**Record Price for Sea Island.**  
Even as p-crusts and promises are meant to be broken, so, also, are those peculiar things that we call records. Several records of different kinds have been smashed to smithereens this season in the local markets.

The latest record for sea island cotton is 34 cents. The latest record for a single bale was that made Saturday, when R. H. Warnock, of Brooklet, sold to the J. G. Blich Co. a bale of sea island, weighing 908 pounds, at 34 cents per pound, netting him \$300.07. This will stand for some time, we believe, for it is a rare thing one sees a bale of cotton weighing over 900 pounds. The market is falling off somewhat and the indications are that the crop is about all on the market. Those who have been holding for better prices are quite willing to sell now and a great rush is being made to put the staple on the market.

### Will Advertise for Bids.

Mr. J. R. Miller, chairman of the First district agricultural college executive committee, returned, yesterday, from Atlanta, where he went to confer with the governor and the other executive committeemen.

Advertisements will be inserted within the next week or ten days asking for sealed bids for the erection of the main college building and the two dormitories for boys and girls. There are eleven buildings in all; the others will be added in a short time, as it was thought best to take on the three largest buildings first.

Prof. Smith, of the United States department of agriculture, arrived in the city last night and will go out with a committee of citizens today and test the soil of the two sites offered. He will make up his report and submit it to the executive committee which will meet here next Wednesday, the 19th instant. The executive committee is made up as follows: J. R. Miller, chairman; J. H. Evans, Geo. M. Brinson, B. F. Alexander and S. W. Palmer. Col. J. Randolph Anderson, chairman of the board of trustees, will also be present.

The governor and the full board of trustees from all the counties of the district will meet here in January and lay off the site for the college.

A meeting of the different chairmen of the several executive committees will be held in Atlanta, on January 21st, when the bids for the construction of the buildings will be opened.

The governor informs us that he has perfected arrangements for the furnishing and equipment of the buildings at a very small outlay of cash. He has many tenders of farm tools and improved machinery for farming machinery free, simply as an advertisement. He will get a good many articles for the inside furnishings absolutely free; also fruit trees, etc.

Arrangements are being perfected to go ahead clearing the land as soon as the site is located. One of the first things to be done is to grade the park, around which the buildings will cluster, put out shade trees, etc. The park will contain about three acres. There will be a border of either sycamores or Carolina poplars set all around this space. The center will be laid off in walks, and lined up on each side of the walks with pyramid arbor vitae, the inside spaces to be set in roses and other flowers. The girls will be required to keep these up and care for them from time to time. The main academic building will be 140 feet long and 56 feet wide, two stories in height. The two dormitories, facing each other on opposite sides of the park, will each be two stories in height and contain forty-two rooms each—one of these buildings will be for the boys and the other for the girls. These will all be built of brick. There will be a workshop on one side where the boys will be taught the different trades and a dining hall facing it on the other side, where the girls will be taught the science of cooking. A contest will be held and a premium awarded to the girl who can prepare the best meal at the least cost. The editor of the News will be a candidate for the place of expert judge of this cooking contest. There will also be several cottages for the students. A modern barn and stables fitted up with a dairy will be one of the features.

The land will all be cleaned and laid off into plots of one acre each and the boys will be required to cultivate one of these plots. A prize will be given to the ones who produce the best results at a given amount of cost. One expert farmer and horticulturist will be employed.
