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The New York Election.

The week after we can view the election in New York with calmness and deliberation. The defeat of William Randolph Hearst was in more than one respect significant. It means that the people are not yet ready to rise up in their might and put down the trusts. For four years more the people of the state of New York will have to put up with an administration of corporations and trusts. The light that Hearst made against the ring rule will stand for years to come as the most remarkable that has yet been waged in this country. The odds were overwhelmingly against him from the first but despite this fact he made a great fight and the outcome was doubtful until the ballots had been counted.

The principles for which Hearst stands are daily becoming more popular. His platform was not one of socialism as some are too apt to believe. But on the other hand his platform is an embodiment of the protest that is going up over the country of the dangers resulting and likely to result from centralization of the national government. The trusts are becoming as strong as the nation. What will result when the time comes that corporations can raise as much money as the government and pay them better, perhaps? This is the drift of the current. To stem the tide and to arouse the people of the danger of centralization was the object of Hearst in his campaign, as we understand it.

He says that he is willing to fight in the ranks and no better proof on his sincerity of purpose could be found than this declaration.

In the rest of the state the Democratic candidates were successful. In New York city Hearst was the leader by a big majority. On the whole the showing made by the Democratic nominee was very satisfactory to his constituents. To have defeated the corporations in New York this year would have been to bring about one of the greatest revolutions that has ever taken place.

The president could not kill a turkey—not even a tame one—in Virginia. He might do better than that here in this country.

The Democrats made some substantial gains in the recent election that speaks of better things for the party four years from now.

Hearst was defeated but he made a most remarkable race and gave the republicans the biggest scare they have had in years.

The Constitution is getting after the trains for being late. We have got to used to that thing that we take it as a matter of course and don't mind it.

Harvie Jordan waited till it was almost too late before he began the organization of that stock company for the control of the cotton market. Maybe it will come in good time next year.

The president is inspecting the digging of the Panama canal. Lookout for another South American outbreak or a volcanic eruption. Big things go to gether, you know.

It has been suggested that Dick Russell is the only man who can draw a crowd in this country. At our mass meeting for the agricultural college let us invite him to come by all means.

Big Real Estate Deal.

Dr. J. T. Rogers, of Savannah, Saturday purchased from the heirs of the Zetterower estate three shares of the land belonging to that estate, thus completing the largest real estate deal in the history of the city if not in the history of the entire county. The consideration was \$24,000. The tract of land contains 200 acres and is situated on Savannah avenue near the city in the direction of the residence of Dr. Donahoo. The price paid per acre is in the neighborhood of \$100. This is an indication of the way that Statesboro dirt is selling. A few years ago the land could have been bought for much less than this price.

Dr. Hiers, also of Savannah, is associated with Dr. Rogers in the deal. The land was bought for an investment and it is not the purpose of Dr. Rogers, at the present, at least, to move back here to live. The land will, in the near future, be cut up into lots and sold for residence purposes. Owing to the location the lots will make very desirable ones for building. That part of the city in which the land in question is located is fast becoming one of the most fashionable residence sections here, and it is expected that it will be even more so in the future. It is understood that the purchasers of the land will give priority to the agricultural college.

Dr. Rogers already owns real estate here and is one of the wealthiest young men in this part of the state.

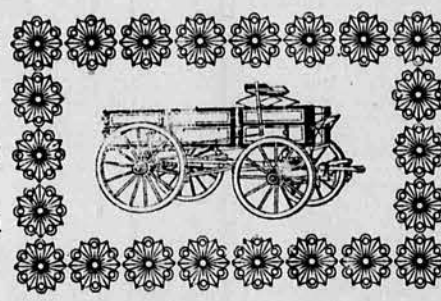
