"Hell's Half Acre."

Talk about your Yamacraws and East Sides, but there is a dive right here at your door, in fifty feet of two of your main streets, that is as bad as any of them. It is a disgrace to Statesboro and a foul, black spot upon the fair name of the town.

For fear we may be misunderstood and not wishing to be misunderstood we will make ourselves perfectly plain on this question. We refer to the negro joints in the alley in rear of the block beginning with Gilson's cafe and ending with the Simmons Company. Under the guise of a restaurant or barber shop dens are kept where every crime, vice and abomination imaginable is found. The thoughts of the thing are nauseating. Here on Sunday—even on the holy Sabbath—from early morning until late at night the noise is so great that people in the neighborhood cannot hear anything else. Here filth is found. Here disease abounds. Here vice of every kind and wickedness of every description exists.

Let us turn on the line light of investigation and see what all this noise and hubbub and revelry means. There can be no good in such joints. Are they doing a legitimate business? We do not think that they are. It is the rottenest and most corrupt hole in Statesboro—it is "Hell's Half Acre."

Are the people of Statesboro going to stand for this? We do not believe that they will.

MOB VIOLENCE IN ATLANTA.

Another chapter has been added to the solution of the race problem in the United States. The citizens of Fulton county, after suffering twelve assaults upon the white women of the county in the last nine weeks to go unpunished, trusting to the law to mete out justice, have at last taken the law into their own hands. The lynchings came Saturday when four assaults on white women in one day were reported. Mad and half crazy from excitement and passion, the citizens of Atlanta formed themselves into a mob and before they could be checked twelve negroes had been killed. The negroes reaped what they have sown. If you sow the wind you will reap the whirlwind.

The time has come in the history of our civilization when the negro rapist shall meet a fate as swift and awful as a crowd of infuriated men can give him. No black brute can outrage the womanhood of the south and go unpunished. The white women of the country shall be protected, if it takes every drop of blood in the country to do it.

As long as the negro finds commit these awful crimes they will be dealt with as men of honor deal with such villains. The punishment is awful, but the crime justifies it. We believe that lynching will never be stopped until the cause of it is removed. So long as God rules and reigns and the Caucasian race is supreme in this country lynching will continue when occasion for it arises.

Wage War on Vagrants.

The war we began a short time ago in the columns of this paper on the vagrants in and around Statesboro is going to be waged until some action is taken to enforce the vagrancy laws. We are not going to let up until they are driven out or put to work, either voluntarily or on the county chain gang, where the worthless class properly belongs.

They are here. We know they are here. Those in authority know they are here. Why do they refuse to do their duty in this matter? Gentlemen of the Council and Honorable Mayor, your oil and money as day, and we urge you to be prompt and fearless in doing your duty.

A concerted movement on the part of the citizens of Statesboro can rid the town of the criminal and vagrant class. Society will be richer, homes will be safer, when they are driven out. Begin at once a close and searching examination of the life of the idler and if it can be proved that he is loafer and has no visible means of support, let the law deal with him. Today one can hardly get a cook or a washerwoman in this town. Those who have them are paying two or three prices for their services. The farmers need cotton pickers. They are willing to pay liberally for laborers. The town is full of idle and worthless negroes. Reconcile the situation by making the vagrants work or leave the town and county.

The vagrant is a criminal. He too go hand in hand. He will commit murder or do any other crime when driven to it by hunger. He is a menace to the community in which he lives. No man who has a home and family is safe when the vagrant-criminal is abroad in the land.

We appeal to the mayor and council to take this matter up. Drive the loafers and idlers out of the town and out of the county if necessary. Let's have a city where one can go to bed feeling that his family and home and property are safe. Let's have a city where every man, woman and child is engaged in some useful industry.

Drive out the vagrants and these conditions will obtain here. Begin the movement to-day. Let the vagrant know that he is not wanted here. Enforce the law. You will receive the moral and financial support of the people of this town. In doing this you will render a lasting service to yourselves and to the city of Statesboro.

Havana, Sept. 21.—A crisis in the attempts of the American mediators to settle the Cuban quarrel appears to be approaching. The indications today seem to indicate that Secretary Taft will be unable to settle the difficulty without definite and real American intervention.

Secretary Taft was uncommunicative to-day, but it is known that he has been in frequent communication with President Roosevelt and reported conditions here to be far worse than he had supposed. A Discussion publishes a dispatch from Cienfuegos saying that blue jackets from the American gunboat Marietta who are garrisoning the Soledad estate were fired upon by rebels. The rebels fled after the Americans returned the fire.

World of Work to Make the Show Ready—Robinson Carries Army of Men—Have own Electric Light Plant.

It is no small job to unload the long trains of cars of the wagons, animals and accoutrements necessary to a big show. But this done, the work getting things in shape for the parade and the afternoon show comes next. There are a thousand and one things to do, but there are hundreds of men and boys to do them.

By ten o'clock in the morning everything is in readiness for the show and parade.

Almost every circus claims to have a show that cannot be duplicated and an aggregation of performers the like of which cannot be brought together, but the fact is every circus of any consequence has a double force and a double equipment.

There are really two circuses which have to travel about. The troupe are liable to injury. A sprained ankle will put one of the best performers out and there must be a man to take his place. Possibly the substitute will make as great a hit as the regular. Even the performing horses have their substitutes.

It is a fact not generally known the Robinson show carries two complete large canopies. In case one is destroyed by fire or storm another must be ready to be put up. When a failure to give a show entails a loss of from \$10,000 to \$20,000 for expenses the matter becomes serious. Even the men who put up the canvas can be duplicated on short notice.

Petition for Charter.

State of Georgia. To the Board of Public Cook, Secretary of the State of Georgia: The petition of E. Daugherty, J. A. Daugherty, W. Williams, M. M. Moore and T. L. Lanier of Bulloch county, Georgia, and W. J. Williams, Penton, Emanuel county, Georgia, and Claude C. Lee, of Stanford, Conn., and Gerald B. Conkin of the state of New York, most respectfully shows:

First, That they desire for themselves, their associates and assigns to become incorporated under the laws of said state as the Statesboro and Wrightsville R. R. Company.

Second, That during the period they desire to be incorporated for is one hundred years.

Third, That they desire to incorporate said railroad company with a one hundred thousand dollar capital stock, the privilege of increasing said capital stock from time to time not exceeding one million dollars.

Fourth, That they desire to incorporate said railroad company, and to operate same beginning at Statesboro, and running through the western section of Bulloch county, Georgia, at or near Pariah in said county, Georgia, touching or running near Summit, in Emanuel county, Georgia, and thence in the north-western direction to near Swainsboro, in the county of Emanuel, and then running in the northwestern direction at or near Kile, in Johnston county, Georgia, and to Wrightsville in the county of Johnston.

Fifth, That the length of said railroad according to the route above indicated would be about sixty miles, and that it would be in good faith to go forward without delay to do all things necessary to build said road, secure subscriptions to build said road, and to build, operate and maintain said road.

Sixth, That they wish to issue common stock in said company up to the amount of its capitalization.

That the principal office of said company will be in the city of Statesboro, Bulloch county, Georgia.

Therefore desire to become incorporated as above set forth.
