Estill's Oration In Brooks County.

Quitman, Ga., May 8.—If there is a man in Georgia of a skeptical turn of mind as to the interest manifested in the southern part of the state in the candidacy of Col. J. H. Estill for Governor he should have been at the big meeting held here today. In this grand old county of Brooks, the home of enlightened public sentiment and advanced ideas, the people turned out in large numbers to honor the man who has fought their battles and championed their interests for more than a third of a century. Friends and acquaintances who have known the South Georgia candidate for years and those newly made, gathered about him, grasped his hands with cordiality and assured him of their support.

Col. Estill arrived in Quitman from Waycross, where he stayed last night. A committee of prominent Democrats was at the station to meet him and escorted him at once to the hotel. It was generally known that he was to address the voters of Brooks county, and there was a large crowd of representative citizens waiting to greet him. And it was a greeting in every sense that word implies. Men who have read his newspaper for years, and who appreciate its efforts at and to every one, gathered about him and gave assurances of their loyalty.

"I have loved the Morning News for forty years," said a staid farmer, as he grasped the hand of the Colonel, "and I don't know why I shouldn't like you." "I thank you," Col. Estill replied; "I have always tried to merit the respect and esteem of my friends and patrons." "I want to shake the hand of the next governor of Georgia," said another good citizen of Brooks county.

"I am glad to meet you," said Col. Estill, "and I hope you are shaking hands with the next governor."

These are only cited as two of many similar expressions made to Col. Estill by the welcome him. The day was ideal, the rain of the day before having laid the dust and cooled the atmosphere. The meeting was held in the big court room of the county building. Every seat was occupied and many were compelled to stand in the aisles. A particularly pleasing feature was the presence of Col. Robert M. Hitch, of Savannah, a former Brooks county boy, who was accorded a genuine ovation when he arose to speak. Col. EDITORIALS

It is said that Mr. Alexander's revival songs are now as popular in England as Mr. Sankey's were a generation ago. The "Glorious" song—an especial favorite—has appeared in print about 17,000,000 times in three years. The London dailies even publish the words and music.

United States Consul Johnston, of Algiers writes that the adulteration of olive oil with cottonseed oil has caused a law to be promulgated there requiring all admixtures to be so marked, plainly, and with the proportion of adulteration. Any deception in its sale will be punished according to law.

St. Robert Ball, who has been lecturing on the glacial epoch, informed his hearers recently that the next ice age is due 200,000 winters hence. Then, he says, all northern Europe and America will be once more under the ice cap that will cover the highest mountains and last for many thousands of years.

There are more possibilities of adventures in Australia than in English cricket. A recent Australian mail reports a match in Victoria in which the ball was hit into some underground. The fielder who went after it found the spot occupied by two big snakes, a brown and a black one. The game was temporarily suspended, the reptiles were killed with cricket stumps and the ball recovered.

It is the rule in the Australian Parliament that the speeches of every member must be reported verbatim. As a result of this perpetual stenography, the printed record for the session concluded at Christmas ran to twenty-six volumes of 700 pages, or about 6,000,000 words. One of the leading Australian dailies describes them as dreary masses and ponderous tomes—"an unceasing stream of unnecessary repetition and wearisome speech; talkativeness is veritably the curse of the commonwealth Parliament."

The well-known nerve pathologist, V. M. Bechterew, says the St. Petersburg Novost, mentions the appearance of a peculiar disease of the nerve system, which he calls "sweating sickness of the hand." This trouble is indicated by the sudden perspiration of the hand on the part of the victim each time he sees an acquaintance with whom he is about to shake hands. Sometimes the perspiration will fall in large drops from the tips of the fingers. None of the other parts of the body shows similar symptoms.

The brightness of the Arctic landscape even on a cloudy winter night has suggested to Professor Melander of Helsingfors that the snow has some luminosity of its own. Testing this with a camera buried in the snow, no satisfactory results were reached at first, but a striking photographic effect appeared later. As the sensitive plates had been covered with sheets of metal, the influence of these sheets, the experiments have proven that radiations from metals—so evident at white heat—are still emitted to cold, and that all metals give off violet and ultra-violet rays even at ordinary temperatures. Chemical action at the surface of the metal is the possible cause. It is suggested that the ionizing power of these rays plays an unconsidered part in nature, and that they may specially affect the eyes of animals that see in the dark.

At no other time, probably, have the scientists been making so many discoveries that are of direct value to farmers, and at no period have their opinions carried greater weight. Perhaps because of the very fact that they know their advice is quite likely to be put into practice, the professors are far more careful about laying down hard and fast rules. Perhaps, too, the gaining of more knowledge conveys the hint that there is still more yet to be known before one can be sure of things. As Dr. C. M. Woods declared recently: "We do not know positively twenty years ago. At that time I might have laid down a rule and insisted that it should always be followed, but I have learned that there are many things to be considered. This, in the opinion of the American Cultivator, is the sensible and modest attitude of modern farm science. It allows the farmers to do some of the thinking for themselves."

TWO HUNDRED MILLIONS

To Be Spent by Southern Improvement — Speculation as to How Gigantic Sum Will Go.

Just now that recent \$200,000,000 bond issue of the Southern railway is the occasion of much speculation among the citizens of the Atlanta railroad world. It is generally believed that some \$50,000,000 outstanding at 6 or 8 per cent will be retired and that a similar sum to take the place of the old will be issued at 4 per cent. Another portion, it is believed, will be used in paying for the Tennessee Central, and that several millions will be used for general improvements.

As to the remainder, some \$100,000,000, it is generally conceded that this sum will be set aside as a reserve fund, perhaps for the purchase of such roads from time to time as will strengthen the great Southern railway system and cover a still greater portion of Dixie than at present.

This recent bond issue was the subject of special conversation on the part of two or three of the most prominent Atlanta railway officials in the Transportation Club yesterday, and from this talk branched to the matter of double-tracking the South.

Already enormous sums of money have been spent in this direction and big gangs of men are at work completing this double-tracking from Washington to Salisbury until the entire road is practically now double-tracked with the exception of that section between Lynchburg and Charlottesville. It is expected that this double-tracking will be complete south from Salisbury, and within five years the entire road between Washington and Atlanta will be double-tracked.

This will make possible a betterment of actual running time for passenger trains of three hours or more, while the time saved which is caused by the meeting and passing of trains will provide a new schedule such as will be a sure cure for late trains.

With the great saving in time for passenger trains when the double-tracking is completed, the improvement in the freight service will be almost beyond estimating. In addition to saving many hours and even days in the freight schedule, it will also offer a practical remedy for the congestion which has resulted from the tremendous and unprecedented freight cars and locomotives are now being delivered to the system daily.

These freight cars and locomotives are now being delivered to the system daily, and with the many improvements now under way completed, the south will enjoy such traffic service as is now found only in the territory drained by the big systems of the east.

It is stated that the new survey of the Southern railway between Atlanta and Birmingham has been completed, and that the engineers have submitted plans containing all details of information to the head office at Washington.

It is expected that the Washington matter of double-tracking this new Atlanta-Birmingham road will be brought up at a meeting of the directors to be held in the near future. Double-tracking seems to be the policy of the Southern just at this stage. This is proved by double-tracking between such points as Norfolk, Knoxville and Asheville, Chattanooga and Somerset and other points, including the double-tracking and vast improvements between Atlanta and Austin.

Altogether the indications all point to the spending of millions of dollars by the Southern railway in the next few years, and as a result a double-tracked system such as will give Atlanta and the southeast traffic advantages equal to those enjoyed by any section of the country—Atlanta Constitution.

Touch of Winter in Upper East. The mountains were white with snow Wednesday, while the temperature in the valleys is suggestive of a return of winter. The mountains in Southwest Virginia were also snow covered.

CHINA PAYS RIOT BILL.

Turns Over \$60,000 for Destruction of American Property.

The victory of Canton has paid to the American consul the sum of \$60,000 as indemnity for the mission buildings, the personal property of the missionaries as a result of the destruction of property during the rioting at Lanchow in October last. The money will be transferred to the Presbyterian mission settlement at Lanchow.

PITTSBURG BANK FAILURE.

Comparatively New Institution Is Forced to Close Doors.

Eighty Days. The Columbia Savings and Trust company of Pittsburgh closed its doors Wednesday upon orders from the state commissioner of banking, J. C. Beckey.

The bank was one of the newest in the Pittsburgh district, having been organized in August, 1904. Hon. Wilbur D. Dierl, former mayor of Pittsburgh, is president of the institution. The order to close came as a surprise, as the institution was considered a strong one.

VESUVIUS STILL ERUPTING.

Activity of Volcano Being Shown in Dense Smoke Columns.

Vesuvius is again showing considerable activity. Tuesday a dense column of smoke was rising from the crater and spreading like an umbrella over the city. The eruption was accompanied by loud detonations and especially noticeable from Rostina.

RUSSIAN DOUMA A COLOSSUS OF CHIM.

Inaugurated at St. Petersburg Without a Hitch.

CZAR DELIVERS ADDRESS

For First Time in History People of Benighted Empire Are Accorded Voice Through Medium of a Parliament.

Without a single hitch and with only a minor incident to mar the memorable day, the Russian parliament was inaugurated in St. Petersburg Thursday. The weather was superb, and the stage management of the impressive ceremony at the winter palace where Emperor Nicholas, surrounded by courtiers and all the pomp and panoply of power, delivered the speech from the throne to the members of the two houses was perfect. Such a spectacle perhaps never before has been witnessed on the earth's stage.

The one jarring note was the mutual suspicion manifested by the czar and the people. St. Petersburg was practically in a state of siege, picked troops being stationed at all strategic points.

The message in reality was less a throne speech than a greeting, and required only three minutes for its delivery.

The emperor's speech was as follows: "The supreme power which gave me the care of our fatherland impelled me to call to my assistance elected representatives of the people. In the future, I greet in your persons the best men from the empire, when I ordered my beloved subjects to choose from among themselves."

"A difficult work lies before you. I trust that love for your fatherland and your earnest desire to serve it will inspire and unite you."

"I shall keep inviolate the institutions which have granted, with the firm assurance that you will devote all your strength to the service of your country, and especially to the needs of the peasantry, which are so close to my heart, and to the education of the people and their economic welfare, remembering that to the dignity and prosperity of the state and its freedom, but order founded upon justice is necessary."

"I desire from my heart to see my people happy and hand to hand with son an empire secure, well organized and enlightened."

"May God bless the work that lies before me in unity with the council of the empire and the imperial state. May this day be the day of the moral revival of Russia and the day for the renewal of its highest forces."

"Approach with solemnity the labor for which I call you, and be worthy of the responsibilities put upon you by the empire and people."

"May God assist us."

Couriers and spectators other than the members of the national parliament were quietly silent, expressing neither approval nor disapproval. What rankled most was the failure of the emperor to mention the monarchy, when the members assembled in the Tauride palace, away from the spell of the throne room, many of them were with silently reserved resolutions on the subject.

The constitutional democratic leaders, however, who dominated everything were anxious not to weaken the spirit of the speech from the throne, in which issues with the crown will be joined, and succeeded in staying off premature action.

The opening of the lower house of parliament was preceded by a religious service of thanksgiving in the big corridor in front of the hall.

The only genuine flashes of fire which showed the real temper of the members of the house were when Professor Mourmoutseff, who had been elected president of the house, invited government officials and clerics to leave the hall, and when Ivan Petrunkevitch, in a few eloquent words from the rostrum, told the auditors that the first thought of the parliament should be for those who had suffered in the cause of liberty, who now filled the prisons and whose arms were stretched out in hope and confidence to the people's representatives.

The house of parliament adjourned with the council of the empire, and also to permit the committee of the constitutional democrats to consider the reply to the speech from the throne.

The greatest prohibition victory ever known to Palatka county, Georgia was won Thursday, which means the abolition of the dispensary system. The fight was hard until late in the afternoon, when the whiskey men realized their utter defeat and practically gave up.
