Forty Houses Burned in Suburb of Atlanta.

Atlanta, Ga., May 15.—About forty houses, occupied for most part by negroes, was burned in South Atlanta late today. The loss will be \$40,000. The location is several miles from the center of the city and quite outside the city limits, surrounding Clark University for negroes, and not far from the federal prison, both of which were stated to be in danger for a time. Although the houses were outside the fire limits, the city department went to the rescue, but on account of the lack of water it was able to do little good and the fire burned itself out. Neither institution was seriously threatened nor damaged.

Dublin's Municipal Primary.

Dublin, Ga., May 15.—J. A. Kelly, J. M. Williams and O. L. Kelly, Jr. defeated H. G. Stevens, F. A. Watkins and J. M. Outler in today's primary for city aldermen at large. The administration elected two of the three men. The balloting was done under the Australian system and the pealers were eliminated. The voting was heavy, 408 votes being polled.

The contest has been lively from start to finish. The administration ticket came out strong against bucket shops, pool rooms and immoral institutions. A feature of the campaign was the charge made by the outers that the mayor and aldermen were using lights and water free, contrary to the charter of the city. The opposing tickets were dubbed "ring" and "scalawag" respectively. J. A. Kelly was voted for by both factions. He is a contractor, and received the votes of the laboring men.

The successful contestants will be elected in July for a term of two years. The mayor and four aldermen from the four wards of the city will not be elected until 1907.

EDITORIALS

Many otherwise sensible women have given up a good paying job in order to become a worthless man's wife.

It may be that in some details the spelling of English might be reformed to advantage, but it is desirable to discriminate between reforming and deforming it.

Before the Japanese start out to increase their stature they should reflect that when they get to be tall men the world will no longer refer to them as "the tiny little Japs."

English educational and sanitary authorities are discussing the advisability of substituting cheap paper and pencils for slates in school. The Lancet is strongly in favor of paper and pencils.

In the opinion of Richard Mansfield the American people are losing their traditional good humor. There are some who expect people to smile good humoredly when an automobile rolls over them.

Says the New York Herald: So great was the crowd of would-be purchasers of railroad stock in Canton, China, that troops had to be called out to control them. And to think that these folks are excluded!

The Cincinnati Enquirer remarks: The duty of electing Senators is solemnly imposed on the legislatures, and the responsibility cannot be escaped through caucus packing and heretofore manipulation. The constitution provides the way.

All innocent amusement conduces to physical and moral health, maintains the New York Herald. The head of a mining camp who would hire only men who could sing, dance or play and the captain who would never go to sea without men in his crew who could play the fiddle had seized upon a homely but important truth.

Auto-preservation, although not a lively topic to discuss, has attractions for the people who go in for cremation. It has nothing whatever to do with automobiles. Auto-preservation is a new Italian process of preserving the dead, the inventor of which claims that his invention is able to convert the dead into imperishable statues.

For the purpose of studying the cause of mountain sickness, Drs. Guillemin and Moog, during last July made a stay at the Mont Blanc observatory. According to the results of their investigations, which have now been published, "the diminished tension of the oxygen of the atmosphere clogs the process of oxidation and this sets up an elaboration of toxic substances, the retention of which causes symptoms of auto-intoxication."

A Finland correspondent writes: "It is not generally known that the Swedes in Finland form a large proportion of the population, there being about 400,000 of these in a total of 2,800,000. The Swedes—or more correctly Finlanders whose mother tongue is Swedish—are mostly farmers or workers on the land, only 25 percent of them inhabiting towns. During the craze known as 'Fennomania' many Swedes changed to their Swedish family names for Finnish ones, like their national hero, George Forsman, who died at Irip Koskinen. Of the 250 newspapers published in Finland, eighty-one are printed in Swedish."

That was a pretty compliment a great bishop paid to the ethical value of nice clothes the other day. "When you work among the poor," he advised a group of philanthropic women, "go as well dressed as if you were visiting some of your personal friends. The poor greatly appreciate the compliment you pay them, and besides they enjoy a peep at the 'fashions.' It is altogether a mistake to fancy you must look dowdy when you visit the poor, for fear of making your proteges unhappy with jealousy. If of ten does a poor woman more good over afterward with some of her chums than to have two or three professional visits from a shabbily dressed, friendly visitor, who may, perhaps, understand parochial visiting far better."

THREE NEW BISHOPS

Elected by Methodist Conference in Birmingham.

TIGERT, WARD, ATKINS

Twelve Ballots Were Taken and Great Enthusiasm Was Manifested. Money is Awarded for the Extension of Schools.

After a day of exciting balloting at the Methodist Episcopal general conference, at Birmingham, Thursday, which continued up to 10:30 o'clock p. m., the following three new bishops were elected: Dr. Seth Ward, assistant missionary secretary of the church; Dr. John J. Tigert, book editor; Dr. James Atkins, Sunday school editor. Tigert was elected on the first ballot, Ward on the third and Atkins on the twelfth.

J. J. Tigert was born in Louisville, November 25, 1856. He was graduated from Vanderbilt University and from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville. He was called to preach in 1875. He received his degree of D. D. from the University of Missouri.

James Atkins was born in Knoxville, Tenn., April 18, 1850. He received his education in Tennessee schools and was licensed to preach in 1870. He has been president of two Methodist churches, is the originator of the Bible Teachers' Study Circle, and is author of several books.

Dr. Seth Ward was born in Leon county, Texas, November 1, 1853. His boyhood days were spent on a Texas farm. He received the degree of D. D. from Southwestern University.

Three sessions of the conference were held during the day. The principal business transacted besides the election of the bishops was the adoption of that part of the report of the committee on education providing for an assessment of \$50,000 for school extension.

The committee on episcopacy reported memorials on the death of Bishops J. C. Keener and R. K. Hargrove.

THE RATE BILL ROW.

Summary of Charges and Counter-Charges in Controversy.

A Washington special says: The Tillman charge that President Roosevelt betrayed the Democrats in the rate bill matter is the talk of Washington.

The president appears to lack little approval. Not since he has been in the white house has he been so bitterly attacked with so few defenses. To the impartial observer there is some reason and some wrong on both sides. Here are the issues closely:

First—That President Roosevelt surrendered to the railway senators in accepting the Hepburn bill with the "Allison amendment" as to court review.

Second—That the surrender was unnecessary and was made at the moment when victory was assured. Third—That President Roosevelt went over to the enemy without notice to his democratic allies who had made victory possible.

Fourth—That the treachery was less excusable since he had himself sought the alliance.

To these charges, the president has replied:

First—That he has not surrendered in accepting the Allison amendment, but has, in fact, gained a great and substantial victory.

Second—That he did not break off negotiations with the democratic allies until it had been demonstrated that victory was not possible on the basis of their proposals.

Third—No reply.

Fourth—That the alliance was sought by the Democrats and that the Tillman-Bailey-Chandler double conference were no more significant, and no more binding than numerous other conferences which were continuously being held.

To which the following rejoinder is made by the president's critics:

If, as claimed, the Hepburn bill was always satisfactory why did the president raise the issue of a restricted court review? Why did he call the conference at the white house, at which the "Long amendment" was drafted? Why did he for no less than ten days tell all callers that the "thing to do now was to do what the broad court review amendment?"

Why did he not discover sooner that the naked Hepburn bill with the Allison amendment gives a broad review and practically all the anti-lawyers for once agree with them?

DIVISION OF GEORGIA DIOCESE

Decided Upon by Episcopalian Convention at Columbus.

Division of the diocese of Georgia will be made, and the southeastern division, the section in which Savannah is located, retains the title, "the diocese of Georgia."

The Episcopal convention at Columbus decided Thursday after a discussion lasting for many hours.

Use of Oxygen Necessary to Prolong Her Life.

Mrs. Jefferson Davis, wife of the president of the Southern Confederacy, who is ill at the Hotel Grand in New York, suffered a relapse early Thursday and her condition for several hours was serious. During the morning hours report was had to the use of oxygen. About noon Mrs. Davis rallied to some extent.

Populist Committee of Georgia Will Hold Conference Later.

J. J. Holloway, chairman of the populist state committee, has issued a statement to the press, announcing the postponement of the meeting of the committee, which was called to meet in Atlanta, May 21. He states that it will probably be held about the middle of July. The present unsettled condition of affairs politically is given as one of the reasons for the postponement of the committee's session.

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Keys Taken from Jail and Prisoner Hung by Mob.

A mob entered the jail at Livermore, Fla., Wednesday night, got the keys from the jailer and took out Frank Jordan, colored, charged with robbing and murdering a white peddler named Swenson, at State Pond, two weeks ago. The negro was hanged by the mob to a tree a short distance from town.

CONCEIVED IN ATLANTA.

It was "mailed in Atlanta." The latest campaign has reached the surface.

Just so long as you stay out of the way of the average politician and do not block the way to the furtherance of his plans and schemes just so long you are immune from his slandering tongue and underhanded, infamous attacks.

That this is true has been proven by recent events. Colonel Estill having developed such wonderful strength throughout this entire wire grass section has had the effect of bringing forth the venom of his political enemies in the way of an attack on his war record. There are yet in Georgia, in spite of the great hue and cry of alleged reformers, men who will stoop to dark and dirty infamy in order to slip into office.

The News is in receipt of what is called "Open Letter No. 2," signed by an individual hailing from the peaceful fields of Chatham and marked "personal" by its alleged author.

The open letter referred to seeks to revive a lot of campaign rot that was proven a lie four years ago, during Colonel Estill's first race for the governorship. While the letter purports to be from a Savannah man, yet it bears an "Atlanta post mark." This is where the cloven hoof sticks out particularly plain: From a Savannah man but "mailed in Atlanta."

The letter seeks to stab the knife of slander in the back of a neighbor by charging that Estill was not true to his state and country in its hour of peril; that he was untrue to the cause of the Confederacy. Recognizing the fact that an attempt was being made to estrange from him the thousands of battle-scarred veterans in his race for the governorship, then, Colonel Estill, knowing of the falsity of the charge, promptly and properly demanded that his local camp of Confederate veterans investigate the charges, and, after a thorough investigation, the searchlight of truth revealed the fact that it was the personal spleen and spite that was back of it, and the report of the Confederate Veterans' association fully and thoroughly exonerated Colonel Estill from each and every charge.

It was hoped this would settle the matter, but it seems that since Judas betrayed Christ and Benedict Arnold swore vengeance against the land which gave him birth for a few paltry dollars, that there has been others to imitate these worthies in all ages of the world. As despicable as it is, it seems that a man will allow himself to be used as a tool and a cat's paw that his neighbor might be established in the back. Yet, it stands to the everlasting credit of Colonel Estill's home city that the hand that drives the dagger does not hail from Savannah, but reaches "out from Atlanta."

So it is that it was not Savannah or south Georgia who would put up the filthy lube to pay the postage and printing bills of an "open letter" scattering slanderous and lying aspersions on the character of a brave Confederate soldier, but these bills are "borne in Atlanta."

It has become an unpardonable crime in Georgia to aspire to an office that another man imagines he has a "divine call" to fill. It is especially contemptible to do this provided that you are able to muster sufficient strength back of you to imperil the success and schemes of those whom the "divine call" has summoned to the country's rescue. Colonel Estill has let the secret drop that he is going into the convention backed by practically every county south of Macon. In fact it has become an open secret, and with the upper part of the state out all to pieces, it is not surprising that the trickster and trimmer should begin to get busy. The house is on fire, you know, and something must be done or the jig is up. Someone has put his ear to the ground, and hence the alarm. A Judas must be found to slay an old falsehood twice proven false and malicious; the hand of slanders must fall upon the head of a worthy follower of Lee and Gordon and Jackson, while regrettable as it may be that Savannah is to furnish the cat's paw, the piglet that should give color and prestige to the charge, he it remembered that the arm that supports the blow reaches "out from Atlanta."

The individual who will stoop to these tricks may get his reward in a few paltry dollars and cents, as Judas got his thirty pieces, and Benedict Arnold repaid his own, but it seems to us that this will ill repay the upbraiding of a guilty conscience—if conscience he has.

But with the "headquarters in Atlanta" it is different. Their organ has carried substantially every county from Nicksajack to St. George. They have promised the people that they are coming, and when they see their fortunes waning it is not to be wondered that they will do about. With them it is anything to stem the tide; they will do about. When, after a thorough search of the field, any port in a storm. But when, after a thorough search of the field, they can find nothing against the south Georgia candidate but an old threadbare slander, twice proven false and malicious, it shows the extent of their desperation in their campaign of slander and slime. Colonel Estill, like thousands of other poor boys, at the beginning of the war volunteered his services to his country's defense, and he went to Virginia, where he faced the bullets in the great battles that swept the valley of that grand old commonwealth.

Colonel Estill has been successful in business and has not been selfish with the fruits of his labors: For twenty-five long years he has served as president of a charitable institution and has contributed liberally to the support and maintenance during all these long years to rear and educate orphan boys who are scattered all over Georgia, an honor to his memory that the knife of slander cannot effect though the arm of the wicked reaches out from Atlanta.

South Georgia is going to stand to Estill and the dirty underhanded work sent "out from Atlanta" will simply serve to solidify his forces. Their schemes will fall flat as it should. We regret that the liar and the slanderer has found lodgement in a campaign that should be kept above such methods.

Dr. Munnally Retires In Favor of Russell.

After mature deliberation and a conference with representative men from various sections of the state, I feel that the publication of the following should be given to the public. When I entered the race, I expected that in counting the votes at the primary, the candidate receiving a majority of votes in any county would be entitled to the full delegation of that county in the nominating convention. If no candidate received a majority, I expected that the delegation of that county in the convention would be divided among the several candidates according to the number of votes received by each in the primary. This way the vote of all the people would be represented in the convention, and at the last, an expression of the will of the people would be obtained. With this expectation I entered the race, feeling that whatever vote I received would be recognized in the convention. Those supporting me believed the same, and from every county in the state I would have received a majority, thus controlling all the delegates of the same, or I would have received a minority vote, controlling a fraction of the delegation of the county in the convention. But the democratic executive committee, by their recent action, in adopting the plurality rule, in the counties, and in refusing to recognize the delegates according to the votes received by the several candidates, have completely changed the aspect, virtually eliminating what, in this case, may be four-fifths of the voters of the state in determining the result of the election. With that condition so evident and the result so surely fatal to my candidacy, I respectfully withdrew from the unequal contest.

But in doing so, I would not be understood as counseling at the executive committee. It was the prerogative of that committee to adopt such rules as to them seemed wisest, and perhaps they had precedents to control them, but still it is undemocratic, in that the election may not by any means be an expression of the will of the people. Indeed, in the present instance, according to the plan adopted, a candidate may possibly be elected by less than one-fifth of the popular vote, and that fifth, as is generally the case, may be that part of the population which is most easily influenced by baser motives and most closely held together by unworthy inducements.

Further, in retiring from the race, I would record my grateful acknowledgments to that large class of citizens who had pledged their support to the principles which I advocated, and who had given me much encouragement in the campaign. While I retire, I assure you my cause is not lost. The principles for which I stood are right. The legislation contemplated by their adoption considered the material and moral prosperity of all the people. And in the progress of the campaign they have been more or less impressed upon the public mind, and in some degree admitted by all the candidates, and they have been fully and thoroughly adopted by Judge R. B. Russell, as appears from his published addresses before the people, and to him you can give your support, assured if you can give your support to him in the office of governor who will do all that he can to administer the affairs of the state to the best interests of all the people: a man uncontrolled by rings, combines or corporations, unswayed by partisan passion or race prejudice and unimpaired by personal rancor or commercial antagonism, and I believe he will make an honest effort at a clean government, which will be an honor to the state and profit to all the people.

In conclusion let me say I forgive all the foul, false and foolish fling of my foes, which have had no weight whatever in determining my course; and I feel grateful for the kindness and comradeship of friends, whose loyalty and support I have received, and I retire from the race without a grievance against any man, but with convictions stronger than ever that the principles for which I stood compass the best interests of all the people of the state more fully than the policies outlined by some of the candidates.
