## PETITION FOR AMENDMENT OF CHARTER.

State of Georgia, Bulloch County. To the Superior Court of said county: The petition of the Shearwood Lumber Company respectfully shews: First, That it was incorporated under the laws of said State and its charter was granted by the Hon. B. D. Evans, Judge of the Superior Court of said county on the 13th day of January, 1903, and that its principal place of business was at Shearwood in said county. Second, That in and by its said charter its capital stock was fixed at \$200,000 divided into shares of \$100 each. Third, That your petitioner desires the amount of its capital stock changed so it may have the privilege of increasing the same to \$500,000 or 500 shares of the par value of \$100 each to be issued and disposed of as may be determined from time to time by a majority in amount of the stock already issued at a meeting of the stockholders of said corporation called for that purpose. ## First District Demonstrators Meet

### Well Attended Convention of Uncle Sam's Farmers Convene in Statesboro.

A well attended convention of the Farmers Demonstrations and Co-operations of the First Congressional District have been in session in Statesboro during the past two days.

The committee was called to order in the parlors of the Jackson Hotel on Tuesday morning, with Mr. J. P. Campbell of Washington D. C. in the chair. Mr. E. Gentry of the Department of Agriculture acting as secretary. Upon the roll call it was found that every Farm Demonstration Superintendent of the First Congressional District was present with the exception of one. The day on Tuesday was devoted to the discussion of farm problems, seed cultivation etc. Many interesting talks were made by the demonstrators from the various counties.

A large variety of seed corn was brought in and the different varieties taken up and discussed thoroughly, this was also true of cotton seed and cultivation. On Tuesday morning Prof. Hendricks sent in the school teams and took the members of the convention out to the Agricultural School for inspection.

The delegates were shown over the farm, the result of an experiment on sowing oats in the open furrows as against the old style of broadcast was an interesting feature of the trip to the school. The oats which were planted in rows below the surface of the soil had stood the freeze well and were now a good stand while a neighboring field sown broadcast were all killed.

The cow stalls also proved interesting as well as the shop work where the boys were at work. The delegation were taken in to the agricultural laboratory where the question of scientific agriculture is taught and shown through. A class of boys and girls were drilled before them, next they were taken to the domestic science department presided over by Miss Bosman, a class of girls were taking off a lesson in pastry. This was perhaps the crowning feature of the entire trip and seemed to impress the visitors more than anything else here a girl is taught how to conduct the home in all its features. Prof. Gentry of the agricultural department became so much interested that he insisted on taking hold and assist in preparing a cake that was in course of preparation.

Mr. Gentry travels all through the state, he goes to all the schools of its character and in answer to a question impounded by a News reporter who was along that the school at this place seemed to be doing the best work of them all, in point of equipment it exceeds all the others and he has great hopes for the success of this school.

The following program was discussed during the convention.

1. Preparation of the Soil.
2. Fertilizer and Compost Heap.
3. Improved Seed and Seed Testing.
4. Cultivation of Crop.
5. Forage Crops.
6. Cover Crop.
7. Crop Rotation.
8. Pasture.

### Lynching Feared

In Houston, Miss.  
Houston, Miss., Feb. 8.—It was learned late tonight that Judge E. O. Sykes, the presiding judge of this district has decided not to convene circuit court in special session to hear the case of Roddy Baskin, the self confessed slayer of Rev. W. T. Hudson, as anticipated. When the fact becomes known to the mob which was deterred today only in expectation of a speedy trial will be reformed and an effort made to lynch Baskin.

A dispatch from Oklahoma states that the company of state militia at that place has received instructions to remain at the armory and be prepared to come to Houston on a moment's notice.  
When the mob gathered about the jail this afternoon, Sheriff Bradford in pleading against mob violence, declared that every effort would be made to arrange the special term. Tonight, however, a message was received from Judge Sykes, declining to order the special session.

Oklahoma, Miss., Feb. 8.—Company M, the local military company, left this afternoon for Houston, Miss., to protect Robert Baskin who confessed to assassinating Rev. W. T. Hudson Saturday. A mob being formed at Houston was the cause of calling out the soldiers. The order was later cancelled.

### Night Riders Warn Negro

#### Carpenters in Pearson

Waycross, Ga., Feb. 8.—News has reached this city of another alleged night riding case near Waycross, the alleged offense having taken place at the little town of Pearson, about twenty miles from here.

The station at that place was destroyed by fire on October tenth and a new building is being constructed under the direction of Contractor J. W. L. Yates, who has in his employment two white men and five negroes. The negroes, it is said, found posted the following warning, which was put up some time during Friday night:

"You negro carpenters, we give you until Saturday night to leave here under penalty of death."

Similar threats are said to have been posted again last night.

Yates notified the Coast Line officials of this city and special officers have been sent to work up the case. The officers think they have the guilty parties spotted. It is said that Yates tried to get white carpenters to take jobs at Pearson, but they refused to work with the negroes, and race prejudice is thought to be at the bottom of the trouble.

### Liquor Salesman Sent to Atlanta Stockade.

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 8.—More consternation was caused in blind tiger circles here this afternoon when Recorder Boyles sentenced W. G. Stradley, an alleged agent of a Chattanooga liquor house, to serve 30 days in the stockade, pay a fine of \$500 and costs and to give a bond of \$5,000 for appearance in the state courts for a second trial.

Evidence against Stradley was to the effect that he had been selling cases of whiskey, shipped through the express company and marked to unknown people.

A city detective claimed to have trapped him with a marked bill. The recorder found him guilty of violating the city ordinance against keeping intoxicants for the purpose of illegal sale and also held him for an infraction of the prohibition law.

A. C. Osborne was tried on a similar charge, but the evidence in his case tended to show merely that he had solicited orders for a Chattanooga firm, had accepted money in payment for whiskey but had nothing to do with handling the goods. He was bound over under a bond of \$2,000.

Attorneys representing Stradley announced that his conviction will be appealed and arranged to furnish bond to keep him out of the stockade pending certiorari proceedings.

### Family Was Poisoned By Drinking Coffee.

Thomasville, Ga., Feb. 6.—J. F. Knapp, his wife and two children were poisoned supposedly from coffee they drank for breakfast. They sat down to their usual meal, Mr. Knapp, his wife and their five children, at the usual breakfast time, and all ate heartily of the food prepared, and four drank coffee. The latter were Mr. and Mrs. Knapp and their two sons, William and Harry, both under 13 years old.

In a short time all became violently ill and medical aid was summoned at once. Dr. Jarrell and Dr. Taylor arrived quickly and the sufferers were relieved and were soon out of all danger. It was at first thought that it was ptomaine poison that had caused their illness, but some of the symptoms are indicative of the fact that poison of another character might have been taken by the family.

The physicians will make a thorough analysis of the poison that developed and will be able to tell them just whether it was ptomaine poison or some other.

Mr. Knapp lives with his family three miles from town on Jackson street road, and Mr. Knapp is an uncle of Mr. Allie Futch of this city, a member of the firm of White & Futch.

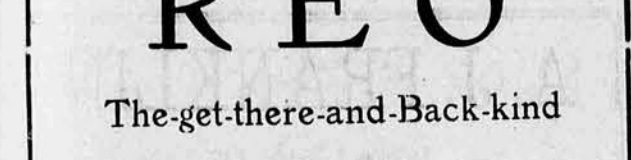

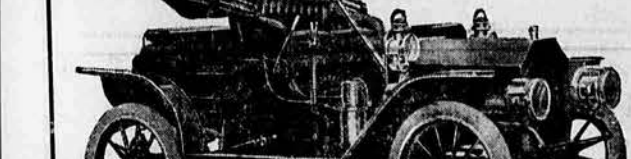

### PRACTICAL DOUBLE CORNCRIB

A convenient double corncrib with eight foot wings and an eight foot driveway through the center. The space over the driveway may be used as a granary, access to the same being through large windows in each end of the building. Oats are particularly well suited to be stored in a place like this.



CRIB WITH LOFT OVER DRIVEWAY.

On account of their lightness as compared with other grains, the corn should be of the best quality. The lower slant cupolas every ten feet should be made, through which the end of the conveyor or elevator may be inserted. In place of the four cupolas may be substituted which will run the entire length of the roof, being closed by a hinged door.

The second illustration shows the end elevation of a double corncrib which is described as follows: This plan is for a 24 by 36 building, with a double house roof extension, which has four windows on each side, used as holes to run corn into, also for light. A chute at the end of the elevator conducts the corn into the bin. The chute is made portable, so that it fits in the space. The double house extension may be substituted which will run the entire length of the roof, being closed by a hinged door.

## Advice to Farmers.

Mr. Editor: Please allow me space in your valuable paper to say a few things to the farmers of the First Congressional District. It is my wish to be of some service to them and I most respectfully ask that they will do me the kindness to read these few lines.

First, fellow farmers, let me suggest that you study your farm and farm operations to see what each crop produced on your farm is costing you. I feel sure that you would not continue very long to farm in the way the most of us do, if you would go to the trouble to trouble to find out exactly what you are doing, why you are doing it, and what it is costing you. Keep books on each crop and charge everything down to the crop and everything given to it, including all your labor and that of your children.

Second, permit me to suggest that you ought to make a careful and systematic study of your farm as a whole, and plan for the planting of such crops as you can produce at a profit, and arrange for a suitable rotation of crops. Do not plant the same crop in same field year after year, unless you have no respect for the field.

Third, I would urge upon you that you should not plant more than one-third of your land in cotton. Plant the other two-thirds in grain and food crops for man and beast, and ordinarily you should never sell your corn or other food crops till they are able to waddle around on four fat legs and grunt or low.

Fourth, I feel that I ought to beg you to raise on your own farms as far as climate and soil will allow all the supplies for your family and farm animals, so that you will not have to go to the supply merchants and beg him to credit you for the very things you might have produced at less than half the cost.

Fifth, let me advise that we do not as a class, practice as strict economy as we should. I do not mean that we should stint and half starve ourselves and have none of the comforts of legitimate pleasures; but I do mean that too many of us try to spend money as if we were as rich as the speculator who fattens on the wealth we produce and ignorantly toss into his lap. Again, we allow to many things to go to waste around the farm. Just look about your premises and see how much machinery and how many tools and implements are rusting and rotting for the want of enough care to put them under the shelter. We allow too many things to go to waste, and we cannot expect to be much better off till we quit such extravagance.

Sixth, I trust that you will not think me impudent or tedious if I recommend that you put your farms upon a cash basis. The credit system and the slipshod business methods which it encourages have been the ruin of many a farmer. If you would keep a strict account of every purchase and always know just how big your store account is, the credit system would probably not be so bad in your case. But very few of us do that. And when we consider that the merchants charge enormous profits on all goods sold on time, and also adds on a little more for fear he may not be able to collect it when it is due, and then puts on a little more to make up for the fellow who will not pay it must be apparent to all that the credit system as ordinarily practiced upon and by the farmers is a most pernicious and ruinous thing. Buy less, my friends, and pay for what you get. The merchant will

not mind so long as you always pass him the proper amount of the long green.

Seventh, and last for this time, let me gently persuade you into the notion to study a little now and then both in books and publications of a suitable nature, as well as the great book of experience, and see if you are not able to better your condition. If you never seriously study your own condition and make an honest effort to better it, I do not think you have much right to cuss and abuse the fellow who knows how to hoodwink you and reap more from what you make than you do yourself. You begin to think a little, and see if there is not a way out of all that. Educate your children in a way that they will be able to appreciate the beauty and sublimity of God's open country and not want to run off to the city and try to become members of that class which prey upon the farmers. Give the kind of education and training that will enable them to put the vultures out of business and win their fortunes from a wise treatment of the soil which they are to inherit from you.

## Federal Inspection

### For Naval Stores

Washington, February 10.—The new bill of Senator Taft, for Florida, will probably meet fully the objections urged by the Savannah delegation against his former measure providing for federal inspection of naval stores. It omits the requirement that such products shall be inspected by a federal officer before they can be shipped in interstate commerce. It simply makes it a crime to adulterate naval stores. The Georgia operators said they approved this regulation.

The modified measure has been drawn after conference with the department of agriculture. A copy of it was today placed in the hands of Senator Taft, of Minnesota, chairman of the senate subcommittee, which has been considering this question.

It provides that misbranding of rosin and adulteration of turpentine shall be punishable in the same way that food adulterations are now punished.

As predicted yesterday, the former Taft measure will be allowed to die in the subcommittee, and the amended measure will be urged for passage.

It will probably have the support of both the Georgia senators. Under the former bill the Florida contributors to the vast naval stores trade of Savannah, which makes her the leading naval stores market of the world, would have been diverted to Jacksonville.

### His Vote For Negro.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Senator Tillman was asked about the report that he had admitted having once in his life voted for a negro for office, and had made the statement in the executive session of the senate. He denied that he had ever voted for a negro in an election, but said that when he was governor of South Carolina and a member of the board of canvassers he voted to give George Washington Murray a certificate of election to congress over a white opponent, believing that the negro had fairly won.

He explained how the state had been gerrymandered in very much the same language as he was reported to have used. The purpose of the democrats was to get all the negroes in one congressional district. Senator Tillman denied that he had voted for a negro for office, because of having grown tired of voting tissue paper ballots. He admitted having voted tissue paper ballots, meaning ballots so thin that a ball dozen could be dropped in the ballot box by a man who appeared to be only voting once. The inference was that each ballot was counted.
