Georgia's Increased Tax Returns

HOKE SMITH NOMINATED BY A RISING VOTE.

Convention at Macon More of a Hoke Love Feast Than a Democratic Convention.

The State Democratic Convention that convened in Macon Tuesday turned out to be a Hoke Smith love feast. Everywhere you went it was Hoke Smith! Hoke Smith! The name rang through our ears until we got converted, then disgusted, reconverted, and re-disgusted several times over.

Bulloch county was represented by Col. R. Lee Moore, J. R. Miller and W. T. Wright. Col. Johnston, the other delegate, was sick and unable to attend. Messrs. B. T. Outland, W. H. Blitch and J. E. Anderson from Bulloch were there, and while they were not regularly appointed delegates they participated in the Convention as much as any one else. They and Rev. J. S. McLenore had a seat with the Bulloch county delegation in the Convention.

No name went before the convention with the exception of that of Hoke Smith in connection with the governorship. If there had ever lived such men as "Plain Dick" Russell, J. Holly Estill, Clark Howell or Jim Smith it seems to have escaped the attention of the throng who infested Macon on Tuesday. There seemed to be no disposition to abuse or poke fun at a fellow who had brought up the rear, but it was manifested that the spoils were to go to the victors in this fight. This being true all the men who fill the various places in the party machinery are those who were avowed supporters of Hoke Smith. Bulloch county did not ask for one of these places, she contented herself by voting for those whose names were put forth by the neighboring counties. There was no call of the roll of delegates of the counties. A

Prominent among those who stood high and head and shoulders above all the balance was Col. Geo. W. Owens who cast the Chatham Estill vote in the first district caucus that morning. After the nomination was declared unanimous Hon. Hoke Smith was sent for and came before the Convention and delivered a speech of acceptance. His speech was broad a conservative as applied to those who had opposed of delegates of the counties. A

Deputy Sheriff Elsmore Too Quick to Shoot.

Reidsville, Ga., Sept. 4.—Last night Deputy Sheriff E. C. Elsmore, accompanied by Jesse Furvis, Marion Bennett and Jesse Branch, went in search of Kid Green, colored, who was wanted for shooting cows. The negro was located about two miles from Lew and his house was surrounded. He was called out, but refused to come, at the same time opening a window. Deputy Elsmore ordered him to surrender, but Green fell back and called to his wife to give him his gun. Deputy Elsmore jumped on the wood scaffold at the window and fired at Green.

Mr. Branch heard the shooting and supposed that the negro had opened fire on Deputy Elsmore, rushed around the house. Just as he cleared the corner Elsmore jumped from the scaffold and Branch thought it was the negro escaping and raised his gun to shoot, but recognized Deputy Elsmore and lowered his gun. Elsmore thought Branch was the negro trying to shoot him and fired at Branch, killing him almost instantly. Mr. Branch was a prominent citizen and leaves a wife and two children. Deputy Elsmore is almost prostrated with grief.

During the excitement the negro escaped.

Brannen's Friends Are Loyal.

There has been considerable discussion about "dark horses" and "black horses," but it is evident that there is little hope for a dark horse in this convention.

The friends of Hon. J. A. Brannen feel that he is entitled to the nomination by every standard of reason and justice. They keep on rubbing in the fact that he is the choice of a very large majority of the people of the district, having received nearly 1800 votes in the recent primary more than Mr. Sheppard did.

Mr. Brannen has gone before the people of this district twice, spent his time and money, and each time a majority of the voters have declared for him. Yet they call for him to run the third time. Who knows but what this crowd will be calling for the fourth race?

Something was said about the rules laid down by the recent state democratic convention, which adopted the South Carolina plan that a popular vote should rule, and when a candidate did not have a majority of all the votes receiving the highest number run again. Now, if they want to apply the rules of that convention to this district Mr. Brannen is already the democratic nominee. It proved that a candidate receiving a majority of all the votes cast should be the nominee, and that is just what Brannen did. He has thirteen hundred majority of the best white men on the face of the globe. It was insinuated that he might be placed in the role of being afraid to go before the district. Why should he be afraid, he has beat the race on a majority vote already twice? Two times have the majority of the voters of the First district declared for him, a bigger majority this time than before.

Why should he be afraid? Why should Sheppard want to go the second time? Because he knows he has lost this time and he wants another chance to see if he can't slip in. His friends say that he could run a better race this time than before.

Why could he? What has he done since the polls closed on August 22 that would cause a single Brannen vote to change to him? He has set here and deadlocked a convention by counties when he knows, and everybody knows, that he is the choice of a decided minority of the voters of the district.

He is profiting by the fall votes of Bryan and Tamm; his majority in one is 12 and 38 in the other. Half of the voters of Bryan and half of them in Tamm have said they don't want him, and yet, by his own breath, he is saying himself and defeating a majority of the voters of the district.

The people have had as many elections this year as they want, they will have another primary, or election, if it is forced upon them, and they will again, by a majority that will forever settle the hash of the crowd who are trying to get in on a minority, name the man who will represent them in congress. These fellows who are anxious to get the people will be a wiser and sadder set after they have gone the third time to a people they have by manipulation defeated twice already.

Much has been said about defection in Brannen's ranks here, but every bluff that has been made by the opposition has fallen flat as every other one will and should. Much has been said

out money being offered for votes; this suggestion comes only from men who refuse to name the man who offered it.

Much advice has been dished out to Mr. Brannen from men who have betrayed him during the entire course of the recent campaign. Our attention has been called to an editorial in a Bulloch county publication, giving advice in a lavish manner. To our own knowledge said publication knifed Mr. Brannen as far as it dared to go during the entire progress of the campaign. It peddled through its columns the lies that were circulated here by Mr. Brannen's enemies, and letters were sent out from its office to people in other counties, asking them to vote against Brannen. This sheet sings the very song that is being sung by the Sheppard men in this convention. It puts itself forward to speak for a man whom it has lost no opportunity to betray, when he needed his friends to stand solidly back of him. They say that this is Bulloch county's fight. That is true, and the men who are true to Bulloch county and the country counties of the district, are standing by Brannen and not calling for "dark horses." If Brannen can't win, then no other man from Bulloch can win. The delegates who are standing loyal to Brannen in this fight, as no set of men have ever stood before, have in their keeping the interest and the hope of the country counties of the First congressional district, and they are going to stand true to their trusts. They are not seeking advice from men who have betrayed their neighbors in the past, and will not accept it when it is offered. These men are going to stand by Brannen first, last and all the time. He has led the fight of these people and to him they will continue to prove true.

Mr. Brannen don't have to be elected, but, if in the bounds of reason, the will of the majority of the voters of the district can be carried into effect, his friends are going to see that no stone is left unturned to accomplish it. If on the contrary, after a sufficient length of time has elapsed, it is shown that the deadlock cannot be broken then we will be forced to go to the people and win again over what we have twice done. Then and until then, in our opinion, Bulloch will continue to state the ballot by calling out "Hon. for Brannen."

The Convention

Has Recovered.

After a recess since last Saturday the convention of the last congressional district convened in the superior court room on yesterday at noon.

The Convention was opened with prayer offered by Rev. G. G. N. MacDonell, pastor of the Statesboro Methodist church.

Chairman E. P. Miller was again in the chair, with Col. W. G. Warrick acting as secretary, along with Mr. Charley Saussey who has been assisting him.

The personnel of the delegates was pretty much the same as last week, with the exception of a number of new faces. Mr. A. S. Guckenheimer held the proxy of Col. M. A. Olyburn from Chatham.

Col. A. H. Dixon was here in place of Mr. R. G. Daniel from Jenkins. Judge P. W. Williams was here along with Mr. M. A. McQueen and Col. E. J. Giles from Toombs.

The three additional ballots resulting in a vote of 18 for Brannen and 18 for Sheppard, Col. U. H. McLaws of the Chatham delegation offered a resolution calling for a new primary for Sept. 18, in which Messrs. Brannen and Sheppard should again go before the people. Col. McLaws and Mr. J. S. Collins debated the resolution all from Sheppard's side; however the Brannen delegates showed an unwillingness to discuss and announced ready for a vote. Then it was that a Brannen delegate offered a resolution to adjourn for dinner. It was accepted by Mr. Collins from the Sheppard side, but was withdrawn by Mr. McEnuray from Burke who offered it. Col. Overstreet from Scriven protested against adjournment, but the dinner bell rang at the Jockey hotel about this time, and the attention of the Convention having already been called to the fact that Dr. Herriott, a Sheppard delegate, was just in from a long trip to the state convention, or some where else in foreign lands and was very hungry, the Convention adjourned itself rather informally.

The convention met after noon and the new primary scheme went down in defeat 18 to 18. After quite a number of short speeches were delivered to convention adjourned until 8:30 this morning, 229 ballots having been cast and no choice made.

on Many Forgery Charges

Houston, Tex., Sept. 4.—Complaints have now been entered from eight cities other than this charging Clarence Hughes, now in jail here, with forgery. They come from Baltimore, Atlanta, Birmingham, Dover, Shreveport, New Orleans, Alexandria, La.; Columbus, Ohio, and there are four charges in Houston.

Hughes' father is said to live in Stillmore, Ga.. This morning Chief of Police Ellis received a telegram from Chief of Police Wier, of Birmingham. It contained the information that Hughes is wanted on five complaints of forgery there. He was arrested in 1905 with many charges against him in various towns in Alabama and most of them were settled by the payment of the amounts alleged to have been secured.

City Court Proceedings.

In city court Wednesday, Nelson Hicks, col., plead guilty to the charge of gambling and was given ten months on the chain-gang.

Joe Lewis, another negro, plead guilty to the same charge and was given ten months on the gang or \$75 and costs.

Tom Williams, quack doctor, charged with practicing medicine without a license, plead guilty and was given twelve months on the chain-gang. It seems that some negro fell sick a few days ago and "Doctor" Williams went for and the "doctor" proceeded to give some herbs to the patient, who was soon stretched out on the cooling board. The "doctor" will no doubt make a valuable addition to the road force.

Notice of Intention to Apply for Charter.

In accordance with the provisions of the laws of the state of Georgia, the undersigned, after four (4) weeks notice by publication, will file in the office of the Secretary of State a petition for incorporation as a railroad company, of which the following is a copy: STATE OF GEORGIA, Chatham Co., To the Hon. Philip Cook, Secretary of State.

The petition of J. Randolph Anderson, W. W. Williamson, A. S. Guckenheimer, T. P. Walsh, Jr., and W. E. O'Connor, all of the city of Savannah, in said county and state, and of G. S. Johnston, J. G. Blitch, J. A. Brannen, R. Simmons and D. N. Baco, all of the city of Statesboro, in the county of Bulloch, in said state, respectfully shows:

1st. That they desire for themselves and such others as may be associated with them, to form a railroad corporation pursuant to the laws of the State of Georgia, to be known and called by the name of the Savannah, Statesboro and Western Railway, the same not being the name of any existing railway corporation in the State of Georgia; that the length of said road, as near as can be estimated, will be about two hundred and ten miles; that the said road will run in a general north-south direction, from Statesboro, in the county of Bulloch, to a point in or near Atlanta, in Fulton county, within the county of Georgia; that the said road will probably run through the counties of Bulloch and Emanuel from Statesboro, on a near a direct line as may be, and thence through the counties of Emanuel, Johnson, Wilkes, Burke, Wilcox, McIntosh, Newton, Rockdale, DeKalb and Fulton to a point in or near the city of Atlanta, Georgia; that they desire the said road to be incorporated for a term of 101 years, with the privilege of renewal; that the expiration of that term shall be for two months next following the date of holding the next general election.

2d. That the above proposed amendment shall be submitted for ratification or rejection to the electors of this state at the next general election to be held after publication as provided for in the several election districts of this state, at which election every person shall be qualified to vote who is entitled to vote for members of the general assembly. All voting at such election shall be by ballot, and the ballot shall be written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment authorizing legislature to provide additional superior court judges," and all persons opposed to the adoption of such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment authorizing legislature to provide additional superior court judges."

3d. Therefore, I, Joseph M. Terrell, governor of the state of Georgia, do hereby issue this proclamation hereby declaring that the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is submitted to the electors of the state, qualified to vote for members of the general assembly at the general election to be held on Wednesday, October 3, 1906.
