To Create New Circuit.

Senator H. B. Strange has introduced a bill to create a new judicial circuit, taking in the counties of Screven, Jenkins, Bulloch, Tattnall, Emanuel, Thomas and Montgomery. It is expected that Burke and some other counties will be taken from the Augusta circuit and added to the Middle circuit along with Washington, Jefferson and Johnson counties.

Electric Storm Wreaks Havoc at Fitzgerald.

Fitzgerald, Ga., July 1.—The electric storm that visited this place yesterday afternoon did an immense amount of damage, the full extent of which cannot yet be estimated, as communication with the surrounding country is practically cut off.

Telephone lines are out of business, and until 9 o'clock this morning it was impossible to get telegraphic communication, as the lines were down in every direction. Press dispatches that were filed for publication today, have been held and will be published twenty-four hours late. The most serious damage done was to the Baptist church, the steeple of which was struck and ignited. Though the rain was pouring in torrents, the flames defied the efforts of the firemen for more than a half hour, and the steeple was entirely destroyed. The body of the church was somewhat damaged and the entire loss is estimated at nearly \$500.

The big tent in which Rev. J. R. Gunn, of Macon, was conducting a series of meetings, was blown down and one section of it was destroyed.

The residence of M. V. Church was struck and considerably damaged and the eight people who were in the house at the time were severely shocked, but none of them suffered permanent injury.

A partly finished residence belonging to J. C. Boney was blown down.

A residence belonging to Mr. Burnett, which was nearly completed, was blown off its foundation.

Negro Hanged; Then Burned.

Chickasha, I. T., July 1.—A negro who committed a criminal assault on the 16-year-old daughter of Ira Robertson, near Womack, was captured last night and after being taken to the scene of the crime, was hanged and burned.

He confessed his guilt and offered no resistance to the mob. The negro gave his name as Cliff Mays of Marshall, Tex., and also as Will Newbright of San Antonio.

The negro was overtaken near Bradley by 400 men.

It was 8 o'clock this morning when the Robertson home was reached. The negro was brought before Miss Robertson.

"That's the one," said she at once.

The negro replied: "Yes, lady, I'm the one. Gentlemen, I admit the crime."

The mob then took the negro to a tree on the bank of Walnut Creek. He was given an opportunity to speak and he again confessed his guilt and offered a fervent prayer to God for forgiveness. He was then drawn into the air to die by strangulation.

Before life was extinct, the body was lowered to the ground. Logs and brush were heaped on the man, and the mass was ignited. The body writhed, a few groans were heard and the flames completed the work.

Two hours later the charred body was buried under the tree under the supervision of a deputy marshal, W. F. Purcell, who had been thwarted in his efforts to take the negro from the mob.

Miss Robertson, who is not serious, while it is said, "An eye for an eye," said she was satisfied.

As previously announced, the revival services at the Baptist church came to a close on Sunday night, at which time the ordinance of baptism was administered to ten applicants for admission to the church. There were three who gave \$100 each, with a number of others ranging from \$25 down to \$5, after which the hat was passed around and a large amount of smaller sums were given.

Pops Say "Cheap Dollar" Has Prevented Disaster.

St. Louis, June 29.—At the conference of the national committee of the People's party yesterday an address of the voters of the county was adopted. M. J. Mulline, of Tennessee, introduced a resolution providing that the conference agree in the work being done by the reform press association. It resulted in a stormy debate, but was finally adopted. The address "to the American people," in part, is as follows:

"The so-called '50-cent' dollar has saved the nation from business disaster. Duties on imports have remained the same; no new land laws have been enacted and the land laws change from bankruptcy and to business activity can be credited to nothing except the increase in the volume of money and the tremendous inflation of bank credits that have been used in business as money equivalent. Our contention has never been for any 'God-ordained money metal,' but for an increase in the volume of money, so as to maintain stability in the price level. There are other principles of the party that are not accepted in full and the party's mission will not be fulfilled until the questions regarding monopoly, transportation, control of the avenues of information machine rule, the censorship of the postoffice department and other questions have been settled.

"All monopolies should be owned and operated by the whole people.

The demand that United States senators should be elected by the people instead of by the legislatures was first declared in the platform of the People's party and is now advocated by practically the entire nation.

"We are opposed to any tariff that in its administration is for the benefit of American trusts, which sell to foreigners cheaper than to the American consumer. This is particularly so in reference to the rural free delivery secured by the Hon. Thomas E. Watson while a member of congress.

"The growing evils, such as government by injunction, militarism, autocratic power, the postoffice and in all departments of the government.
