

An Early Start. Whether for lay or pasture, the land should be deeply plowed and well harrowed, so as to have the soil in the best possible condition. This is essential for the reason that the young plants will have better facilities for feeding and will rapidly increase in growth before the warm days of the July and August. The more early the growth the grass can make the better it will be able to endure a dry spell. If manure is used it should be well decomposed in order to be of use. The seeds or weeds may be destroyed, as it is difficult to get at weeds growing on a grass plot. The safer method is to apply fertilizers. Wood ashes are excellent, but a mixture of 100 pounds of acidulated ground bone (or phosphate) and 100 pounds of sulphate of potash will give the grass an early start and enable it to become well established before mowing with lack of moisture. The main point in the growing of a grass crop is to get an even and uniform stand at the beginning, for any gain at the start will be of no value at later periods of growth. While mixed grasses should be preferred on a pasture field, it is better to grow hay crops singly—matted, and the crops of the foods to be done at the barn when feeding the animals after harvesting the grass crop. It is better for the farmer not to depend upon a single kind of hay crop, as a prolonged drought may destroy it. Instead of growing clover and timothy, only these should be grown, and fodder crops, which can be necessary be seeded late and moved at any stage of growth. This is to keep in mind that the weak characteristics in the females should be the strongest in the males. The next year the most promising pullets from this mating in shape, color and other points, should be selected and placed with another cockerel as he is likely to grow more rapidly and mature early. Accordingly, they should be mated, not to a young rooster, but to a thoroughbred cockerel, one of the same breed, though not of the same breeder as the others were purchased. Any reliable breeder who understands his business can give the right kind of a bird if the dealer, the buyer will only write him, describing the shape, color and general characteristics of his pullets. The result of this mating should be a lot of very fine pullets, including valuable cockerels, all of which will find a ready market anywhere at good prices. Thus by selecting the nearest standard pullets in color, shape and characteristics, one may carry the grading up still further year by year and ultimately have the finest birds that it is possible to breed—The Epitomist.

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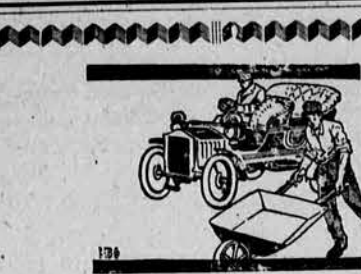

THE COTTON BEETLE HERE

Disastrous Little Insects Are Liable to Do Much Damage to the Crops in This Section.

Mr. James Mincey sent to this office on last Thursday afternoon a small stalk of cotton on which there was a large number of little black bugs. Mr. Mincey states that this little insect was destroying his cotton as fast as it came out of the ground. He was at a loss to know what it was or what remedy to apply. Quite a number of those who live around him had seen it but all were at a loss to know what it was. The sample was mailed by us to the state entomologist at Atlanta and the following is the reply which reached us on Sunday morning. We print it for the benefit of others who might be visited by this pestiferous little insect.

Atlanta, Ga., May 5, 1906
Statesboro News,
Statesboro, Ga.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of May 4th and bottle containing beetles affecting cotton on the farm of J. M. Mincey, have just arrived.

The little black beetles are commonly called the "cow-pod weevil" Chalcodermus aeneus. These little beetles are capable of doing a great amount of damage to young cotton by feeding on the leaf stems and also on the leaves of the young plants. Their principal injury is caused by making punctures in the stems which, when numerous, cause the plants to wilt and die.

I am writing today to Mr. Mincey recommending him to spray with a mixture of bluestone, lime and Paris green in water, in the following proportions:

Bluestone.....8 pounds
Lime.....6 "
Paris green.....6 ounces
Water.....50 gallons
This mixture will act as a repellent and also poison many of the beetles if they feed on the sprayed plants.

I am sending a copy of our Bulletin No. 12, "The Mexican Cotton Boll weevil." On page 24 the cow-pod weevil is pictured and described. It has frequently been mistaken for the true Mexican boll weevil. I send also our Bulletin No. 19. On page 148 and 150 will be found directions for preparing Bordeaux mixture. When Paris green is used with Bordeaux mixture it should be added after the lime and bluestone solutions have been combined, making the real Bordeaux mixture.
