Rawlings' Are Not Going to Gollows

Atlanta, Ga., June 12.—Although the date of their execution has been set for July 18 it is not believed that the Rawlings, convicted of the murder of the Carter children, in Lowndes, will hang on that date. From available information it is not thought that the appeals to the state supreme court, which will be made by Attorney John Randolph Cooper, representing the defendants, can be heard until the October term of court and it is thought that the effort will be made to stay the time of the execution.

Under the laws of the state the defendants have thirty days in which to file in the higher court motions for a new trial after it was entertained and turned down in the Lowndes county superior court. This will give the defendants until June 18.

Attorney Cooper will probably file a bill of exceptions on the last day. The prosecution will then have until June 28.

The papers in the case must be in court by June 7. The clerk of the lower court is allowed fifteen days to transmit the papers and they cannot arrive until June 18. The last arrival case until the October term will be heard July 22, but all the papers in the case to be heard then must have been filed by July 7.

Hauling Water by Trainloads in Louisiana.

New Orleans, June 11.—Arrangements to carry drinking water by trainloads from New Orleans to Milneburg, a fishing village, ten miles from here, on Lake Ponchartraine, were made today in response to an appeal from the 200 inhabitants of that place.

The water famine is in part due to the prolonged hot wave from which New Orleans and vicinity have been suffering for a week, although it has caused no deaths yet.

For three months there has been little rainfall here and the heat hastened the rapid diminution of the water supply in cisterns from which the drinking supply both of Milneburg and thousands of families of the poor in New Orleans is taken.

First Cotton Bloom

Savannah, June 14.—The first cotton bloom of the season was sent to Savannah yesterday from Haddonville to Capt. P. H. Haddon. It was plucked from the Haddonville farm and is a well developed bloom ready to shed for boll.

Seth's Letter

I am not well but potter about in my garden when it is not raining. My truck looks promising and it is a great amusement to me. My weight is just 182 lbs. I have just been in a neighbor's flower garden, which is a fairy land. There are blooming and performing at this moment and by wholesale, yellow jasmies, roses, double peach, hyacinths, Siberian orch tulips, violets, pansies, J. J. quilla, etc. There is a Dutch adage which likens June to a lion and says:

"He shaketh his tail; From atmospheric appearances He is minded to give us some more heavy wave of rain."

The early fruits are pouring in abundantly, especially peaches. I rode down to New Hope church a few days ago with a friend. We spent a long time very agreeably looking the new church building. I felt transported to Philadelphia, where I never have been. My visit to the new building was peculiarly agreeable from the concurrence of a number of circumstances. The building occupies a high spot and with its lofty roof is a conspicuous object. The auditorium gives one an impression of vastness, an impression that increases rather than diminishes, the longer he sits in it. Arches are in evidence everywhere, from the great domed ceiling to the decorative flagpole work about the choir stand behind the pulpit. There are seven rooms connected with the building. I do not think the whole affair cost over \$1,000.

This is a good neighborhood; in fact the land is rich, producing great quantities of corn and cotton, and, of course, growing wealthy. The manners of the people are plain, frank, hospitable and independent—pride of Bulloch county and all its peculiarities. I suppose no set of people in the world live more at ease, or, indeed, more luxuriously, so far as eating and drinking are concerned. It is moreover a moral region. No gambling, no dissipation or frolics. If anyone wishes to know where this neighborhood is let me tell you that it lies ten miles northeast of Statesboro and has the fine Ogeechee river for its boundary on the north.

One of my neighbors says that the other day he caught a bull frog with a whole cat bird in his inside; he also caught a pike with a sucker six inches long in its stomach. These marvelous occurrences are reported to a museum to go on in the journal. I have for several years believed that Bulloch county dirt was better to own than any interest paying bonds or fluctuating stocks. I have watched the steadily enhancing value of land, and have been able to observe its rapid increase as the county's population has grown and the volume of business in every line has correspondingly increased.

We may set it down that cotton will be more in demand each succeeding year. New cotton mills are going up and older ones are spreading out, as a rule, and the world's supply of cotton is short; so we may comfort ourselves that we can have a fairly good price for what we make if it is an average crop, but if the crop is short we may look for an extra good price for all we make.

The scarcity of labor is getting more and more in the way of certainty in farming plans. The land is here and the seasons are reasonably sure to depend upon, but there is nothing so uncertain as the hirings who are expected to be on hand at work time, and their indifference is tantalizing when they do put in an appearance. I wish I could say something which would impress our "big men" as to our urgent need for immigration. We can get Chinese and they will do the work well, and it is said that they are not impudent or unreliable laborers.
