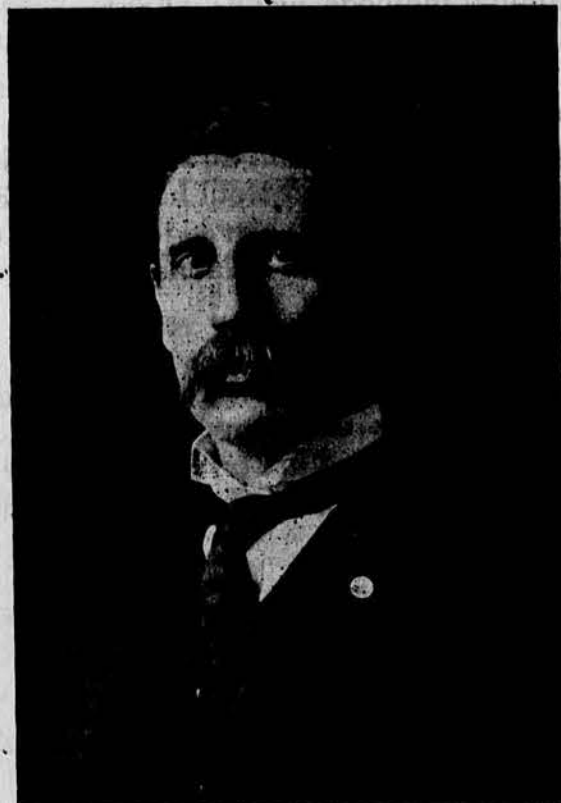

Bryan to Urge Ownership of Railroads by People.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug.—Homer Bass,
of the St. Louis Republic, writing
from Zurich, Switzerland, under
Aug. 2, gives the first definite state-
ment of W. J. Bryan's program for
turning the railroads of the country
over to the federal and state govern-
ments. The plan is new and has been
carefully worked out.

"Mr. Bryan will attack the trusts in
his New York speech," writes Mr.
Bass, "and I suspect he will go further
and give his views on certain forms
of public ownership of public utilities,
with especial reference to railroads
both interstate and within the states.

It is also quite likely that with the
support of the original Bryan party
wing and the aid of such eastern con-
servatives as Alvin Clark, of New Jer-
sey, he will come out boldly for a con-
stitutional amendment that will make
an income tax one of certainties of the
next half dozen years. If Mr. Bryan
enters upon the money question, it is
quite likely that he will repeat his as-
sertions of the recent years that con-
ditions have eliminated money as an
issue, as the results of several conver-
sations with Mr. Bryan in London, at
which time I saw him nearly every
day in a fortnight.

"One of the many striking impres-
sions that have come to Mr. Bryan
on this tour has to do with ownership
of great public utilities by the state
with special reference to the railroads.
Mr. Bryan has been in Europe on other
occasions. He has been careful to
examine the conditions surrounding
the government management of larger
arteries of travel.

"In every important particular he
would apply the theory differently
the United States. His plan would
admit of the ownership of certain
trunk lines by the government in order
that the efficient through service
should not in any way suffer impair-
ment but he would insist that the lo-
cal lines in every state be owned by
the separate states, thus preserving
more effectively the idea of state in-
dividuality which, in Mr. Bryan's
opinion, would in time be wiped out
if all lines passed into federal con-
trol.

"The enormous prestige that would
be the result of railroad management
in America would, of course, tend to
intrench the party in power and
would in time accomplish what Mr.
Bryan fears and would contend
against the abolition of state bound-
aries.

Asks Investigation Of Soldiers' Home.

An investigation of the man-
agement of the soldiers' home will
in all probability be undertaken
by a joint committee from the
house of senate, a resolution to
this effect having been introduced
in the house at yesterday morn-
ing's session by Messrs. Millikin
of Wayne, Knight of Berrien,
and Williams of Laurens. This
resolution will, under the rules
of the house, come up for con-
sideration at today's session.

It provides that a committee
of five from the house and three
from the senate be appointed by
the presiding officers of the respec-
tive houses, which shall summon
witnesses, take evidence and re-
port to the next legislature, the
report to be filed prior to the first
Wednesday in October, 1906.

Immediately after the reading
of the journal was dispensed with
yesterday morning, Mr. Williams
of Laurens, arose to a question of
personal privilege and stated that
he had been vilely abused through
the columns of the press because
of his criticism of the manage-
ment of the soldiers' home, and
that he desired to adopt every
charge made by the inmates
against the management, and
begged that the trustees afford
him the opportunity to submit
proof of the truth of them.

Mr. Williams evinced consid-
erable emotion while delivering
his remarks, which characterized
the one who could "feed, vulture-
like, on such an institution, as
vile indeed." His remarks are
published in full elsewhere.

At the afternoon session the
house passed the bill of the Chat-
ham delegation appropriating
\$15,000 for the erection of a
monument to General James
Oglethorpe, the founder of the
colony of Ga, upon Chippewa
Square, Savannah, Ga. A like
sum will be contributed by the
Oglethorpe Monument Association,
and the statue and the
reality upon which it will be
situated, should the senate concur
in the action of the house, will
become the property of the state.
—Atlanta Constitution.

HOKE SMITH SWEEPS STATE

Indications Are That He will Have at Least
110 Counties and Will Win On
First Ballot.

The Hoke Smith tidal wave
that swept over Georgia on Wed-
nesday carried everything before
it. From what we can learn of
the latest returns is that he has
swept all sections, from the
mountains to the sea.

He carried all the big counties
with the exception of Chatham,
which was carried by Col. Estill
by a small margin. The election
was the hottest contested that
was ever held in the state. The
expected sweep for "Plain Dick"
Russell in north and middle
Georgia was late arriving; in fact,
at last accounts was side tracked
somewhere up in Jackson county.

Col. Estill's solid Phalanx in
South Georgia is also very much
out of repair. The safety valve
refuses to work and we fear that
it will never again be able to
navigate.

Clark Howell comes up like a
little man and says that though
Hoke won it, he has no apologies
to make, and will hereafter look
after the editorial page of the
Atlanta Constitution. He and
Estill both printed the news
of their undoing in box car
letters in their papers yesterday
morning. They realize the fact
that news is news and that is what
the people are paying for.

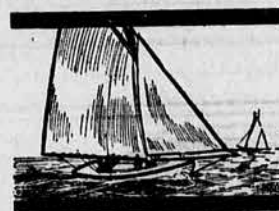
Farmer Jim Smith is now saw-
ing wood over in Oconee county
and after he gets his five thousand
bales of short cotton harvested he
will doubtless come out of his
hole long enough to tell Tom
Watson "I beat you in McDuffie
county." The fight in McDuffie
was hot. Mr. Watson took the
stump in his home county for
Hoke Smith and put in the best
efforts of his life, but the result
is a defeat for Hoke and Tom
in McDuffie by about 100 ma-
jority.

Another feature of the campaign
was that Hoke Smith carried
Brantley's home county, and at
last accounts between him and
"Plain Dick" in the latter's
home county was too close to be
placed in any column.

Mr. Smith went before the vot-
ers of the state on the disfra-
chisement proposition and the peo-
ple have said in thundering tones
that they want it. Now let the
legislature submit it to the people
and we believe they will vote for
it by a large majority. The News
will not print any more stuff in
opposition to it. If the people
want it let them have it.

RESULT IN BULLOCH

Some of the Smallest Major-
ities Ever Given a Set of
Candidates Mark the
Result

Since the smoke has cleared
away from the ballot waged in
Bulloch on Wednesday we are
now able to see more clearly. The
Democratic Executive Committee
met in the court house on last
night and declared the result.
The big vote of 978 in the States-
boro district and the length of
the ticket delayed the consoli-
dation until a late hour. There
were 2,400 votes polled in the
primary, the largest white vote
ever polled in the county. This
was expected when it was seen
that we had the largest white
registration in our history.

The most spirited of the close
races was that of the Clerk. For
a long time it was neck and neck
between Temples and Lester.
One would be one and two ahead
and then the other, and when the
final count was consolidated
Lester had a majority of 9 votes.

The next was between Akins and
Anderson for receiver, Akins
finally landed with 85 majority to
his credit. A large number of
anxious friends crowded the
rooms, but every body was in a
humor, and the defeated candi-
dates all took their medicine like
good little men, and no one was
heard to complain.

It will be observed that while
each of the candidates have carried
six counties each and with 18 votes
each in the convention; yet Mr.
Brannen has a grand total popular
majority of 1711 in the district,
this too, after allowing Col. Shep-
pard the big majority of 1500 in
Savannah, estimated. Outside
of Chatham the Sheppard
majority was only 257 scattered
in the five other counties that he
was able to pick up by the smallest
margins that any man ever had
come to him. It seems in this
case that he is the son of good
luck and that Mr. Brannen is the
victim of bad luck. We lose four-
fifths of the counties that Shep-
pard carried by a total of less than
three hundred votes.

Take the great agricultural oppor-
tunities of the district, Brannen swept
them clean with the exception of
Tattnall and lost it by only 88
votes. This is interesting. One
thousand five hundred of the
Sheppard 1,757 came from Savan-
nah.

Outside of Savannah Brannen has
majorities amounting to more
than 8,450 while Sheppard's
country majorities are only a
little more than 200. Yet he
catches five counties with two
thirds of his vote in the con-
vention on this small number of
votes.

The Convention will meet in
Statesboro on next Thursday then
the tug of war will be had. Just
what the result will be no one
can tell.

Crazed By Fear

Mrs. Augusta Zeiter Unable to Stand Strain of
Guarding Savings.

AFRAID OF BURGLARS

Had \$2,880 Concealed About Her Clothing and
Constant Fear of Robbery Resulted
in Mental Wreck.

Chicago, Ill.—Driven to a state border-
ing on insanity by the fear of burglars,
Mrs. Augusta Zeiter, 57 years old, of 1831
Nebraska Ave. was taken to the city
hospital in a greenback. There was a note
for \$150 and various papers believed to be
of value.

After being relieved of her money, Mrs.
Zeiter called for her son, J. Zeiter. He
was sent for and told the hospital au-
thorities that his mother had complained
of a fear of burglars for sometime past.
He was not aware that his mother had so
much wealth about her person.

It is said that Mrs. Zeiter formerly
kept her money in bank, where, knowing
of its safety, it caused her no uneasiness
of mind. But recently she had drawn the
money for a business investment, and the
responsibility of its safe-keeping preyed
so heavily upon her mind as to result in
mental collapse.

Let Bulloch County Have the Agricultural College.

The people of Bulloch county face an opportunity and a problem. The opportunity is one that comes but once in a lifetime. The problem is easy of solution; only unity of purpose and action being needed.

Under the Perry bill, which provides for an agricultural college in each congressional district, there will be, within a few days, such a college established somewhere in the First district. This bill requires the city or town securing the agricultural college to donate at least two hundred acres of land for a site and an experiment farm, or, if they see fit and prefer to do so, \$1,000 may be raised instead.

Now, Bulloch county wants and must have the agricultural college of the First district. We are the exact geographical center of the First district, and for convenience of location alone we should have it.

Bulloch county has the best farming lands in the state, a proof of which is the first prize she has won at the last three state fairs, but on account of some of the powers that be, she did not receive them.

Our markets are as good as any in the district. We have four trains to Savannah daily, and if unable to dispose of the products grown on the experiment farm in the local markets, it will be but little trouble to send them to Savannah.

We grow a greater variety of crops in Bulloch than is produced in any other county in the district. More sea island cotton is grown here than in any other county in Georgia.

We have better school houses and schools, more frame and painted dwellings and barns, and as good a rural mail delivery as any county in the First congressional district.

Statesboro needs this school and will profit and grow rich off of the money spent here by the students. City after city could be cited to prove that they owe their very existence, growth and prosperity to the location of some college. College folk are liberal spenders. It is a good business proposition for Statesboro. Will she rally to the occasion and make the college a certainty?

Bulloch county needs this school. The county is pre-eminently agricultural, and the boys of the farm have only needed the opportunity offered by education of this kind to prepare themselves for the battle of life. The educated farmer is the most independent man in the world; he is king of kings. The ignorant farmer is the victim of quacks, tricksters and demagogues.

Not one-half of the land in Bulloch county is under cultivation. Many broad and fertile acres are waiting for the plow and the hoe, when they will blossom and give a bounteous yield. For aught unknown and unrealized possibilities unheard of are

contained in the fertile soil of Bulloch county. The educated farmer can bring them to light.

What is the curricula and what are the subjects taught in these agricultural colleges? are questions which, seem of interest to most people who have thought along these lines.

The curricula is not high; being intended to prepare students for the freshman class of the agricultural college at Athens. The course of study is simple but interesting. It embraces such subjects as English grammar and composition, arithmetic and business forms, literature, dairying, stock raising and breeding, care of bees and the raising of honey for market, chemistry of the soil, diversity and rotation of crops and kindred subjects. The experiment farm makes the education practical. The boy learns to do by doing.

Eight hundred or one thousand dollars have already been raised toward securing this college for Bulloch county, and Governor Terrell has been written to for information as to the best steps to be taken to secure this school.

Savannah and Chatham county want this college and if we sleep they will get it.

Let us work hard, consistently and unceasingly, and we will land this institution as sure as fate. But we must work, and work at once.

Cause of Delay.

The news is a little late today in order that we may be able to furnish our readers with the election in full in an intelligent manner. The vote in the Statesboro precinct, where there were 982 votes polled, was not counted until late last night and the official count was necessary to determine a number of contests. The vote in several of the counties of the First district was so close that the official count was necessary in order to determine who would get the delegation.

Now let us see some of the promised reforms put into practice. Rawlings is a winner over Saffold. Col. Saffold can console himself on the idea that "there are others."

Now let us go about to picking cotton, gathering peas, etc. We hope that we are through with all the elections for awhile.

We have met the enemy and we are his. Now let the dead past bury the dead.

Georgia is safe, no matter which one of the men who aspired to the office of Governor.

Judge J. W. Overstreet is some runner himself. If he doesn't mind Hoke Smith will get jealous of him.

The Estill leaders in Savannah fought Brannen to a finish. There may come a time when they will need us.

We hope soon to see the iron horse running through the section between here and Garfield.

A man who will vote against his neighbor for a petty little difference is not one of the kind of folks who are making the world better.

Wonder what Gov. Hoke Smith thinks about his Bulloch county supporters who told him he had a walk-over in this county.

Vincent Sanford will now concede, since he has carried no county in Georgia, that the "dead people" are not anxious for him to serve them in the capacity of comptroller general.

Russell's Victory in Bulloch

While it is true that it is a Hoke Smith landslide in the state of Georgia, it is a clear "Plain Dick" Russell sweep in the State of Bulloch.

About the sickest set of men we know of anywhere are the friends of Hoke Smith, who thought they had a "cinch" for Hoke in Bulloch. The Russell plurality of 50 over Hoke Smith, when added to it the vote polled for Estill, Howell and Jim Smith was a majority against Hoke Smith of 275 votes in the county. There were secret of men here who would have staked out to one that Hoke Smith would get two to every one in the county. No more confident set of men went out against the real thing than did our Hoke Smith friends on Wednesday in Bulloch. PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency, Joseph M. Terrell Governor of Ga.

Atlanta, Ga., July 20, 1906

Whereas the general assembly, at its session in 1903, proposed an amendment to the Constitution of this state, as set forth in an Act approved Aug. 22, 1903, to-wit:

An Act to amend the constitution of the state by providing that the judges of the superior court shall have authority to add to the number of judges of the superior court, and for other purposes.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the general assembly, that the constitution of this state be amended by adding to the same, section 2, of article 8, the following: The judges of the superior court shall have authority to add to the number of judges of the superior court, and for other purposes.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, that the above proposed amendment shall be submitted for ratification or rejection to the electors of this state at the next general election to be held after publication as provided for in the second section of this act, in the several election districts of this state, at which election every person shall be qualified to vote who is entitled to vote for members of the general assembly, and who is not disqualified by the laws of this state.

Now, therefore, I, Joseph M. Terrell, governor of said state, do issue this my proclamation, hereby declaring that the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is submitted for ratification or rejection to the voters of the state, qualified to vote for members of the general assembly at the general election to be held on Wednesday, October 3, 1906.

Enforce The Vagrancy Law.

The News calls the especial attention of the city and county officers to the fact that the vagrancy law on the statute books of Georgia is not being enforced. This is a good law and it should be efficiently carried out.

It was enacted for the purpose of preventing idling and loitering, and to orce worthless whites and blacks to either work or go to prison.

The street corners of Atlanta are crowded with idlers and loiterers who have no visible means of support.

This is especially true in the negro districts of the city, and it is also true of many of the smaller towns and cities of the state.

Thousands of able-bodied white men, boys and negroes, are idling on the streets of towns and villages of this state.

They are living by the sweat of somebody else's brow.

They are contributing nothing to the welfare and upbuilding of the com-
munity in which they loaf.

Labor is extremely scarce throughout the state.

Farmers are unable to find enough workmen to till the soil and gather crops.

In the cities builders need help. Every line of industry is active and progressive.

Times are good and there is work in plenty for every man and boy who is willing to labor for a living. There is no excuse for idling and loitering.

The thousands of vagrants who are loafing about the streets of the cities, and in the towns and villages of Georgia, should be made to go to work, or to jail.

The object lesson illustrating the evils of vagrancy were called to the attention of The News yesterday.

One was a case of a lazy, worthless, but strong and able-bodied young man, who was being idling and loitering, puffing cigarettes and gossiping on the street corners of Atlanta almost at any time, day or night.

He has an invalid mother who is suffering for the need of medicine and attention.

Besides this worthless boy who has declined to work and contribute any-
thing to the support of his mother, there are two young daughters of the help-
less woman, but for whom she would be entirely destitute.

While the street loafer stands on the corner and idles away his time, his
young sisters are compelled to work in one of the factories of this town in
order to provide a scanty sustenance for their invalid mother and themselves.

On account of the mother's illness and extraordinary expenses incident
thereto, this family has been unable to make ends meet with the limited funds
earned by these industrious girls, and now they have been compelled to apply
for help to buy food and medicine for this unfortunate mother.

If the vagrancy law was properly enforced, young scamps like this boy
would not be allowed to idle on the street corners and live on the food bought
by his sisters, contributing nothing himself to the support of the family.

Another is that of a worthless vagrant father who lives in idleness and
partial drunkenness while his three little children work in a factory and give
him the scant pieces of coin which they earn each week.

Idleness and vagrancy is responsible for much of the crime of the country.
Worthless vagrants who refuse to work must steal or gamble for a living.

If the officers of the law will enforce the vagrancy statutes there will be
less of larceny, burglary, drunkenness and other crimes in this state.

The law is very plain and the punishment well defined for vagrancy.

It provides that persons who are wandering or strolling about in idleness,
who are able to work and have no property to support them, are vagrants and
should be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanor and punished accordingly.

It provides that persons leading an idle, immoral or profligate life,
who have no property to support them and who are able to work and do not do so,
are to be classed as vagrants.

Further, that all persons able to work, having no property to support them,
and who have no visible or known means of a fair, honest and reputable liveli-
hood, come under the same class, and that persons having a fixed abode, but
who have no visible property to support them, and who live by stealing or by
trading or bartering stolen goods, are to be punished for the same offense.

It also includes professional gamblers living in idleness, and all able-bodied
persons who are found begging for a living or who quit their houses and leave
their families without means of sustenance.

Also that persons who are able to work and do not work, and have no
proper or other means of support, but who hire out their minor children and
live upon their wages, shall be deemed and considered vagrants.

Under these descriptions it ought to be comparatively easy for the sheriffs,
constables, police and town officers of Georgia to enforce the law and punish
the idlers and the vagrants who haunt the communities of this state.

The News hopes that the officers of Georgia will more strictly enforce the
vagrancy law in the future.

It is the purpose of The News to call frequent attention to this important
matter, and we earnestly hope that prompt action will be taken by the police
and county officers of Atlanta and Fulton county and of every city and county
in the state of Georgia.—Atlanta News.
