



Milltown's Vote Solid For Estill.

Milltown, Ga., July 6.—If the Democratic voters of the entire state were as loyal and enthusiastic in their support of Col. J. H. Estill as are the people of this hustling little city and the southeastern part of Berrien county, it is safe to hazard the belief that none of the other candidates for the governorship would get a single vote at the coming primary.

The Estill fever is epidemic in this section. The names of his opponents are seldom mentioned. There are good and cogent reasons why the people of Milltown favor the election of the South Georgia candidate. Of course, they are anxious that this glorious part of Georgia should be recognized, but paramount to all other reasons is the fact that they are enjoying an era of prosperity that means the building up of a larger city, and they are unwilling to endanger that prosperity.

Milltown has reached its present prominence by reason of having sane and sound business men in the community. They are firm in the belief that, if the state is to continue to prosper, it is highly essential and important that a business man who has demonstrated his fitness by his own success in life administer the affairs of government, and they see in Col. 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Hedging on The Port Rate Question.
