Mr. Cone's Comments on Gubernatorial Campaign.

Editor Statesboro News:

I see in your last week's issue a
very favorable editorial mention
of an incipient Estill boom in the
county, which has been republi-
cated prominently in the Savan-
nah News.

Now, from the former attitude
of your paper I conclude that the
Hon. Hoke Smith was not very
far from the truth when he
charged that the Estill movement
was at least greatly in the interest
of another one of the leading candi-
dates—a charge very vigorously
denied by Mr. Estill; but as you
are both fighting Mr. Smith and
no other one of the candidates it
looks like you are pooling issues,
or that you are getting danger-
ously near the line.

As one of the "dear people" I
feel like giving through the col-
umns of your paper my reasons
for choosing Mr. Smith in this
race; also my reasons for not vot-
ing for Mr. Estill. I do not agree
with Mr. Smith on his disfran-
chisement plank. I think the
negro question can very safely be
let alone at this time and left to
the wisdom of our legislature,
where I think it rightly belongs;
but I am willing to take him for
our next governor solely upon the
great fight he is making upon the
political rings, bosses and the cor-
rupting influence of the lobbyist,
and upon the encroachment of
corporate wealth and greed upon
the rights of the whole people—a
thing that no other one of the
candidates is doing. The very
fact that all of the candidates,
all the political bosses and all the
corporate influence, backed by a
subsidized press, are fighting Mr.
Smith makes him, to my mind,
the people's candidate. I am
voting for Mr. Smith for the fight
he is getting on himself and the
direction from which that fight
comes.

Brantley Invited Here.

A petition largely signed by
merchants and farmers has been
forwarded to Hon. W. G. Brantley,
member of congress from the 11th
district, asking him to address
the voters of Bulloch county on
the gubernatorial situation at
this place on Saturday, August
4th, or as near that date as his
convenience would suggest. Mr.
Brantley is known to be an ardent
supporter of Col. J. H. Estill, and
it is the South Georgia candidate's
friends who are inviting him here.
It is also expected that Capt. R.
M. Hitch will be invited here the
same day to speak for Col. Estill,
provided that Mr. Brantley can
come. The committee who mailed
the invitation has received no
reply as yet, but is expecting one
within the next day or two.

Estill just because he happens to
hail from South Georgia. I want
to base my vote upon some
stronger claim. It is urged that
Mr. Estill is a fine business man,
that he would give us a good busi-
ness administration. A great
many of the best and wisest
statesmen—men who have devoted
their lives to the study of state-
craft—have been business failures
complete. Not to go outside of
our own state I will mention Alex
Stephens, Ben Hill and Jno. B.
Gordon. Great men were they;
but they were business failures
and died poor men. Georgia will
not dishonor their memory by
selecting a man whose only claim
is that he is a good business man.

I believe Mr. Estill has accumu-
lated a fortune in successful
business. I believe also that he
has done this legitimately, and I
am glad to believe it of him and I
rejoice at his success. I do not re-
fuse to vote for him for what he
has done, for I commend him for
it, but I will not vote for him
because he has left undone the
very thing which I think he was
morally bound to do, even though
it did not pay so well. Mr. Estill,
as sole owner and manager of a
great daily newspaper enjoying a
monopoly of the daily news of a
great part of Georgia, owed a
debt to the reading public which
I do not think he has fulfilled in
such manner as will entitle him to
fill the highest office within the
gift of the people of Georgia. The
press is the moulder and educator
of public opinion, and public
opinion aroused is the power alone
which will correct abuses under
our system of government and
preserve the constitution and the
laws (Mr. Estill's platform).

I have been reading the Morning
News thirty years or more and I
know what I am talking about
when I say that the Savannah News
does not jump on any evil under
the sun that would hurt Mr.
Estill's pocketbook. I have seen
more editorial mention in the Sa-
vannah News in the past five
years against the South Carolina
dispensary than I have ever seen
against any great public evil in
Georgia, even though that evil
was located right at Mr. Estill's
home. Again, in the late municipal
primary in Savannah it was
alleged, and never denied, that
over eight hundred votes were
publicly bought and sold in the
most open and shameless manner.
Shame on Savannah and shame
on Georgia! I have seen no word
of condemnation for this crime
against the highest right and
privilege of the voter, not only in
Savannah but all over the state.
From this paper which is owned
and controlled by the man who is
asking the people of Georgia to
vote for him for governor, whose
platform is "The Constitution
and Laws of Georgia." No Sir!
I would rather vote for a man
from Pigeon Roost—from Dade
county—than one who passes over
such lawlessness as vote-buying,
Sunday saloons, public defecations
at home, etc., without one
word of condemnation as a moral
and civic duty.

Again, Mr. Estill has turned
completely around in his method
of campaigning. He started out
condemning the methods of his
opponents with a dignified hand-
shaking campaign. (I rather liked
that in him.) Now he can whoop
up the "dear democratic voter"
and count counties in a way that
completely discounts the Smith
and Howell forces.

I read somewhere a story like
this: A man named Ananias had a
deep-laid plot to carry out, and
when he doubted his capacity to
carry it to success he took along
with him a certain orator named
Vertullus. Now, I would have
voted for Mr. Estill much a-con-
fide if he had left his Vertullus at

Makes Hot Reply

Atlanta, July 25.—In the
course of debate in the house
Tuesday on the bill prohibiting
bucketshops Representative An-
derson, of Chatham county, threw
some salty innuendo on the
Southern Cotton association, which
had been one of the first to stir
up agitation against dealing
in futures.

"The interest of the Southern
Cotton association in the matter
is commendable," said Mr. An-
derson. "It might proceed fur-
ther with its investigation and tell
the public who it was that dealt
in futures under the names of P.
A. Lee and Mike O'Grady, and
also who it was who was behind
the Piedmont Brokerage Co. and
owned an eighth interest in it."

President Harvie Jordan, of the
association, and Richard Cheat-
ham, its secretary, were asked
later what they had to say in re-
ply to Mr. Anderson's remark.
He said:

If Mr. Anderson, of Chatham,
or anybody else said that I had
any connection with a bucketshop
or dealt in futures, he lied—that
is all. I never heard of the Pied-
mont Brokerage company, nor
the names of Lee and O'Grady
which he mentioned. The associa-
tion has no knowledge of them
either.

Secretary Cheatham was equal-
ly emphatic.
"The idea is preposterous, un-
founded. The association has no
knowledge of such people. The
idea that it has been dealing in
futures is too ridiculous to dignify
with a denial."

"That Infamous Circular."

Just as we predicted in the News of Tuesday, the small fry of the Hoke Smith support have been flown to arms over the circulation of the list containing the photographs of the many sleek, greasy looking negroes that Hoke appointed to fat offices while he was secretary of the interior.

They say it is just "awful that such dirty circulars should be sent into white men's homes." They forget that it was just as awful for Hoke Smith to send one of these fat, sleek, greasy negroes into white men's homes to pass on their applications for pensions. We refer to John P. Turner, who received two thousand dollars a year and expenses to do this. John P. is the blackest and grasiest of all the sons of old Bishop Turner, on whose endorsement it was that Cleveland appointed Hoke Smith to a place in his cabinet. This same man, Bishop Turner, whose entire family—sons, sons-in-law, etc.—were all taken care of and given fat jobs in shady places, while the farmers in Georgia were making four-cents cotton, is the negro who has issued a challenge to debate the subject that "a white man is not as good as a negro." A challenge that no self-respecting white man could afford to accept.

We know that it is awful dirty to let the voters know about the awful dirty things that the politicians do, but it is the right of the voter to know these things.

The great question about which the people are most interested is not as to how these circulars got to Statesboro, or who mailed them, or whose list of names was used, or who paid the postage on them; but the great fundamental question arises, is it true? Did Mr. Smith make these appointments as charged? Did he turn from his door the widow of a Confederate soldier, in a strange city, and give jobs to negroes which would have been glad to fill? Confronting him with it at Albany, Mr. Clark Howell told Mr. Smith that he had four thousand dollars with which to back up each and every charge made in the circular, but Smith refused to call the bet. Howell told Smith to put up or shut up. Smith shut up, but his little supporters had not learned sense enough yet to do likewise.

The circulars in question went like hot cakes. There is a big demand for more. The more they advertise them the more the folks want to see them. It would not be surprising if another batch should arrive any day, either by frank or prepaid, it makes no difference which. The great question still remains: did Hoke Smith appoint these negroes? Howell's \$4,000.00 says that the circulars are a true extract from the records at Washington. Smith refuses to put up, and no attempt is made to prove that the record has been falsified.

Wasn't that a pretty bunch though to draw to? Lots of folks were sure it was the executive committee of the "Fore Day Club." They were, in any event, about the same stamp of negroes; they were of the Bishop Turner ilk. Though they were better than poor white folks. Like the Bishop, they had a reason to believe this when they were given fine, fat jobs, at big salaries,

while a defenseless white woman whose husband gave up his life for the Confederate cause walked the streets of Washington with no shelter under which to lay her head.

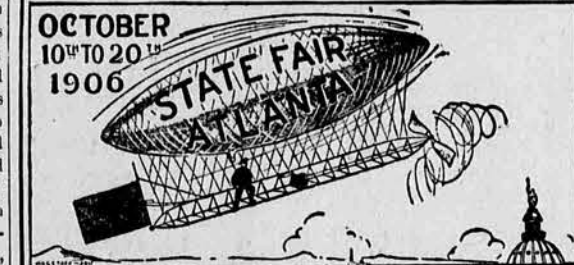
That these negro appointments were true at that time is well known to the thousands of good men who left the democratic party on account of it. They are back in the party now, but they have not forgotten the negro appointments.

The cheap Sunday excursion has become the greatest menace to society and good morals that has ever struck this section. Although the father of this child should be severely punished he is not alone to blame. The man who sold him the whiskey, the officials of Atlanta who licensed the sale of the poison and the people of Atlanta who, by their vote, make it possible for the officials to grant the license, are to blame. The law will touch the inhuman father only, but God will deal with the barkeeper, the officials and the citizens in His own good time.
