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## Tillman Replies to Taft's Speech.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 20.—Senator Tillman today gave out a statement in reply to the statement made in today's newspapers that President-elect Taft had him in mind in his speech delivered yesterday at Augusta, Ga., in which Mr. Taft was reported as having spoken of him as lacking in sympathy for the education of the negro race.

Mr. Tillman attributed Mr. Taft's criticism to "misstatements and malicious editorials in some of the South Carolina newspapers" in which, he said, his attitude had not been clearly stated. "In the first place," he said, "I am not opposed to negro education at all, provided it is of the right kind, knowing that education increases intelligence and intelligence increases the usefulness of the citizen. What I said and meant, and by which I stick, is this: That the Republican policy of the last forty years has been to compel the South to recognize the political equality of the negro. That in its essence, would mean the domination of the negro in South Carolina and Mississippi and many parts of other Southern states.

"We have disfranchised every negro we could under the fifteenth amendment and the only instrumentality available was to require an educational qualification. There is now an agitation in South Carolina for compulsory education. That would mean a heavy burden to provide more schools which the white taxpayers would have to bear, and there could be no discrimination against the negro on account of race or color. Hence we would present the spectacle of educating the negro at a very heavy expense to hurry forward the contest for supremacy between the two races as soon as we should have given them the necessary qualifications to vote, and be undoing what we found absolutely necessary to preserve our civilization.

"We never intend to be governed by negroes, whether educated or uneducated. The Republican party is now seeking to debauch the South through Mr. Taft, who offers us two offices in every thousand of our population and a pretended advancement of our material interests to join that party. If the Republicans will throw down and abandon once for all their efforts to compel the South to recognize the equality of the Caucasian and the African, by repealing the fifteenth amendment, we can then have the control of our state affairs and can then train them to make better citizens and aid in that 'uplift' which Mr. Taft is so anxious to see brought about. But we never expect to 'lift' them high enough ourselves or allow anybody to lift them high enough to put their heels on our necks, or govern us again, and the conflict of the races, which seems to be inevitable, will only be hastened by such talk as Mr. Taft indulges in."

## Prohibition in Carolina

is Doubtful.

Columbia, S. C.—Rev. J. L. Harley, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league, came in from the outlying districts Monday night and passed around among the reporters copies of a statement denying that there was discussion among the prohibitionists or that he himself had been ignored by the floor managers of the prohibition bills. Mr. Harley says a poll of the house shows the measures will pass there, but he is not so confident as to the senate. He denies that the prohibitionists have broken faith with the people.

It seems that there is going to be a hot fight against the Standard Oil Senator Earle's bill. "To prevent unfair discrimination," is aimed at the Standard. It has been approved by the judiciary committee and passed to second reading.

## Senate Passes

Prohibition Bill.

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 20.—The state senate at 3 o'clock this afternoon passed the Holiday statewide prohibition bill over the governor's veto by a vote of 20 to 13. The message then went to the house and is being read there by the clerk. The indications are that the bill will pass the house some time during the afternoon, and that it will thus become a law before the day is over. The vote of 20 to 13 is the same as the original vote on third reading in the senate and the same as that by which the senate passed the manufacturing bill on yesterday.

The statewidere claiming a majority of from 8 to 12 in the house, enough to pass the bill there over the governor's veto. The wildest excitement prevails at the state house.

Argument on the veto of Governor Patterson began in the senate at noon today and some lively proceedings are anticipated. The veto message of the governor on the statewide bill was a caustic and bitter argument and the statewide senators have taken considerable umbrage at it.

## CAUSED KILLING.

Reidsville, Ga., Jan. 13.—Early this morning George Andrews, one of the most prominent white farmers in Tattnall county, and a very wealthy gentleman, living west of the Ochopee river, shot and instantly killed Asa Rountree, another white man.

Andrews is a quiet man, and has never had any trouble with anyone before.

Senator Lane, in speaking on the question, declared the message was an insult to the manhood and the womanhood of Tennessee and that the governor stood with his back to the people of the state.

In his veto message, Governor Patterson charges that such legislation is against the Democratic platform and the doctrine of self-government; that it sets aside the recorded will of the people; that experience has taught that no arbitrary prohibition law was ever obeyed and its enactments brings no settlement of the question; that it destroys property, reduces state revenues, increases taxation, takes money from the people to send it elsewhere, foments discord, impairs the dignity of the commonwealth; fosters hypocrisy and invites evasion and deceit in the people.

The bill is made effective July 1, 1909.

The bill prohibiting the manufacture of liquor was amended so as to become effective January 1, 1910. Nashville, Memphis and Chattanooga are the only cities that would be affected by the bill prohibiting the sale of liquor, as local option laws are already in effect practically through the state.

Ed. Douglas Pulled Train. Gainesville, Ga., Jan. 24.—Passengers on the Gainesville Midland Railway train arriving here at 8 o'clock last night remarked on the way over from Athens to Gainesville that there must be a pretty "nervy" engineer at the throttle, for the giant mogul was made to keep up pretty stiff speed the way over.

The passengers did not know as they were clinking over the rails that a woman had her hand upon the throttle and was speeding the locomotive from the Classic to the Queen City of the Mountains, but when they alighted here, after a safe journey over, and were informed of who had guided the destinies of the passengers, there were many "Ah's" and similar expressions of surprise.

The young woman who had pulled the throttle was none other than the wife of General Manager Edward L. Douglass. The two had been over the road and were returning to the city when the genial manager who knows the "whys and wherefores" of a locomotive, stated that he was going to pull the train a while. His wife was not daunted by this, but she didn't propose to ride in a passenger coach by herself. Accordingly she piled into the engineer's box with Mr. Douglass and before long she was pulling the throttle. Mr. Douglass sat on the box with her, but just in her rear. She donned the engineer's goggles and kept an eagle eye on the track ahead as the train sped to its destination.

Arriving here she piled out of the engineer's cab as if nothing had happened out of the usual order. Some few passengers in the baggage car who had been put wise to the hand upon the throttle craned their necks out the door as each curve was rounded and saw a bushy head of hair with goggles on the engineer's cab, and that same head guided the steady hand that made the locomotive speed the train ahead.

## Great Crop Year Ahead

Of The Farmers Of Georgia. Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 24.—A great crop year is ahead of the farmers of Georgia, is the opinion of T. G. Hudson, state commissioner of agriculture, and Robert F. Wright, assistant commissioner, who keep in close touch with the farming interests.

"The weather of the past few weeks has given farmers in every section of the state a chance to make an early and good beginning," said Mr. Hudson yesterday. "More work has been done perhaps than during the same period of any of the past ten years. Farmers have been able to clear new land, and begin breaking up old land, preparatory to planting.

Those at the head of the state department of agriculture are of opinion that diversified farming will receive a big boost during the present year in Georgia. Reports received by them indicate that farmers are planning to grow more corn, wheat and oats and other food products than ever before.

More wheat is said to have been sown in this state during the present winter than during any previous year since the civil war. This is due to the lately recognized possibilities for wheat growing in this state, and the splendid weather affording unusual opportunity for planting.

"Labor conditions promise to be good," said Mr. Hudson. "There is very little complaint of labor scarcity from any part of the state. Negroes are staying on the farm, instead of crowding into the cities and seeking work at the mills and lumber plants."

Fruit trees are putting out all over the county, and if the weather remains warm ten days longer the trees will be so far advanced that a cold snap will ruin all prospects of a fruit crop.

## Sheriff Saal returned to Amite

tonight bringing Avery Blount as a prisoner, as well as the details of the crime, which was committed last night. Benjamin Breland, his wife and Mrs. Joseph Everitt, the last carrying an infant in her arms, were making their way homeward, along one of the parish roads, near Tiesaw.

It is alleged that Blount together with a man named Garfield Kinchon, fired on them from the side of the road with shot guns. Mrs. Everitt fell with her baby into the road, her head blown almost off. Mrs. Breland's chest was torn off by one of the volleys and Breland himself fell at the first fire.

Some young people living along the road on their way home from a party found the baby crawling about among the bodies.

Breland was still living and was able to murmur the name of Kinchon. He died shortly afterwards. Blount, the prisoner, says that Kinchon killed Breland, but will not say who killed the women.

Mrs. Everitt's husband was killed by Ben Kinchon a brother of Garfield several days ago, and the widow and her baby were making their home with the Brelands. Bad feeling has existed among the families a number of years.

## The Prohibition Law

### Will Be Enforced.

The events of the past week, which constituted the culmination of one of those stages which seem to be inseparable from the change in a state or community from the old accustomed liquor license system, with its open saloons, to the prohibition condition, have not been pleasant. The prosecutions in the courts, with the incidents that grew out of them, have led to criminalization and recrimination which cannot be otherwise than harmful. Let it now cease.

The ministers and good people who have taken an active part in the events of the past several days have acted from a high sense of duty. Their only purpose has been to promote the enforcement of the law, and surely in this they can only be commended. If in this cause any of them have done or said what did not meet the approval of others, it should be remembered that they were under fire, so to speak, and under such circumstances men will say or do things which they would not otherwise. They have acted from a high sense of duty and for this they deserve honor.

Likewise those who were opposed to them have said and done things, under the excitement of the moment and the strain of action which they would not have said and done otherwise. To them also is due the credit of acting in accordance with honest convictions. Some of them do not concede the wisdom of the prohibition law, and some, as has been developed, believed that this law could be violated with impunity. This has been done. It is one of the stages which is inevitable in the passage from a wet state to a dry. It is an experience through which all communities must pass where this radical change of conditions is made. It is one of the unavoidable processes of this evolution; and it is this through which Augusta has passed.

Let us be glad that it is behind us. Let us forget the unpleasantness it caused. Let us now cease all arguing and agitating, and address ourselves with undivided attention to real business.

Everything that was contended for and that could be gained by this agitation has been gained. It has been demonstrated that liquor was being illegally sold. It has been demonstrated that these places can be detected, that the officers will make arrests and that the courts will convict. In all our courts from the highest to the lowest, from the United States district court to the police court,

## There have been convictions

and penalties imposed. In the city court alone fines aggregating nearly \$3,000 have been collected in one week. The law has been vindicated. A lesson has been taught which will not be forgotten. Blind tigers, only called blind by courtesy, have been driven out of their lairs and will stay out because they have been given to understand that the law will be enforced. All this having been accomplished, let us cease further agitation which could not possibly accomplish more and must, if continued, result in useless and unworthy bickering. The prohibition law must be obeyed. It will be strictly enforced in Augusta. Those who would violate it in the future must do so knowing that they will surely be detected and meet the severest penalty of the law.—Augusta Herald.

## Near Beer Barred

### By Alabama Law.

Montgomery, Ala., January 23.—The manufacture and sale of all drinks that have even small part of malt or intoxicating properties is prohibited by the Alabama prohibition law, according to a statement made by Attorney General Gardner, in the city court today. All those who are selling near beer, white port, or any such drink, if it have the most remote particle of the prohibited ingredients, and does not intoxicate, are subject to the heavy fines and penalties of the law against sale and manufacture of the product in the state.

The Alabama law prohibits the barter in all liquors that carry malt or any intoxicating properties and "any other beverages that will produce in intoxication if drunk to excess." This is taken to mean that no output with malt or alcohol, even in small amount, can be handled.

It is argued that in the event that the anti-shipping law, as the judge intimated today, the railroads cannot carry even the near beer class of drinks without violating that act which prohibits aiding and abetting in the barter or sale of liquors.

The situation grew out of the hearing today of the mandamus petition on the part of a local brewing company to force the railroads to carry near beer classes of drinks, which they now refuse. Most of the saloons formerly selling liquors are still open, selling near beer. The outlook is good for a flood of prosecutions.

## Improving Our Streets.

The road force have struck the city and are now engaged in working East Main street from the walnut tree to the eastern limits of the town where the work on the public roads leading in here have been put in first-class order.

The sand is being moved out and a sand clay road made of it, which is the best roads we have. We learn that it is the intention of the county commissioners to work the public roads right on through town just as if there was no city government here.

The mayor all along contended that Statesboro being taxed ought to have some proportion of the road work and threatened to introduce some measure in the legislature to this effect, in fact he says he already had sufficient law to compel the commissioners to recognize the Statesboro portion of the public roads, and was preparing to enforce it had not the county commissioners seen the justice of the matter and decided to give the town some of the work.

The mayor says that he will go ahead and pave both sides of East Main street from the court house square to the Central depot with cement blocks, and the railroad authorities have agreed to sand gravel the ground around the depot. It is expected that the county commissioners will go ahead and pave the walks all around the court house square with these cement blocks.

This will be a great improvement to the town and a great convenience to folks from all parts of the county who come to town and use these streets.

## Will Payment of Pensions

### Delay Teachers' Money?

Warrant for the state's pensions for 1909 was signed by Governor Shortly after noon Thursday—for \$399,579, for payment in advance of the amounts due to the pensioners for the present year.

While the money was in the treasury to meet this draft, it is reported around the capital that the effect of its payment in advance will be to leave the treasury in a less satisfactory condition during the present year than it was during 1908.

Rumor also has it that the treasury will find it hardly possible to meet with the same promptness the payment for services rendered from time to time by the teachers of the state, with the full pension roll paid in advance for the entire year. But more money, it is unofficially promised, will be paid in claims of teachers between now and the first of July than was paid in 1907 during the corresponding period. In 1907, it will be remembered, while the teachers were nominally paid in advance, the amount appropriated was not sufficient to pay them all, and nearly \$80,000 that was due them had to be paid after the first of July and after the inauguration of Governor Smith; but no pensioners in 1907, received any money until the latter part of that year.

Pension Commissioner Lindsey's force has been working hard for some days past, compiling the figures for the governor's warrant. The warrant went to the state treasurer Thursday afternoon, and from that office the credit will be given to the pension commissioner which will enable him to sign checks to each county ordinary for the respective amounts due. According to Commissioner Lindsey, it is entirely probable that the pensioners in every county of the state will draw their money by Monday or Tuesday.

Last year's pension payments amounted to \$932,306.60. The figures of this year's payment are accepted as being in excess, to a small degree, of what the actual payments will be, as for various reasons—death, removal of residence, etc.—there are many pensioners left unpaid each year and the money turned back into the treasury.

Last September while confined in the county jail here awaiting a hearing of habeas corpus proceedings, Cline secured saws and attempted to escape. The grand jury this week investigated the case and a true bill was returned. Officers have not arrested Cline, as he is left for South Carolina Tuesday, presumably on professional business.

## John Temple Graves

### Eloquent With "Home."

New York, Jan. 27.—"Home," with the unique and heart-touching meanings which the word holds for the veterans of war-time campaigns and camp fires, was the subject of a stirring address by John Temple Graves of Georgia at the nineteenth annual banquet of the Confederate veteran camp of New York, Maj. Edward Owen, commander, at the Waldorf-Astoria this afternoon.

There were present nearly 500 comrades and guests, many of whom were women, when Gov. Swanson of Virginia responded to the first of the toasts, "The Army of Northern Virginia and Its Great Commander," John W. Vrooman, formerly of the United States navy, spoke of "Our Brothers in Blue." Notable persons present included Henry W. Taft, president of the Ohio Society; Walter H. Page, Gen. O. O. Howard, Thomas F. Ryan and Nathan Straus.

Gov. Swanson was enthusiastically cheered as he delivered what he said were "the greetings of the Confederate veterans of Virginia, the state and the city of Richmond, whose heart still pulses in love for the lost cause and its valiant soldiers."

"The various deeds performed during the Civil War," said Gov. Swanson, "have served the world as an example of what this country can achieve on the field of battle. When President McKinley proposed that the nation should take care of the graves of the Confederate soldiers and erect monuments to them the partition between the North and South came down."

The Governor spoke of the achievements of Gen. Jackson, Lee and Stewart, describing in minute detail the campaign from June 3, 1862, to June 8, 1866.

The soldiers of the Confederate army, the Governor said, had contributed greatly to the upbuilding and maintaining of the South. A military programme was carried out, with the sounding of "taps" and a toast drink to the dead soldiers.
